Advanced Wound Center of Distinction

Norwegian Street has been recognized with a national award for excellence.

Healogics, the nation's leading wound care management company, presented the award to recognize our wound center's outstanding clinical outcomes for 12 consecutive months, including patient satisfaction of higher than 92 percent and a wound healing rate of at least 91 percent in less than 31 median days. Out of 630 centers eligible for the Center of Distinction award, only 334 achieved this distinction.

Healogics and its affiliated companies manage nearly 800 wound care centers.

"This award is a tribute to the scope and level of services we provide at the Advanced Wound Center," says LVH–Schuylkill President William Reppy. Treatments provided include negative pressure wound therapy debridement, application of cellular-based tissue or skin substitutes to the wound, offloading or total contact casts, and hyperbaric oxygen therapy.

"Our team does an excellent job in treating hard-to-heal wounds, and that is a significant differentiator for patients," says Mohammed Meeran, MD, Advanced Wound Center Medical Director. Other local practitioners who staff the Advanced Wound Center include general and vascular surgeons Neil Fisher, DO, and Carlos Villarreal, MD, general surgeon Daniel Bobrowski, MD, internist Diana Lazur, MD, and family medicine physician Cynthia Lubinsky, MD.

Become an Organ Donor and Save Lives

LVHN has joined the Hospital and Health System Association of Pennsylvania (HAP) and Gift of Life Donor Program as a hospital partner in a campaign to educate hospital communities on the critical need for more organ, tissue and cornea donors and to encourage individuals to register as donors.

Every day new people are added to the national organ transplant waiting list. That list now exceeds 118,000 people whose lives depend on a life-saving organ transplant. This week, more than 100 of them will die because not enough organs are available. Thousands of others whose lives would benefit from the gift of eye and tissue donation continue to wait and hope.

As a hospital partner in this initiative, all colleagues are encouraged to join with the Gift of Life Donor Program, our partner organ donation organization, in educating our hospital community on the critical need for donation and providing opportunities for people to sign up as organ, eye and tissue donors.

We are aiming to register new organ donor designations to the state registry to contribute to the national goal and to earn state recognition from HAP for conducting activities that promote enrollment in state organ donor registries. We will



earn points for each activity we implement between April 1 and Aug. 31, 2017, and will be recognized for reaching a titanium, platinum, gold, silver or bronze level.
