PRIDE Rounding Begins


Want to talk with leaders about what we're doing well and where we have opportunities for improvement? You'll now have a regular opportunity to do so because PRIDE Rounding has arrived at LVH–Schuylkill.

This week during PRIDE Rounding, senior leaders and managers conducted the first house-wide survey of patients, families and colleagues throughout both hospital campuses. "This is a very good way for us to talk with patients and families about a person's experience while in the hospital," says LVH—Schuylkill President William "Bill" Reppy. "We learn what they like about their stay and if there are things we can do in real time to make that stay even better." Colleagues were

also asked questions during the rounds including what they are most proud over the past six months and what are the things we can do even better.

Senior Medical Director Lawrence Riddles, MD, Vice President of Patient Care Services Susan Curry, MSN, and other managers have been conducting similar rounds on a much smaller scale. This week's PRIDE Rounding involved a mass caravan at both hospitals involving both clinical and nonclinical leaders in clinical and nonclinical areas.

Thursday's PRIDE Rounding session started with an early morning department manager/leadership briefing in the Wall Auditorium followed by the deployment throughout the hospitals. Patients in our behavioral health units were not interviewed, but colleagues on those units were. After rounding, leaders gathered



to discuss what they learned - the positives and the opportunities.

"PRIDE" is an acronym for the behaviors and actions we use when interacting with patients, families, guests and colleagues: Privacy, Respect, Involvement, Dignity and Empathy. PRIDE is more than a word. It represents what we need to do to give those we serve the best possible experience.

Leaders will now complete an online survey to document the feedback they received. LVH-Schuylkill's leadership team will track the results to uncover short- and long-term opportunities to enhance the patient and colleague experience.

PRIDE Rounding will occur monthly at LVH–Schuylkill. So be sure to look for and talk with our leaders so you can help make LVH–Schuylkill the best it can be.



While rounding at LVH–Cedar Crest, we heard how proud you are of our teamwork, patient care and your fellow colleagues. Patients said they most appreciate the great care they received from LVHN, our nurses and staff.

PUTTING FEEDBACK TO WORK

Leaders are busy using your feedback to resolve issues and respond to your concerns. Here are some of the things we heard during Town Halls and PRIDE Rounding, and what we're doing to make things better:

What's on your mind: Information technology (IT) issues hindering performance at LVH–Hazleton

Response: A series of walk-throughs and meetings were held at LVH-Hazleton to document the IT issues colleagues and providers were having. A plan to resolve the issues, along with a timeline, has

been developed and is currently being implemented.

What's on your mind: Staffing and reductions at LVH–Pocono

Response: There are no planned reductions for LVH-Pocono. Open positions will be evaluated based on the needs of our patients and our community.

What's on your mind: Campus integration at LVH–Schuylkill

Response: Phase II of the integration plan will include maternity and pediatrics moving to LVH–Schuylkill E. Norwegian Street. We also plan to close the ED at LVH–Schuylkill S. Jackson Street. Architectural plans for the new maternity unit are in development, as is a plan to address pediatric beds. We are pursuing a single hospital license with the Pennsylvania Department of Health.

We're working to create a great colleague and patient experience at LVHN. When we keep the lines of communication open and work together to solve problems, we can only get better.

LVH-Schuylkill's security officers are navigating our campuses with a different set of wheels these days. The department of safety and security added a standard patrol car to its fleet to increase visibility throughout our campuses.

"We were fortunate to be able to get this vehicle from our Allentown colleagues," says John "Jack" Brobst, Director of Public Safety and Security. The vehicle has radios connected with the hospital's communications systems, flashing lights, spotlight and other safety and security devices. It will serve both the security department and our daytime courier service.

"People might be surprised to know just how much mileage we cover with these type of activities," Brobst says. "We are often looking to make sure our officers can travel our campuses, and having enough vehicles is the first step. Although this vehicle is as bit older, it is in good operational condition. We're glad to have it."
