It is my great pleasure to announce Lehigh Valley Health Network's Accountable Care Organization (LVHNACO) has been selected as one of 89 new Medicare Shared Savings Program Accountable Care Organizations (ACOs) across the country. This means we are joining more than 400 other health care organizations serving more than 7 million Medicare beneficiaries as ACOs. These organizations take on medical and financial responsibility for providing comprehensive, well-coordinated care to defined populations of Medicare beneficiaries in order to improve access and quality.

This designation by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) is being announced in a [press statement](#) today. LVHNACO's participation as an ACO in the Medicare Shared Savings Program was effective Jan. 1. Lehigh Valley Health Network (LVHN) is privileged to be able to join this effort to enhance our quality of service to seniors and people with disabilities in our community.

LVHN's participation in this program is consistent with our network's commitment to the triple aim – better health, better care and better cost. Our goal with LVHNACO is to help people live healthier lives, provide the best possible health care experience and make the cost of health care sustainable.

We will update colleagues periodically on developments regarding our ACO as they are implemented going forward. In the interim, those seeking more information should contact Jeff Etchason, MD, senior vice president, health systems research and innovation, who will serve as executive director of LVHNACO. Mark Wendling, MD, medical director, Lehigh Valley Physician Group, will serve as medical director of LVHNACO.

This is an exciting moment for LVHN as we strive to improve the care of the Medicare beneficiaries in our community while adapting to the changes being brought about by the Affordable Care Act (ACA) and other efforts to reform the delivery and financing of health care.

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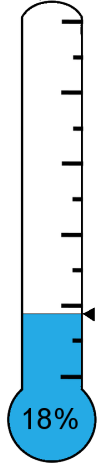
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More Casual Conversations With Dr. Nester Scheduled

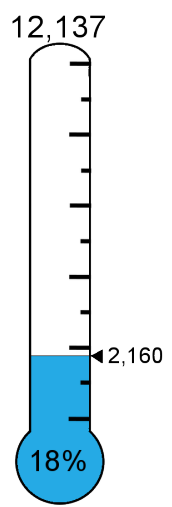
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Pennsylvania Department of Health Announces LVH-Muhlenberg as Ebola Treatment Center

*****This message is from Jim Geiger, Senior VP, Operations*****

The Pennsylvania Department of Health will announce today that Lehigh Valley Hospital-Muhlenberg has been designated as one of Pennsylvania's four official Ebola treatment centers. LVH-Muhlenberg joins the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania, and Penn State Milton S. Hershey Medical Center in this prestigious designation. [The announcement](#) follows a series of comprehensive site visits and inspections from the national Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and Pennsylvania Secretary of Health Michael Wolfe.

Though LVHN has not treated any Ebola Virus Disease (EVD) patient to date and there are no cases at any LVHN facility, EVD remains a serious and highly contagious issue for many worldwide. Back in October, we felt then, as we do now, that we needed to take the necessary precautions to ensure the safety of our patients, our community and for you our colleagues.

As a designated treatment center, LVH-Muhlenberg's specially-outfitted isolation unit may be called upon to accept incoming patients from overseas and to treat and monitor those patients for the duration of their illness. This also means that we must have the proper preparations, protocols and staffing in place in order to treat these patients at a moment's notice.

Even if we never receive a single EVD patient, the hard work and dedication of the core teams and individuals involved with preparing the health network can be translated into other areas for virulent diseases as well. We are prepared to respond, protect and to treat our patients to the highest standards achievable.

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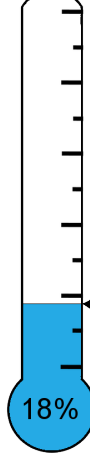
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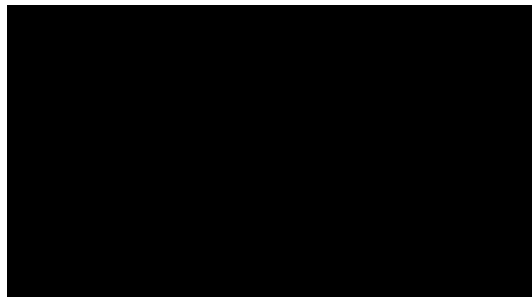

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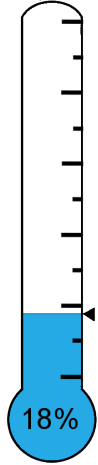
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Our Better Health goal is designed to help you take charge of your health and wellness so you can live the best quality of life possible. It's also an important step to ensure a healthy workforce. That's because staying well through diet, exercise and lifestyle choices can help us do a better job keeping our community healthy too.

