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Ordering Outpatient Services

As insurance companies begin to compare hospital and physician claims for similar information prior to payment based on appropriateness and medical necessity, hospital coders and physician office coders must work more closely together to ensure that the ICD 9 CM and CPT codes assigned by each match.

A special thanks to those of you who have provided accurate information to the hospital for outpatient services ordered by the physicians.

Diagnosis - Signs/Symptoms

A diagnosis and/or signs and symptoms are required in order to code outpatient claims.

Example: Rheumatoid Arthritis/hematuria Diabetes/hypothyroidism

Abdominal pain Chest pain

Probable, suspected, rule out, questionable diagnoses are not valid as chief complaints. Signs and symptoms would be required in these cases.

Example: Leg pain - R/O fracture Shortness of breath/probable pneumonia Cough, nasal congestion - R/O viral syndrome Urinary frequency - R/O UTI

Acceptable V Codes

Long Term Use of Anticoagulants:

V58.61 + diagnosis code

Coumadin therapy is acceptable followed by a diagnosis to reflect why the patient is on coumadin.

Example: Coumadin Therapy/Atrial fibrillation
Coumadin Therapy/S/P AVR

Long Term Drug Use: V58.69 +

diagnosis code

Medication level checks should be followed by a diagnosis to reflect why the patient is on the medication.

Example: Steroid level/Rheumatoid arthritis

Screenings are acceptable, however, if signs or symptoms exist, then it is no longer a "screening" and the signs and symptoms should be listed as the chief complaint.

Example: Routine PSA Thinprep Paps

Screening Mammography Cholesterol Screening

Normal Pregnancy/Maternity:

V22.0 through V22.1

Pregnancy/maternity is acceptable, however, if signs or symptoms are involved, they should be included in the chief complaint.

Example: Pregnancy/Urinary frequency - R/O UTI

Status/Post Transplants: V42.0 through V42.9

Special Investigation and

Examinations: V72.0 through V72.7 This includes routine examinations of specific body systems. However, if a sign or symptom is present, this should be the chief complaint.

Example: Hearing Evaluation
Dental Exam
Vision Evaluation

Pre-Admission Testing: V72.81 through V72.85 + diagnosis
PAT is acceptable, followed by the diagnosis for the reason for the surgery.
Example: PAT/Cholelithiasis
PAT/Coronary Artery Disease

Organ or Tissue Replaced by Other Means: V43.0 through V43.89
Example: S/P AVR S/P TKR
S/P MVR S/P THR

Radiotherapy/Chemotherapy: V58.0/V58.1

Follow-up Surgery, Radiotherapy or Chemotherapy: V67.0 through V67.2

Follow-up Completed Treatment with High-Risk Medication, Not Elsewhere Classified: V67.51

Personal History of Disease of the Blood and Blood Forming Organs: V12.3

Personal History of Surgery to Heart and Great Vessels, Presenting Hazards to Health: V15.1

ICD-9-CM Codes: If the chief complaint is listed as an ICD-9-CM code, it needs to be a valid code.

If 4th and/or 5th digit subclassifications exist, they must be assigned. A code is considered invalid if it has not been coded to the full number of digits required for that code.

Example: 599.0 (599 is not a valid code)
250.00, 250.01 (250 is not a
valid code)
428.0, 428.1, 428.9 (428 is not
a valid code)
401.9 (401 is not a valid code)

E-codes are not acceptable as a chief complaint.

New Chemistry Panels

Recently, the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA), with the approval of the American Medical Association (AMA), has released four new chemistry panels. HCFA has strongly encouraged laboratories to begin using the new panels as soon as possible.

Therefore, effective July 1, 1997, Health Network Laboratories will begin using the chemistry panels listed below. Tests previously contained in the chemistry panels may be ordered individually if, in your medical judgment, they are necessary for the treatment or diagnosis of your patient.

Please order only those tests necessary and appropriate for the diagnosis and treatment of your patient. Profiles will be billed to the payer using CPT codes assigned to each profile. Additional tests will be billed separately.

With the implementation of the new chemistry panels, the Inpatient Chem 13, Outpatient Chem 12, and the Chem 6 panels will no longer be orderable. A listing of the discontinued panels has been included for comparison purposes.

Get the "Fax" for the RMS

The implementation of a Radiology Management System (RMS) is scheduled for August 26, 1997. The RMS will significantly reduce the turnaround time for the delivery of imaging reports from Lehigh Valley Hospital as well as Lehigh Magnetic Imaging Center and Lehigh Valley Diagnostic Imaging.

An informational letter and survey regarding the implementation of the RMS were mailed to medical offices on June 20. The letter outlined the benefits of the RMS for referring physician offices including improved report turnaround time, fewer phone calls to request report results, and improved physician and patient satisfaction.

An automatic fax capability is one of the key features of the RMS that will expedite delivery of imaging reports. Medical offices have the opportunity for imaging reports to be sent directly to their fax machines immediately after a report is verified by the radiologist. The faxed report serves as the final and legal document for the patient's record. Office which have printers connected to the hospital's fiber optic network can have reports routed to the network printer.

If you haven't done so already, please be sure that the survey for your practice is completed and returned to the imaging center representative designated in the letter no later than July 7. Adhering to this time frame will ensure your practice's fax preference is set prior to the RMS implementation date.

VRE Policy Refinements

On June 2, the Infection Control Department instituted changes in the VRE isolation policy at LVHHN. The refinements to the policy are aimed at enhancing patient care by emphasizing and targeting proven measures with the highest yield to prevent the spread of infection.

Patients with VRE will be placed in a PRIVATE ROOM on CONTACT ISOLATION ONLY if they meet the following criteria:

- Patient has an OPEN, DRAINING WOUND
- Patient is INCONTINENT OF URINE OR FECES
- Patient has DIARRHEA

Patients readmitted with a history of VRE will only be placed in a private room on Contact Isolation if they meet the above criteria.

NO room changes or delays in admissions will be made in the early morning or late evening to accommodate isolation.

Patient's medical condition always takes PRECEDENCE over isolation placement.

Patients with VRE who are NOT assigned to a private room will be on Standard Precautions. Compliance with Standard Precautions will be strictly enforced and monitored. This includes glove use for ALL patient contacts and handwashing before and after contact with the patient (even when gloves are worn).

Educational brochures are available for the health care workers, patients and families, and the admitting department.
