Belting Up, Is It Really Worth lt?

Everyone of us can expect to be in a motor vehicle crash once every ten years.

Three out of four crashes happen within 25 miles of the home and 80% of serious injury and deaths occur in cars traveling 40 miles per hour or less.

Half of the 35,000 people who die each year in passenger cars, light trucks and vans could have been saved if they had been wearing their safety belts. The number of **injuries** would have been reduced by a corresponding 65 percent.

If you are thrown from your car your chances of injury are nearly 25 times greater than if you were protected by a safety belt.

Fire or submersion occurs in less than one-half 1% of all injury-producing collisions and occupants who are belted in are far more likely to remain conscious and be able to free themselves.

Take Cedar Crest Blvd. South (toward Emmaus). When the road ends (MacDonalds on left), turn left. At first traffic light (at Pizza Hut), make a right. At stop sign by West End Beer Distributors, make a right. Follow the road (Pennsylvania Ave.) to fork. Stay straight at fork. Park is on South 14th St.

FROM SOUTH ALLENTOWN:

Take Lehigh St. or Emaus Ave. to Chestnut St. in Emmaus. (Emaus Ave. and Lehigh St. come together at Superior Restaurant in Emmaus where Chestnut St. begins.) Stay on Chestnut St. until you come to the Pizza Hut (10th and Chestnut St.). Make a left. At stop sign at West End Beer Distributors, make a right. Follow the road (Pennsylvania Ave.) to fork. Stay straight at fork. Park is on South 14th St.
