"Health East, Inc." has been chosen as the name for the non-profit parent corporation which will set broad policies for its subsidiary organizations.

The subsidiaries were renamed as well. The Allentown Hospital Association will now be known as "The Allentown Hospital." A new organization called the Board of Associates will replace what was known as the Association.

The Allentown and Sacred Heart Hospital Center will now be known as the Lehigh Valley Hospital Center recognizing its commitment to the region it serves.

A third subsidiary will be a new for-profit company that will provide management services to organizations in the health care field. Details of this subsidiary named HealthEast Management Services Company, will be forthcoming (*see related story, page two*).

The officers elected for the 16-member HealthEast board as follows:

Gene Cesari, Ph.D., chairman of

HealthEast, Inc., is president of Cedar Crest College and joined the Allentown Hospital Board of Directors in 1980. Dr. Cesari received his Bachelor of Arts Degree in English Literature from Dartmouth College and both his Masters Degree in United States History and his Ph.D. degree in History of Technology from the University of Pennsylvania. Prior to arriving in Allentown, Dr. Cesari was Director of Development at Elmira College, New York. He is a member of the editorial advisory board of the American Council on Education and their Business-Higher Education forum. Dr. Cesari recently resigned his position as Second Vice Chairman on the Hospital Board; however, he will continue to serve as a member of the Board.

Reverend Doctor Grant E. Harrity, vice chairman of HealthEast, Inc., has served as pastor of St. John's United Church of Christ since 1961. He holds a Doctor of Divinity Degree from Ursinus College where he earned an undergraduate degree. Dr. Harrity is also a graduate of

Lancaster (Ohio) Theological Seminary. A trustee of Cedar Crest College, Dr. Harrity is a recipient of the Benjamin Rush Award, given annually by the Lehigh County Medical Society for outstanding contributions in the field of health services. He also served as vice president of the Board of Trustees of the Phoebe Home and serves on the Board of Directors of the Allentown Public Library. He is a member of the Allentown Rotary Club and has served on the boards of Public Health Nursing and the Lehigh County Chapter of the American Red Cross. Dr. Harrity resides in Allentown.

Mrs. Valeria S. Boyer, secretary of HealthEast, Inc., became a member of The Allentown Hospital and the Allentown and Sacred Heart Hospital Center boards of directors in 1979. She was acting president of The Allentown Hospital in 1979 and was a leader in the planning of the Allentown and Sacred Heart Hospital Center as well as serving as its

Dr. Cesari: Views on HealthEast

Gene Cesari, Ph.D. has accepted the formidable position as the first chairperson of HealthEast, Inc. Enthusiastic about the new corporation, Dr. Cesari, along with his fellow board members, feels a multihospital system is the way of the future. With the current economic constraints and the search by the health care industry to find increasingly more cost effective ways to operate, Health East has an important task ahead.

Dr. Cesari is particularly enthusiastic about HealthEast's ability to enhance the level of health and health care services in the region, "The Lehigh Valley is uniquely endowed with many diverse assets. Among them is the potential for providing a wide range of health services of the highest order. As is true in higher education, cooperation will make the whole considerably greater than the sum of the parts. I sincerely hope that all interested parties will work together toward the

common goal of improving the quality of life in our region. I know that my fellow board members are committed to this goal and are extremely qualified to insure its fulfillment," he said.

"With the election of officers, the most pressing order of business is the appointment of a chief executive officer," stated Dr. Cesari recently. "A search committee has been chosen and it is chaired by Edward Donley, chairman of the board, Air Products and Chemicals, Inc." This committee will select an executive search firm which will bring forth five or more candidates for the position. Both Darryl R. Lippman, president, The Allentown Hospital, and Ellwyn D. Spiker, administrator, Lehigh Valley Hospital Center, will be considered.

"Concurrently, there is a need for the integration of planning for all elements of HealthEast. You know, it's bigger than two hospitals. We must explore the potentials for

