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BOOTIES FOR BABIES CONTEST

It is time to get your knitting needles clicking for the Forrest G. Moyer, M.D. Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) Booties for Babies knitting and crocheting contest.

The contest, which is sponsored by the NICU Parent Support Group, is open to anyone who would like to knit or crochet booties to help preemies survive those critical first weeks of life. Graduates of the Hospital's NICU have weighed as little as l pound, 2 ounces at birth.

"The booties serve a two-fold purpose," said Sharon Smetzer, R.N., head nurse of the 20-bed NICU. "Most importantly, the booties help keep the little ones warm, conserving energy that they can use to grow," she said. "They also serve as a morale booster for the parents. With all the machines and wires required to monitor premature and ill children, the booties will keep them looking like babies," Sharon said.

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Hospital Approaches United Way Goal

Not all the United Way campaign pledge cards were returned in this year's Hospital donor drive, but after just one week, the Hospital surpassed its goal of \$16,500. The Hospital's employee pledge total registered over \$18,000.

Class schedule

A third session will begin **Thursday, January 15** from 7:30 to 8:30 a.m. in the Cafeteria Conference Room. A minimum of 15 employees is needed to offer the class.

How to join

The fee for the eight-week course is \$56, \$15 of which is refunded if the person attends seven of the eight classes. A minimum \$20 payment is made at the time of registration. THE BACK SCHOOL

The **HealthCounts** Back School is one way for employees to learn more about back problems. The Back School includes sessions on anatomy, mechanics of exercise, posture and proper lifting techniques. People who come to the Back School learn about what causes back pain and how it can be prevented. They learn exercise regimens to help increase strength and flexibility of the spine.

The NICU holiday knitting and crocheting contest started last year with Beanies for Babies. Lehigh Valley residents, patients and staff at Slate Belt Medical Center, Bangor, and participants as far away as new Jersey, made over 300 beanies for the contest.

The booties will be collected starting December 1 through December 15 in the Volunteer Office between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m.

NICU nurses will serve as judges to select the contest winners. The Arthritis Club supports patients and families from the Hospital's Arthritis Clinic.


