FORMAL DEDICATION CEREMONIES will be held on the Hospital Center grounds at 2:00 P.M. on Sunday, September 8. The featured speaker will be Dr. W. Clarke Wescoe, a native Allentonian who is currently Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of Sterling Drug Inc. Dr. Wecoe earned his BS degree at Muhlenberg College and his MD from Cornell University. A prominent medical educator, he served as dean of the University of Kansas School of Medicine from 1952 to 1960 and then became chancellor, a position which he held until 1969. From 1963 to 1967, Dr. Wescoe also served as chairman of the American Medical Association's Council on Medical Education.

ANESTHESIA

Anesthesiology has evolved from a practice of medicine limited to the relief of pain during surgery to a broad medical specialty dealing with the support of life functions in surgical patients in the operating rooms, recovery room, and ICU. Eighteen Anesthesiologists will have privileges on the Center's staff, including those now working at Allentown Hospital and at Sacred Heart Hospital. There will also be six nurse anesthetists on the Center's staff. The Anesthesiologists have come to Allentown from such diverse Medical Centers as Yale, Harvard, and Columbia, as well as the Philadelphia Centers of Penn, Temple, and Jefferson. This group of physicians includes two associate professors and a pharmacologist.

To better serve the patient population and the Surgical Staff, the Department has been divided into six teams of Anesthesiologists each with extended training in the management of anesthetic procedures for a particular surgical specialty.

The Department also offers a consultative service to patients with airway management problems, respiratory insufficiency, circulatory insufficiency, fluid, electrolyte, and acid-base disorders, and to unconscious patients. Anesthesiologists are also available to administer diagnostic and therapeutic nerve blocks for patients with chronic pain.
