#### Over 300 Attend Coin Auction

# Check Presented To MMC-3-Day Event Draws Over 30,000

Record crowds jammed the grounds at Muhlenberg Medical Center on August 24, 25 and 26, when members of the hospital's male, female and junior auxiliaries conducted the most successful Lehigh Valley Summer Festival in the event's 12-year history.

A check for \$25,000, representing net proceeds from the festival, was presented to Administrator Donald E. Porter, who accepted it on behalf of MMC's board of directors. The check, which was given to the hospital at a festival evaluation meeting in early October, exceeds last year's record proceeds figure by \$8,000.

## 35 Ambulance Corpsmen Attend Second Training Course At MMC

### Dr. Galgon Speaks At Staff Lecture

John P. Galgon, M.D., director of MMC's pulmonary function laboratory, was the guest speaker at the first program of the medical staff's 1973-74 lecture series.

Dr. Gavin C. Barr, staff president, announced that 35 physicians attended the lecture, which was held in the hospital's dining room on October 22.

Dr. Galgon discussed the "The Pathophysiology and Management of Shock," outlining the physical processes common to shock and recent advances regarding its treatment.

The medical staff lecture was preceded by a meeting of the general surgical staff, which featured a presentation by Ivan A. Gonsalves, M.D.

Dr. Gonsalves, a member of the orthopedic surgical staff, described "The Pollicization of the Index Finger," a unique surgical procedure that is used to restructure the hand of patients who have lost their thumb. A ten-week course entitled "Pennsylvania Emergency Care and Transportation of the Sick and Injured" is again being conducted at Muhlenberg Medical Center. Over 35 local ambulance corpsmen are participating in the course, which started October 10.

Coordinators for the course are Richard C. Seeds, captain of Bethlehem Township's Ambulance Corps and Rescue Squad, and Mrs. Cathy Georgy, R.N., head nurse for MMC's emergency department.

Mr. Seeds announced that the course is being jointly sponsored by MMC and the Pennsylvania Association of First Aid and Rescue Squads.

Ambulance corpsmen from both Northampton and Lehigh counties are enrolled in the program, which includes lectures, demonstrations and films on modern emergency care and treatment.

Mrs. Georgy reported that the course is being offered for a second time at MMC because of the exceptional response from persons who attended the first program presentation.

Members of the hospital's medical staff will be instructors for sessions on the following areas:

Emergency childbirth; injuries to the bones, joints, chest, abdomen, brain and nervous system; the treatment of child patients; caring for unconscious patients; medical care of burns; pulmonary resuscitation, and airway management intubation and oxygen therapy.

The ambulance corpsmen training program was arranged by MMC's nursing department through the State Department of Health's emergency medical services division.

#### **Chaplaincy Director Addresses Auxiliary's Annual Meeting**

Miss Sieger's remarks to the group touched on the changing needs of area institutions and the changes that have had to take place within her agency to meet these needs.

#### **Deaconess Selected** To Head Hospital's **Chaplaincy Services**

Sister Esther Schenker has been named deaconess of Muhlenberg Medical Center's chaplaincy program. The position was created to provide for the religious needs of patients as part of the hospital's total patient care services.

Sister Schenker will be responsible for obtaining church affiliation information from patients upon admission and notifying the appropriate clergy.

Besides maintaining records of clergy visitations, the deaconess will see patients on a regular basis, depending on their needs and desires.

Sister Schenker will work closely with clergy, members of the hospital's medical and nursing staffs and, also, with the Lutheran Chaplaincy Service of the Lehigh Valley.

The Sunday chapel services will continue as a function of the Men of MMC, who schedule laymen and pastors to officiate the services, arrange for pianists and ushers and encourage patients, staff and visitors to attend each week.

Pointing out that since the average stay is now only 13 days, Miss Sieger noted that most patients are not able to attend chapel service during their hospitalization.

Therefore, she said, "The pastoral service must be taken to them as a part of total patient care".

The chaplaincy service director explained that her agency recruits and trains volunteers to perform limited counseling and to refer patients to various kinds of services that are available.

Concluding her talk, Miss Sieger made reference to "the priesthood of believers," urging lay persons to be at the roots of the changes in churches as they adapt to the changing needs of society.

#### **Record Growth For Volunteer Program**

For the past 12 years, Muhlenberg Medical Center and its patients have benefitted from the constant service and care provided by the hospital's team of adult and youth volunteers. Today, this team is larger and more active than ever before.

Figures on volunteer activities for the 1972-73 fiscal year reveal that the hospital has the largest number of volunteers since the program's inception in 1961.

