VOLUNTEER PASTORAL VISITORS

THE HOSPITAL CENTER recognizes the anxiety and fears that often accompany a hospital stay; to alleviate some of these pressures, volunteer pastoral laypersons visit Hospital Center patients. These visitors enjoy a deep religious faith coupled with an ability to listen and speak with common sense and empathy to people.

Patients visited in the afternoon are those who did not state a specific religious affiliation or whose religious affiliation was incomplete on the admission form. The lay visitors ask if the patient has a clergy member he or she may want notified even if the patient is a non-practicing member. No pressure whatsoever is exerted on the patient; but experience has shown that patients appreciate the offer and often take advantage of the service proffered.

Pastoral volunteers also visit scheduled surgical patients the night before their surgery, when fears run high. The patient is invited to talk and/or to pray to dispel some of these anxieties.



The month of March saw 343 Volunteers donating $5,605\frac{1}{4}$ hours to all Center departments. In addition to serving in nursing units, business office, pharmacy and dietary, and answering 1,632 telephone requests, volunteers delivered 985 plants and flowers, made up 720 charts and 500 packets for admissions, delivered tons of mail to patients and xeroxed and collated 9,200 pieces of information for administration and other departments.
