Study Group OK's MMC Rehab. Role

A special study committee has recommended to Muhlenberg Medical Center's board of directors that the hospital "continue its active and viable program in rehabilitation and physical medicine."

Leon L. Nonemaker, chairman of a recently-appointed Program Evaluation Committee, told the board that its study of the Dr. Harrison and Myrtie Prosser Department of Rehabilitation Medicine has been completed.

Six-Bed Facility Will Upgrade MMC'S Acute Care Prog.

Muhlenberg Medical Center will locate a six-bed Intensive-Coronary Care Unit on the second floor of the hospital, in close proximity to the Surgical Unit.

Dr. Gavin C. Barr, medical staff president, announced that the unit "will upgrade acute surgical and medical care, in conjunction with our continuing expansion and the present program for the education of our nurses in the Coronary Care Unit."

Dr. Barr reported that funds from this year's Lehigh Valley Summer Festival, which will be held on August 24-26, will be used to purchase equipment for the new unit.

The required equipment will include six bedside units with dual channel oscilloscopes; large screen oscilloscopes with recorders, heart rate meters and other attachments, and one mobile defibrillator monitoring system, including cart, defibrillator, recorder and scope.

Dr. Barr stated that the unit is being planned by the hospital's Emergency Room and Coronary/Intensive Care Committee, which is headed by Dr. Gladys Morales of Bethlehem.

that he was originally skeptical of acupuncture, reported that he is now a firm supporter of the centuries-old treatment.

A native of Israel, Dr. Weinberg was educated in France and has been involved in acupuncture research in both the Far East and Europe. He stated that his experience has shown acupuncture to be effective in the treatment of hypertension, muscle disorders, and lymphedemea and, also, as an anesthetic.

Dr. Weinberg said that the

use of acupuncture has been traced back 5,000 years to the Hia Dynasty in China, but has been known to Western medicine for less than 400 years.

Pointing out acupuncture's advantages as an anesthetic, the French physician noted that it reduces bleeding during surgery and also permits patients to remain conscious for their operations.

Dr. Weinberg is currently a resident at Queens (N.Y.) General Hospital, where he is serving on a special research team.