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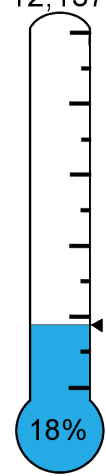
In order to meet our Better Health goal in 2015, 60 percent of colleagues must get screened for blood pressure (BP) and body mass index (BMI) through our Know Your Numbers campaign to meet our target goal (we hope that 70 percent will participate so we can reach our maximum goal). When your BP and BMI are in a healthy range, you're at reduced risk for diseases like diabetes, heart disease, stroke, certain cancers and other health risks.

Help Us Reach Our 'Better Health' Goal!

Many colleagues have already gotten their biometric screenings for blood pressure and body mass index.

When you know your numbers, you can identify your risks early and take action before conditions become chronic. You'll also make our nation healthier and reduce the overall cost of health care in our country – and in our network. After all, Americans spend about 19 cents of every dollar on health care.

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There's still time to [Know Your Numbers](#), win prizes and help us reach our shared success plan goals (SSP).

Here are three ways you can help meet our better health goal by getting screened:

- **Visit employee health** during [walk-in hours](#) for a private, confidential screening.
- **Make an appointment with your personal physician.** Make sure to bring the [biometric health care screening form](#) to your appointment. Your doctor will fill it out, sign it and fax it to employee health.
- **NEW Ask your department head to call 610-402-CARE.** If your department has 16 or more colleagues who've committed to being screened, we'll send a registered nurse to you. All you need is a small area where we can conduct confidential screenings. Encourage your team members to participate. Departmental screenings take place in January and February only.

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LVHN Adding Inpatient Rehabilitation Facility to Lehigh Valley Hospital—Cedar Crest This Summer

This message is from Brian Nester, DO, MBA, FACOEP, president and chief executive officer

I am pleased to announce Lehigh Valley Health Network will be opening an inpatient rehabilitation facility (IRF) for adults 18 years and older this summer in the Kasych Family Pavilion's South Tower at Lehigh Valley Hospital—Cedar Crest. The 34-bed facility will occupy the sixth and seventh floors of the tower, which was expanded last year with the intention of accommodating future growth. All patient rooms in the facility will be private.

This new facility will allow us to continue to address the needs of our community. By providing short-term intensive rehabilitation, we're ensuring a seamless continuum of care for patients without leaving our health network. In addition, having the unit at Lehigh Valley Hospital-Cedar Crest allows patients access to our specialists should any additional medical problems arise.

The admission criteria for the IRF is to provide a minimum of three hours of intensive, specialized rehabilitation therapy per day for an average of two weeks for patients who need such care. People recovering from conditions such as stroke, neurological disorders, orthopedic injuries, amputations, post-surgical conditions or other debilitations are most likely to use this new unit. Our IRF team will strive to help each patient regain function and return to the highest level of independence.

The Transitional Skilled Unit (TSU), which located at Lehigh Valley Hospital-17th Street, will continue to serve patients who require short-term rehabilitation but do not meet the admission criteria for the IRF. Together, the IRF and TSU will provide patients in need of this level of care with the most appropriate intensity of medical, nursing and rehabilitation services for their condition.

Additionally, this new unit is a key component in terms of our health network recently being named a Medicare Accountable Care Organization (ACO). Being an ACO means we will be held accountable for coordinating care provided to more than 32,000 Medicare beneficiaries. Our estimates indicate that 75 percent of the recipients of our inpatient rehabilitation services will be Medicare patients. Our ability to provide these services extends our continuum of care for Medicare patients in the spirit of the ACO.

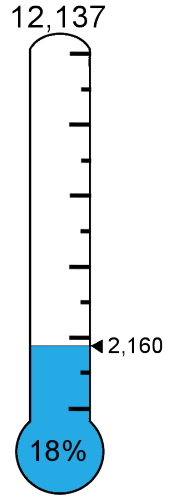
LVHN's multidisciplinary approach to rehabilitation care includes specialized rehabilitation physicians, rehabilitation nurses, and physical, occupational and speech therapists. The inpatient rehabilitation facility is expected to bring more than 125 new jobs to LVHN. All qualified candidates who would like to be considered for those jobs should apply when they are posted at LVHN.org/careers in mid-January.