Mrs. Mary Grace Stanton, R.N., director of volunteer services, observed that a record 2,600 persons performed volunteer work at MMC during the past year, contributing over 31,000 hours in 300 serv-

During its 12-year history, the program has experienced steady growth, but the past year's effort showed a record increase of 6,000 hours over 1971-72.

Mrs. Stanton attributed this growth to "a general desire to devote time towards helping others, increased activities on the part of our male and female auxiliaries and a greater public awareness of MMC's status as a full-service hospital."

Candystriper Debbie Reinhart, a student at Northampton Area High School, was crowned "Miss MMC" on August 24, the opening day of the Lehigh Valley Summer Festival.

The 14-year old Allen Township resident captured top honors among the hospital's Youth Volunteers by selling over 600 festival tickets in the annual MMC" competition.

biggest fund-raising event ever sponsored for the benefit of the hospital."

Mrs. Frank Muhr, chairman, reported that the festival attracted well over 30,000 people, setting an all-time attendance mark. She attributed this record "to our new threeday format, which enabled an expanded line-up of midway and stage entertainment features.'

In addition to numerous auxiliary booths, kiddie rides, band concerts and evening stage performances, this year's festival featured the works of over 50 craftsmen and 40 artists.

More than 2,500 dinners were served during the threeday event, while the auxiliary-sponsored noon luncheons proved equally popular.

Other festival attractions included the crowning of Miss MMC, folk music by Doug McClain, Sam Missimer the Magician, and Freedom High School's Fife Corps, stage recitals by students from Mary Anne School of Dance and Miss Jeanne's School of Dance Arts and performances by the American Legion and Elks' bands.

### **Nurse Named To Develop New Continuing Education Programs**

Mrs. Susan E. Hutchens, R.N., of Allentown has been appointed to the newly-created post of staff development coordinator at Muhlenberg Medical Center. This post supersedes that of the former inservice director position.

Franklin A. Shaffer, R.N., director of nursing services, announced that Mrs. Hutchens, who has assumed her duties, is currently working closely with nursing and other staff supervisors to establish programs for continuing education throughout the hospital.

Mr. Shaffer revealed that the post was instituted to provide members of all staffs with on-going educational opportunities. He stated that "our ulitmate goal is to assure the total care of every patient by acquainting employees with the high standards necessary towards providing this care."

In addition to orienting staff members in areas such as safety, ethics, security and hygiene, the program will encourage hospital personnel to improve their skills by pursuing further training and educational programs.

The nursing director pointed out that Mrs. Hutchens "will inform employees of courses that are now offered at local institutions and develop programs in subject areas, where there are no courses available."

Mrs. Hutchens will be primarily concerned with the inservice education of nursing, dietary maintenance and housekeeping staff members, as well as the orientation of all new employees.

A native of Bethlehem, Mrs. Hutchens was graduated from Moravian Preparatory School and received her R.N. degree in 1965 from Abington Memorial Hospital School of Nursing. She also holds a bachlor's degree from Moravian College and served as an instructor at Sacred Heart Hospital School of Nursing for one year.

No newcomer to MMC, Mrs. Hutchens formerly served as inservice education coordina-

Mr. Shaffer pointed out that her former duties at the hospital were confined to limited areas of nursing education and were not as broad as those duties now defined under her current position.

He pointed out that some of her present projects include the development of education programs for nurses' aides, a medication administration course for licensed practical nurses and an order transcription course for unit clerks.

#### Childbirth Course Conducted At MMC

A six-week course in the Lamaze method of prepared childbirth is being offered on a continuous basis at Muhlenberg Medical Center.

Sponsored by the Lehigh Valley Association for Childbirth Education, the course provides expectant couples with intellectual, physical and emotional preparation for childbirth.

Franklin A. Shaffer, R.N., director of nursing services, announced that the course is being headed by Mrs. Barbara Read, R.N., of Easton.

Offered to expectant parents in the final trimester of pregnancy, the course utilizes films, lectures, informal discussions and a format of instruction that helps the expectant mother and her husband to share a more satisfying childbirth experience.

### **Board Approves Four Physicians For Medical Staff Privileges**

A graduate of Xavier University of New Orleans, he attended Meharry Medical College in Nashville, Tenn., where he received his M.D. degree in 1960. Dr. Hardin served his internship at Hubbard Hospital of Meharry Medical College and a four-year residency in internal medicine at Madigan Army Medical Center in Tacoma, Wash. A member of the Society of Nuclear Medicine, Dr. Hardin has been certified by the American Board of Nuclear Medicine.

Joseph C. L. Merola, M.D., a native of Nazareth and a resident of Bethlehem, has been granted active privileges in gynecology. Dr. Merola received his B.