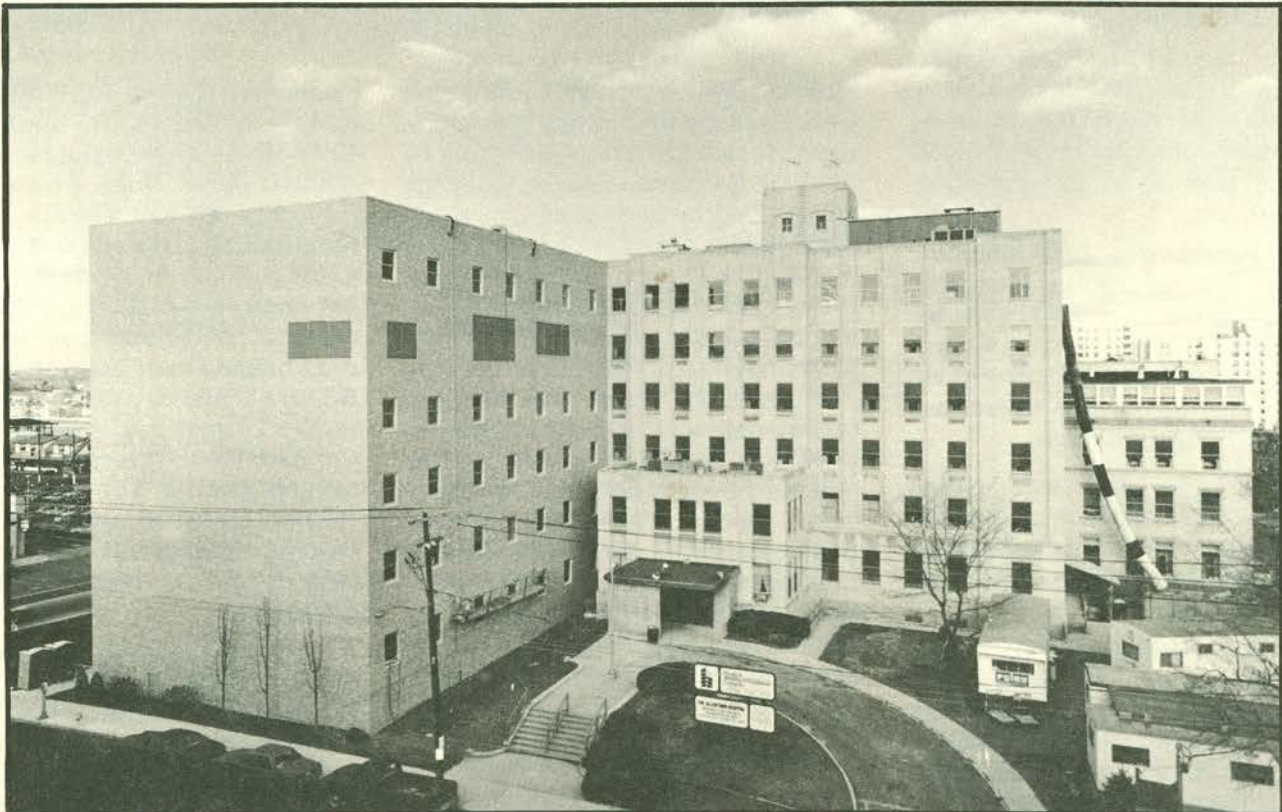
HealthEast itself, as well as its subsidiaries," explained Dr. Cesari.

HealthEast, Inc. has three subsidiaries at this time: The Allentown Hospital, Lehigh Valley Hospital Center and the HealthEast Management Services Company which was formed at one of the initial board meetings.

Several functions are being considered for coordination at the corporate level including finance, fund-raising, planning and public relations.

"A great deal will depend on the person who will be chief executive officer. Neither the structure nor the functions for the chief executive officer have been delineated as yet so decisions on support staff will have to wait," said Cesari.

By the excitement and eagerness expressed by Dr. Cesari, it is evident that HealthEast will be a progressive, forward-thinking health care provider in this region.



Construction Update . . . As the exterior of the new wing at 17th and Chew Streets begins to look complete, the interior is quickly being readied. Occupancy for this wing will begin in May. The Emergency Center addition will open prior to that in April. The Medical-Surgical patient floor addition over the Service Wing is progressing quickly. Its sixth floor, which will be the first to be occupied, is expected to be ready in May, the fifth floor in July and the fourth floor in October, 1983.

