Bermans Give \$500,000 to Hospital

Philip and Muriel Berman are the contributors of \$500,000 for the establishment of the very sophisticated cancer treatment facilities and equipment currently being constructed and installed at The Allentown Hospital.

"Muriel and I are thrilled at the prospect of helping to bring to actuality a project which will significantly improve the access and quality of cancer treatment in the Lehigh Valley," said Philip Berman, Chairman

of the Board, Hess's Department Stores, Inc.

The Bermans' gift is the most substantial single contribution by an individual ever to be received by the Hospital. In gratitude of the Bermans' generosity, the Hospital Board has determined that the radiation therapy department will be named the Muriel M. and Philip I. Berman Radiation Therapy Center.

"I believe this says a great deal about the Bermans' commitment to the health and welfare of the residents of the Lehigh Valley," commented Morton I. Silverman, M.D., Chairman of The Allentown Hospital's Board of Directors. "We are, of course, very grateful for the Bermans' foresight and understanding in contributing to a project which will considerably improve cancer treatment in the Lehigh Valley. We are equally appreciative of the Bermans' commitment and confidence in The Allentown Hospital as it continues to maintain and implement important health services in the community."

The addition of the new sophisticated 20 MeV Linear Accelerator, the only one in the Lehigh Valley, was approved by the Health Systems Council of Eastern Pennsylvania in 1980, and its building and installation are now being completed. It will complement the cobalt unit and array of other cancer treatment services currently available at the Hospital. Patients are expected to begin treatment in the new addition in June. One of the many cancer treatment services at The Allentown Hospital is the Cancer Control Program, which is one of only nine such programs approved by the National Cancer Institute.

Bulette Appointed Chairman of Psychiatry



Dr. Bulette and his wife Jane, who has a masters degree in medical/ surgical nursing, have two children, Jonathan, five, and Emily, two. Dr. Bulette enjoys tennis and golf and is looking forward to relocating his family to the Allentown area.

On The Bermans' Contribution





Rev. MacMillan Receives Award

The Rev. A. Malcolm MacMillan, a member of The Allentown Hospital Board, became the first recipient of the Leonard Pool Prize, established by the Dorothy Rider Pool Health Care Trust to recognize "outstanding contributions to health care in the Lehigh Valley."

Fr. MacMillan was honored for his "extraordinary leadership in the development of the Lehigh Valley Hospice" at a reception May 11, 1981 at the Holiday Inn, Bethlehem.

Lawrence P. Levitt, M.D., a trustee of the Pool Health Care Trust, presented the award, a challenge grant of \$50,000 to Lehigh Valley Hospice in honor of Fr. MacMillan. Dr. Levitt explained that, under the challenge grant, the Pool Trust will match every \$2 raised by Lehigh Valley Hospice in the community with \$1 of Trust funds up to a maximum of \$50,000.

Dr. Levitt also displayed the model for an 18-inch bronze medallion to be mounted in the lobby of Allentown and Sacred Heart Hospital Center to commemorate the recipients of the Pool Prize. In addition, he noted that Fr. MacMillan and subsequent recipients will receive 4-inch replicas of the medallion.

He cited the many individuals and organizations who contributed to development of the Lehigh Valley Hospice and called it "a truly remarkable cooperative effort."

"A contribution of one person, however, has been exceptional in bringing all sorts of people, organizations, corporations and health care institutions together to work toward this important goal. That person has been referred to as the cement that bound together our area hospitals and home health organizations to address the planning effort for hospice...and the ultimate diplomat, getting them to work together to improve care to the dying patient and his family that already was being given in the Lehigh Valley."

Dr. Levitt said it is "in recognition of that extraordinary contribution to health care in the Lehigh Valley that the Trustees of the Pool Health Care Trust have given me the privilege to award the first Leonard Pool Prize to the Rev. Malcolm MacMillan.

Fr. MacMillan is rector of the Associated Episcopal Parishes of Allentown. He has served on the boards of Pennsylvania State University, the Mental Health Association, as well as the Hospital. He has been active in diverse community organizations, including the United Way, Boy Scouts of America, and the Comprehensive Health Planning Agencies. His service has earned him numerous awards here in the Lehigh Valley and elsewhere.

Hospitals Are Interested in Containing Costs

Hospital costs are viewed differently by different groups of people. But one thing is certain — everyone is concerned about hospital costs.

Business, industry and labor are concerned because the cost of providing health care coverage to employees becomes more expensive each day. They have come to recognize that the area of greatest concern for them — their benefit package — is also the best tool to begin cutting down their health care costs.

Third-party payers are concerned. Premiums are skyrocketing and benefit packages are harder to underwrite. In recent years, third-party payers, like Blue Cross, Blue Shield, and commercial insurance companies, have been increasing coverage for a number of cost-saving procedures like outpatient surgery, second opinions for elective surgery, preventive care services, care provided at home or in an extended care facility and pre-admission testing.

Government is concerned because it has gotten into health care in a big way since the seemingly modest beginnings of Medicare in 1966. Health care is consuming more and more of the government's budget. Government in Pennsylvania has cooperated with hospitals in an area for tremendous potential savings — reform of regulations that increase costs.

