PAYCHECK DISTRIBUTION

Since payroll falls on the Friday after Christmas the following procedures have been established to minimize employee pay difficulties:

All supervisors responsible for picking up checks from Payroll are to do so at 3 p.m. on Wednesday, December 24 in order to pay the day and evening employees who are working. For those employees not working, checks can be picked up in Payroll between 4 p.m. and 6:15 p.m. Employees are not to come to Payroll before 4 p.m. if they are off.

Anyone that has not picked up his/her check by Thursday morning will be able to pick it up in the Patient Accounts Office between 8:30 a.m. and 3 p.m. on Thursday (Christmas Day).



Back pain affects 65-80% of the population and is the second most common reason for employee absenteeism. Employees at the Hospital can be educated on back care and prevention of injury at the Physical Therapy Department's Back School Program.

The program consists of three sessions covering back anatomy and treatment of back pain; a lab demonstration of the importance of posture, lifting techniques and activities of daily living; and an individual screening of posture, flexibility and strength to determine potential problem areas.

The next Back School is scheduled for January 6 in the Physical Therapy Department. Employees who are interested in the program should call extension 2240 to register.

NEW FLU VACCINE

The Employee Health Department is sponsoring a second Flu Vaccine Program. The program is designed specifically for individuals under 35 years of age who received the vaccine (the standard trivalent vaccine) offered at the Hospital in September and October. The new vaccine is called the supplemental monovalent flu vaccine and is highly recommended for health care workers.

The cost of the supplemental vaccine is \$3. Call Employee Health at extension 2289 for information about the vaccine program or to make an appointment.

Health Insurance

As of January 1, the Hospital will be offering health insurance (hospital, surgical and major medical) coverage to part-time employees scheduled 32 or more hours per pay period. Therafter, enrollment will be limited to once a year (each January). Also, cancellation of insurance can only take place at that time. The premium for this insurance is expected to increase as hospital costs increase.

To sign up, stop by the Personnel Department and complete an enrollment card. The first premium is due January 3.


A total of 20 meal books and 20 pairs of movie tickets were also awarded as prizes. A complete listing of all the winners is posted outside the Cafeteria.

Tips for a Safe Holiday

As the new year approaches, we all look forward to the traditional festivities. While preparing for the holidays, keep safety and security in mind at work and in the home. Here are a few suggestions to make your holiday season safer:

SHOPPING -- Since most shopping is done in the evening and it gets dark earlier now, take extra security precautions. If possible, do not shop alone. Lock your car, and park it in a well-lit area. Keep any purchases or valuables out of sight in the trunk.

DECORATIONS -- Be aware of fire hazards. Do not overload electrical outlets. Avoid light-duty cords (they can overheat) and keep them out of the way (so no one trips over them). Check strings of lights for worn insulation, especially with artificial trees -- a short can cause a fire.

PARTIES -- If you are a host, consider where your guests will park. Do not inconvenience your neighbors. Remind guests to lock and park their cars in well-lit areas. Make arrangements in advance for anyone who drinks a bit extra -- do not let them drive.

TRAVELING -- Make sure that your home is secure if you visit friends of relatives. Do not leave Christmas tree lights on during your absence.

FIREPLACES -- When did you last have your chimney cleaned? Use fireplace screens, and let the fire go out before you go to bed. Make sure fireplace ashes are cold before you dump them.

BABY-SITTERS -- Baby-sitters are in great demand during the holiday season, so make arrangements early. Make sure that yours knows how to reach you and has some-body nearby to contact in an emergency. Leave a list of key numbers like fire, police, and the family doctor -- and strict instructions about opening the door while you are out.