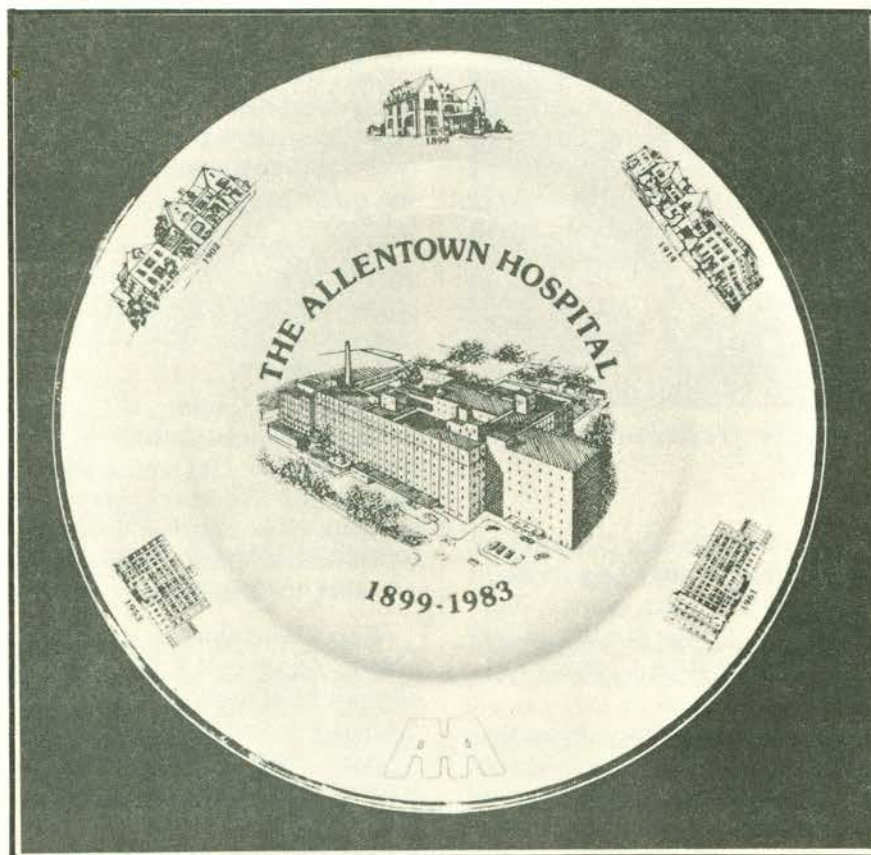
Dr. Idelberger earned her doctorate with an emphasis in planning

A condition of the program is that participants receive partial tuition reimbursement after they are employed at the Hospital part-time for one year.

A new volunteer service has recently been introduced at The Allentown Hospital by Hazel Kramer, Director of Volunteer Services. Called the "Grandparents Program," this pilot service centers around the pediatric department where both Rosemary Christie, R.N., supervisor, and Betty Rothrock, R.N., head nurse, assist Miss Kramer in its supervision.

What type of volunteer is best suited for this job? Someone who is able to work with and enjoys children. The main idea behind the Grandparents Program is cuddling an ill child when the child's parents are not available due to work or transportation problems. They give the needed tender loving care to the patients in pediatrics, and just as

important, this volunteer program makes the volunteer participants feel special, too. The volunteers reinforce the care and love that the nursing staff and other volunteers offer the children. Miss Christie stated, "The nursing staff on pediatrics feels this is a great program. It benefits everyone involved."

Some of the different ways a "grandparent" helps is by rocking infants and toddlers; assisting with feeding; talking, reading and playing games with the older children; and accompanying older children to the playroom and overseeing their activities. The children benefit greatly from this program. They usually become more content, less fearful and happier patients.

Mrs. Jeanette Lavenburg is one

of the volunteers who comes in every week. Since she has worked with children most of her life as a foster parent, she finds her job very rewarding. "It makes me feel that I am doing something very worthwhile," says Mrs. Lavenburg. She especially enjoys holding and helping to feed the babies.

Volunteers receive on-the-job training through the supervisor, head nurse and play therapist, who orient the volunteer to the pediatric floor, hospital policies and procedures. They may also receive other information from books and magazines.