You are concerned too. Although most of you pay relatively few out-of-pocket expenses for health care, the day may come when you will have to. Consumers are beginning to see the value of changing lifestyles and using the least expensive level of care. More people are taking advantage of wellness programs offered by businesses and by hospitals. Patients also are taking advantage of cost-saving hospital services like preadmission testing and outpatient surgery.

Your hospitals are really concerned! We realize that although costs are rising, demand is also in-

creasing for more sophisticated health care. We must meet your needs and at the same time hold down costs.

We are doing our part. Hospitals and doctors, in cooperation with business, industry, labor, third-party payers and consumers, have embarked on a voluntary program to restrain health care expenditures. In Pennsylvania, this Voluntary Effort "saved" over 220 million dollars in its first two years.

But that's not all. Hospitals are identifying areas of savings, such as energy management, and cooperating with insurers, business and industry to realize those savings. In Allentown, for example, energy conservation programs are substantially reducing health care costs.

Our hospitals are also at the center of many health education programs designed to convince people to change their lifestyles.

These are just some examples of how people who have a stake in hospital care are working to contain health care costs. These programs are in place today and are working.

Expected benefits of this project are:

- Increase the cure rate of advanced cancer of the cervix.
- Reduce the complications in the treatment of deep abdominal and pelvic cancers.
- Increase the cure rate in cancer of the tonsils because of the ability to deliver higher doses compared to Cobalt 60.
- Increase survival and reduction of side effects in lateralized cancers of the oral cavity and oropharynx.
- Increase the cure rate in advanced cancer of the bladder.
- Increase the cure rate of various head and neck cancers.
- Reduce the complications from treatment of the chest after surgery for cancer of the breast.
- Increase the control rate of cancer which appears again on the chest after breast surgery and previous radiation therapy.
- Treat cases in which there is no alternative to the electron beam, such as large cancers of the scalp.

Student Interns Learn at the Allentown Hospital

Two students from local community colleges are currently enrolled in internships at The Allentown Hospital in two separate departments. Sue Brown, a first-year Activities Specialist major at Lehigh County Community College (LCCC), spends 2½ days each week working in Pediatrics with Carol Ann Yurasits, Play Therapist. Robin Miller, a prospective May graduate of Northampton County Area Community College (NCACC) and Library Sciences major, works in the Hospital library.

In the Library, Robin performs the four basic library functions of cataloguing, reference, ordering, and circulation, in addition to other duties.

Although Robin anticipated an internship in an academic or public library, she was "glad for the opportunity to work in a special library" like The Allentown Hospital Library. Robin feels the internship has been very instructive. Robin is presently working part-time at The Allentown Hospital School of Nursing Library where she does shelving and typing catalogue cards, among other duties. She is also in the process of designing a bulletin board.

A 1975 graduate of Dieruff High School, Sue Brown assists Carol Ann in organizing games for the young patients and conducting craft sessions. An advisor for her church youth group, Sue says she was always interested in working with children and young teens. That's why she enjoys working at The Allentown Hospital so much.

According to Sue, working in Pediatrics is vastly different from the experiences she gained working at the Lehigh County Senior Center, Allentown. Sue explained that the Activities Specialist program at LCCC was orginally designed for students who desired to work with geriatrics, but now the program encompasses directing recreational activities for youths as well. Some typical courses required in Sue's program are Physical Education, Child Psychology, Sociology, and several courses in the psychology of aging and geriatrics.

For the 1981-82 academic year, four student interns from local colleges are scheduled to work in the Heart Station. According to Mrs. Jennifer Pope, Chief Technician, Heart Station, the interns will observe and assist with testing for all types of cardiovascular diseases in addition to general clerical duties.

Special Nursing Students

Two nursing students with interesting backgrounds, currently residents of the Lehigh Valley area, are enrolled in courses at The Allentown Hospital School of Nursing. Completion of the courses is needed in order for them to qualify to take the State Board of Examination for licensure in Pennsylvania.

Mrs. Mary Leathem of the British Isles, a resident of Souderton, PA, and Mrs. Ellen Siebbeles of South Africa have been nursing students here since February. Both concur that the Allentown Hospital School of Nursing is a very nice place to study. They agree, too, that the Hospital is "impressive" and the employees, as well as their instructors and fellow nursing students, are friendly and helpful. Both also enjoy the accessibility of the city of Allentown to surrounding cities such as Philadelphia and New York City.

Mrs. Siebbeles took the Maternity Nursing course and is taking the Psychiatric nursing course until August. She hopes to take her state boards in October, 1981. An American by birth, Ellen was born in West Virginia where she lived until age 12, she lived in South Africa for 15 years. She and her husband, a native of South Africa, moved to Pennsylvania in August, 1980, so he could further his theological studies at United Wesleyan College, Allentown. Ellen holds a diploma in nursing from B.G. Alexander Nursing College, Johannesburg, South Africa. Ellen is looking forward to beginning her clinical work in the coming weeks. She is
