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CARDIAC REHABILITATION UNIT - STRESS TESTING

IN THE LAST UPDATE, an introduction to the Hospital Center's Cardiac Rehabilitation Unit was presented. In this article one part of the program is discussed - stress testing.

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Every patient entering the Cardiac Rehabilitation Unit Program receives a stress test prior to beginning year long exercise therapy. The test is conducted under the direction of a qualified physician to determine the patient's physical capability and enable the physician to prescribe an exercise program that is within the workload the patient can tolerate safely.

The test is monitored constantly by Mrs. Faye Baylor, R.N., who has been specially trained in the operation of electrocardiography and oscilloscope. The patient rides a stationary bicycle or walks a treadmill with nine to ten leads running from electrodes to the recording equipment. During the ten to twenty minute test, the physician keeps check on the patient's blood pressure and heart rate and at the same time watches the EKG on the monitor. The test results are then used to prescribe the patient's personal exercise program.

In addition, the exercise stress test is also valuable for the following uses: (1) determination of physical fitness generally, (2) evaluation of coronary vein graft surgery, (3) measurement of response to exercise therapy, (4) measurement of work capacity, (5) evaluation of drug therapy and sick sinus syndrome, and it is also very valuable as an integral part of any physical examination.

In future Updates, additional information about the Cardiac Rehabilitation Unit's insurance physical exam program will be detailed.

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B-MODE ULTRASOUND SCANNING

THE HOSPITAL CENTER RADIOLOGY DEPARTMENT has announced that they expect delivery in early August of equipment that will enable them to perform Ultrasonography. This device allows for the study of the configuration and size of body organs by using an echo technique that can be likened to sonar used to direct submarines. The device is principally used for study of body organs as an adjunct to other radiographic, nuclear medicine and diagnostic procedures.

Dr. Barry Goldberg, Chief of the Ultrasound Department of Episcopal Hospital, who is a recognized leader in the development and utilization of ultrasound equipment has been retained as a consultant for this service at the Hospital Center. Additionally, technicians will be specially trained for this service at Episcopal Hospital.

The equipment will be utilized as a full service facility for both in and out patients.