School of Nursing Receives Accreditation

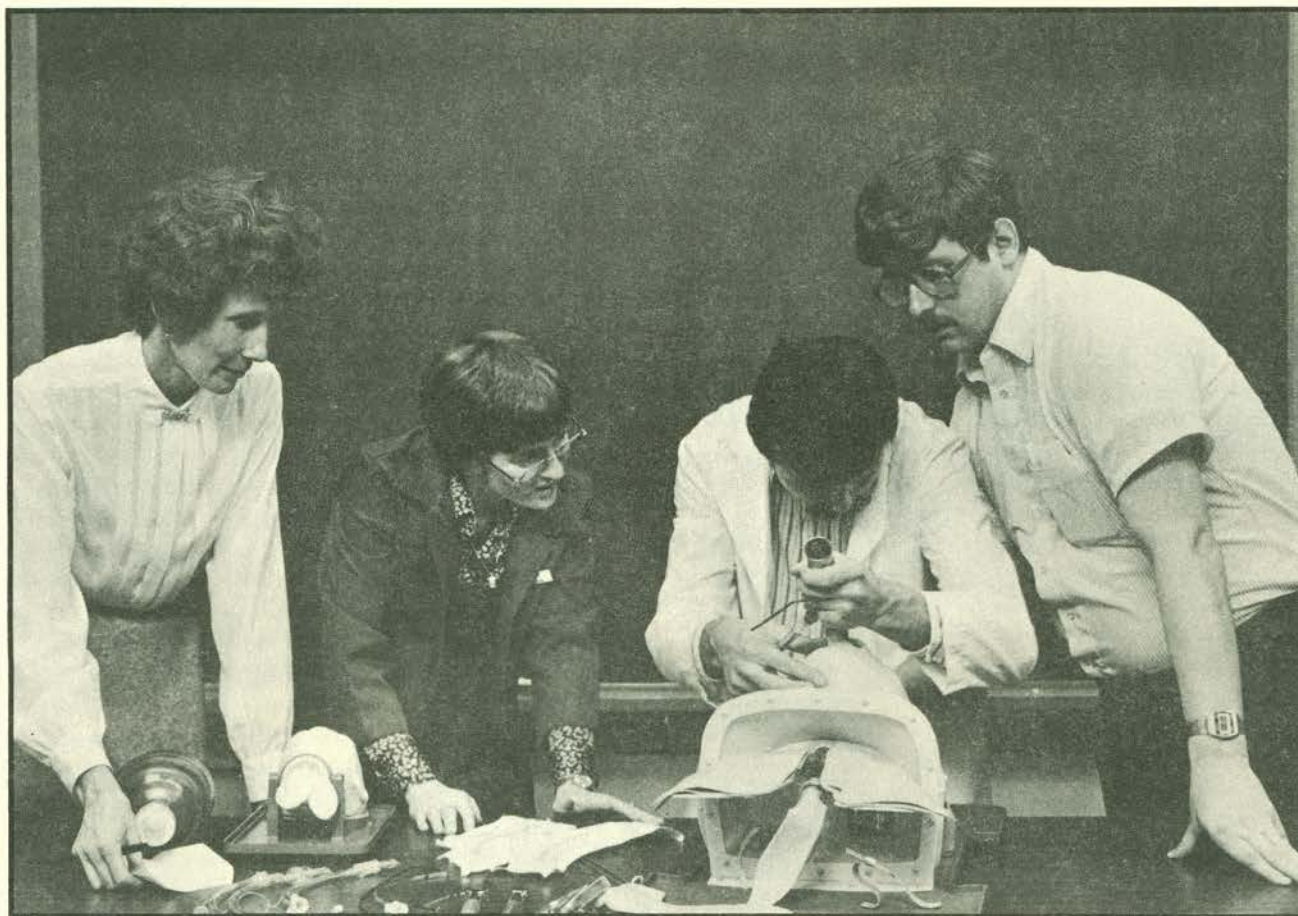
The Allentown Hospital School of Nursing has received accreditation from the Pennsylvania State Board of Nurse Examiners. The Board commended the school for the many strong points in its program, including revision of curriculum, excellent performance on state board examination, strengthening of faculty, and an intensified recruitment program.

This approval means that the three-year diploma program, which consists of classroom theory and actual clinical experience, passed the thorough inspection and will appear on the list of approved professional schools of nursing. The Allentown Hospital School of Nursing is the only hospital-based nursing school in Allentown. Enrollment is currently at 170 students.

The Pennsylvania State Board of Nurse Examiners strives to ensure safe nursing services for the citizens of the Commonwealth by approving educational programs which establish safe standards for the preparation of registered nurses. Further, the Board aims to assure safe standards of nursing practices through examination and licensure of graduates of approved educational programs.

Urologic Oncology: Update 1983 Selected Clinical Aspects

The Comprehensive Community Cancer Center (of The Allentown Hospital and the Lehigh Valley Hospital Center) in cooperation with the Division of Urology, Department of Surgery, is presenting a one-day conference entitled "Urologic Oncology — Selected Clinical Aspects." This conference will be held on Saturday, March 19, 1983 at the Sheraton-Jetport, Allentown and is designed to increase the awareness and knowledge of health care professionals regarding the multidisciplinary management of

genital-urinary cancer.

Three nationally-known specialists will head up the faculty: Mostafa A.A.
