

#### **New Medical Staff**



Wendy McNelis, R.N., assistant head nurse of the postpartum unit, said, "The twins were like the grand finale." They were born at 9:41 and 9:46 p.m. during the 3 to 11 p.m. shift. Of the other 11 babies, three were from Allentown. The rest were from Emmaus, Wind Gap, Bath, and Whitehall. There were two girls and nine boys born in the single shift.

The nursing staffs of labor and delivery, postpartum unit (3-T) and newborn nursery were all involved in the surge of activity.

LaDene Gross, R.N., head nurse of 3-T and the newborn nursery, said there was a lot of excitement among the nursing staff. "Even though there was a high number of births in a short period of time, we were able to work as a team to provide the high quality staff needed to easily accommodate all the patients' needs.

Sze-ya Yeh, M.D., chairman of the Department of Obstetrics and Gyne-cology and specialist in high-risk pregnancy, attributed the high number of births to the comprehensive services available at The Allentown Hospital.

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# Award-winning Physicians Apat Annual Residents Dinner

Miller was a 1959 graduate of The Allentown Hospital's Obstetrics and Gynecology program. He was Chief of the Obstetrics and Gynecology Department at The Allentown Hospital for 10 years and is a member of the Hospital Steering Committee for WomanCare of The Allentown Hospital.

Willie J. Hilliard, M.D., a recent graduate of the Obstetrics and Gynecology residency program at The Allentown Hospital, has won an award for a research project, the results of which are significant to prenatal health. He was given the S. Leon Israel Prize for his study of the sexually-transmitted disease chlamydia.

Sze-ya Yeh, M.D., chairman of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology worked with Hilliard on the study. According to Yeh, this was the first time the S. Leon Israel Prize was presented to a resident from Allentown.

According to the study, "Prevalance of Chlamydia Infection In a Prenatal Population," chlamydia was only recently discovered to act as a sexually-transmitted disease (STD). Now chlamydia is considered the fastest growing STD in the United States. Unlike syphilis and gonorrhea, it has no obvious symptoms. But, Hilliard's study has revealed new information about the disease and its treatment.

According to Hilliard, women often do not realize they are afflicted with chlamydia. "This STD affects three to four million Americans each year and causes sterility in approximately 11,000 women," said Hilliard. This cervical infection can be passed from mother to infant at birth.

The research, funded through a \$5,000 grant from the research and support committee of the Dorothy Rider Pool Trust, found that many early infant morbidities are the result of a neonatal infection acquired during passage through an infected cervix.

It has been estimated through the research that high percentages of newborns conceived by infected mothers will have chlamydia, or develop conjunctivitis or pneumonia.

This study was made possible with the recent development of a test for chlamydia, called MicroTrak. Previously, cultures done to detect chlamydia took up to two weeks to receive results. The screening method was utilized by Muhlenberg College professor David Much, Ph.D., and produces results in a few days. Hilliard said, this test is faster and is less expensive.

The research will benefit the

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newborn even more than the expectant mother, according to Hilliard. "Through screening for chlamydia, hospitalization will be prevented for over 20 newborns in the Allentown area." He continues by saying, "The American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology suggests that prenatal packages should offer a screening for chlamydia."

Hilliard said that treatment for chlamydia can be done during pregnancy. "The treatment is simple and inexpensive, and can be implemented during pregnancy with no harm to the baby."

This is the second consecutive year an Obstetric and Gynecology resident has been honored with an outstanding award. Last year, Michael S. Patriarco, D.O., received the Phillip F. Williams Prize Paper Award.

Yeh said, "Honors like these prove that The Allentown Hospital residency program in Obstetrics and Gynecology is post-graduate medical education at its best."

Hilliard said that more clinical experience is offered at The Allentown Hospital than at a lot of other programs. "Recently, sub-specialities were added in obstetrics and gynecology and this is also a benefit," said Hilliard.


Hilliard started his residency at The Allentown Hospital in July 1983. He is originally from White Plains, N.Y., and attended Albert Einstein College of Medicine in the Bronx. He has begun a private practice in obstetrics and gynecology through the National Health Service in Roanoke Rapids, N.C.

Lisa Baker Vaughn, M.D., of the department of obstetrics and gynecology, who is also a recent graduate, worked with Hilliard on this awardwinning project. She is formerly from Scranton, Pa., and attended Temple University before being accepted into the residency program at The Allentown Hospital. Vaugh is now a member of The Allentown Hospital Medical and Dental staff and practices obstetrics and gynecology in Allentown.

The award Hilliard received is presented annually in honor of S. Leon Israel who was the director of the department of obstetrics and gynecology at Pennsylvania Hospital and proessor of obstetrics and gynecology at the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine. The award was sponsored by The College of Physicians and Surgeons in Philadelphia.

McQuade has dedicated her life to fighting for the rights of senior citizens and those less fortunate than herself.