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Lehigh Valley Health News Digest: Jan. 5 - 9

Joseph Patruno, MD, Named President-elect of LVHN's Medical Staff

Joseph Patruno, MD, comes from a family of educators. His father taught Italian at their hometown institution, Bryn Mawr College. His mother was a high school math teacher. That's why it comes as no surprise to hear Patruno say, "Education is my passion."

Patruno's thirst for knowledge and desire to share it will serve him well as president-elect of Lehigh Valley Health Network's (LVHN) medical staff. He replaces Jarret Patton, MD, who advances to president. During his two-year term as president, Patton will serve as the liaison between the members of our medical staff and the Board of Trustees.

As president-elect, Patruno also becomes the newest member of the board, serving alongside Patton and past medical staff president Robert Motley, MD. How did a person who is passionate about education end up in a leadership role for a health care organization? "I was always interested in health care," Patruno says, "especially the business side of health care early in my career."

After graduating from Dickinson College, Patruno started his career in marketing at one of the nation's largest hospital management companies. There, he helped develop one of the first physician telephone referral services, marketed a plastic surgery practice and recruited physicians. When the thought of earning an MBA entered his mind, Patruno chose another career path instead - medical school.

At Brown University School of Medicine, Patruno became interested in obstetrics and gynecology. "It's a specialty that offers incredible diversity in terms of the care you provide to patients," he says. Patruno completed his residency at Milton S. Hershey Medical Center, where he served four years as medical school clerkship director, one of the first of many leadership roles he would hold throughout his career. "I've always tried to lead by example, to work hard and walk the walk," he says.

That was the case at Christiana Care Health Systems, where Patruno helped establish an obstetrics and gynecology triage unit in one of the busiest ERs in Delaware. As triage director, Patruno focused on workflow, risk management, quality assurance and budgetary issues to ensure the unit was prepared to provide quality care to up to 60 patients each day. During his time at Christiana, Patruno also served as associate residency program director.

In 2005, Patruno joined LVHN as chief of gynecology. Under his leadership, Lehigh Valley Hospital was named one of the nation's best hospitals for gynecology on the 2007 U.S. News & World Report Best Hospitals list. It was the first time we were recognized for this specialty.

In 2008, Patruno was named our residency program director for the department of



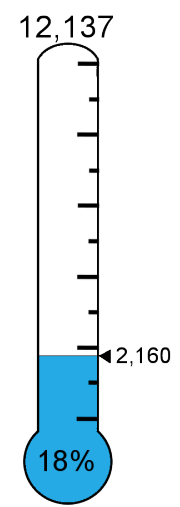
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[obstetrics and gynecology](#), a position he holds today. His passion for education has shined at LVHN. He helped establish a medical education division in our [Center for Women's Medicine](#) and helped develop one of the nation's premier robotic surgery training programs at LVHN.

In his new role, Patruno will tap his passion for education to help our health network achieve the Triple Aim (better health, better care and better cost). He hopes to strengthen our focus on physician credentialing to ensure our medical staff has the skills to meet LVHN's high-quality standards. He also hopes to further the growth of our [SELECT](#) medical school program and entice more students to join our medical staff following graduation.

In his private life, Patruno also is somewhat of an educator. He enjoys coaching his sons, Nick and Danny, in soccer and reinforcing what his daughter, Caroline, learns during singing lessons. Even his wife, Megan, works for an educational institution, Muhlenberg College, where she is assistant athletic director.

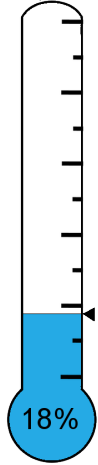

At the meeting you will learn more about the LVHN Epic project and the Wave 2 timeline; get to know who's who among LVHN Epic leadership; and learn what being a super user

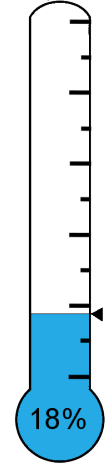
