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### **PROBE: Personal Profile**

Reporter John Martin, presents a transcript of his personal insights to Dr. Raymond Smith, Anesthesiologist.

Probe: What made you decide on your particular profession?

Dr. Smith: "I always wanted to be a doctor."

*Probe:* From childhood?

Dr. Smith: "Well, I remember from age 11, or about 5th grade that I always wanted to be

Probe: What made you choose your specialty? (Anesthesia)

Dr. Smith: "Well frankly Dr. R. L. Schaeffer got me while I was an intern here at the hospital, in surgery. They needed some Anesthesiologists so I was 'drafted', finished my internship as an anesthesiologist and just kept on going from there."

*Probe:* What are your duties as Anesthesiologist? Dr. Smith: "Well I'm one of the staff anesthesiologists. I give anesthesia, supervise nurses, get the patient on the table, off the table, sign them in, make pre-op rounds and generally see that the OR schedule is facilitated. I do spinals, nerve blocks and the like."

*Probe:* Did you ever want to be anything else? Dr. Smith: "When I was in the service, the army thought I would make a better engineer than I would a doctor. They wanted me to go to West Point, where I was accepted, but I refused it. I went to Texas A&M, Texas Tech, University of Illinois and Washington University, while in the army. I came out just short of a degree in engineering. I went overseas as an engineer.'

*Probe:* So you took your medical training outside the service?

Dr. Smith: "Yes, I was two years into pre-med when I went in the Army Specialized Training Program (A.S.T.P.), and had already been accepted at Temple on a preliminary basis, but when I got into the service they tried to push me into engineering because I hadn't enough credits for medicine yet. I went into engineering because my acceptance at medical school was provisional anyway. They just fooled around too long. After A.S.T.P. finished I went to X-Ray technicians school in Indianapolis, In-

diana, of all things. Then I went overseas as a water supply engineer. I was over in Calcutta, India. After I got out of the service I finished pre-med at Muhlenberg and then went to the University of Buffalo for medicine.

*Probe:* Do you have any particular goals or projects you would like to accomplish?

Dr. Smith: "I don't know if you know this, but I have several patents I have been working on such as a breakway needle I developed and patented several years ago. Frankly that about covers the area of my accomplishments.'

*Probe*: Then you hold some patents on medically related devices?

Dr. Smith: "Yes."

Probe: Where do you think your profession is headed in the next ten years?

Dr. Smith: "Well when I started (medical school) in Buffalo we were in the chloroform era. We gave chloroform by 'open drop.' Then we went to ether, cyclopropane, then fluothane and

BOARD RECOMMENDATIONS
DENTISTRY:

We purchased a dental unit for Operating Room to permit restorative dentistry under anesthesia.

PEDIATRICS:

The Junior Aides have accepted the challenge to assist in redecorating W-2 & W-2-N.

Physicians, pediatrics staff and the architect are developing preliminary plans to renovate pediatrics and establish an adolescent unit.

PSYCHIATRY:
The NP Clinic staff is in preliminary discussion about the Annex being converted to additional space for the Mental Health / Mental Retardation unit. Plans for W-6 and MH/MR are being discussed with psychiatric physicians, also. OBSTETRICS/GYNECOLOGY:

Preliminary plans are being developed with OB/GYN physicians and nurses for an enlarged and modern OB Suite. The meetings were held Oct. 1, Nov. 5, and Nov. 18.

We are developing a temporary clinic area in old Section B. We plan to move the clinics to this area by Dec. 1, 1975.

We have received bids for renovating WGN into new clinics. The bids were presented to the Board of Trustees on Nov. 19, 1975.

SURGERY:

In consultation with the Chief of Surgery, Dr. Donald Gaylor, Drs. Glenn Schantz and William Frailey have been employed to assist surgeons in our Operating Rooms. These men will work under the supervision of the patient's attending surgeon.

penthrane and now we're getting into the intravenous methods. I think we're going to see more and more I.V. medications used because of pollution problems and various other things. I see a definite decline in inhalation anesthetics, those which are vaporized or volatile."

Probe: I've read where there have been problems with minute particles of anesthetic gases escaping and affecting O.R. personnel who are con-

stantly exposed to them.

Dr. Smith: "They did a study and found that Anesthetists and OR personnel have more abortions and deformed children, or at least a statistically valid increase."

Probe: What legal implications are there as an

Anesthesiologist?

Dr. Smith: "Well frankly Anesthesiologists are one of the highest risks as far as malpractice is concerned ranked with orthopedic and plastic surgeons. We are the highest risk category, in fact."

Probe: Are there any people in your profession that you have particular admiration for? You

mentioned Dr. R. L. Schaeffer.

Dr. Smith: "I always admired him because he was the man who held The Allentown Hospital together in his day. I always called him a sort of Benevolent Dictator. I don't know if that would work in the present situation, but he was admired by everyone and got his work accomplished. Next would be Dr. Clifford Trexler. As far as I'm concerned he was a tremendous man and along with him, Dr. Yamashita. These are three great people, I think, of my era."

Probe: What do you hope your legacy will be

to the hospital community?

Dr. Smith: "Serving the patient well, being involved in community service such as the Scouts movement and the Big Brother's Association. I'm also active in the Exchange Club. We have an Explorer Scout Troop associated with the hospital which meets every two weeks. So my legacy will be one of community service.


