Nurse Residency Program Receives Accreditation With Distinction from ANCC

On Dec. 6, LVHN's Department of Education was informed by the American Nurses Credentialing Center (ANCC) that its Vizient/AACN Nurse Residency Program™ achieved Accreditation with Distinction through the ANCC Practice Transition Accreditation Program (PTAP)™. Accreditation with Distinction is the highest honor an organization can be awarded and the program now becomes the first ever ANCC accredited Nurse Residency Program in Pennsylvania.

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“After completing a 700-page self-assessment and a virtual visit from ANCC, we were beyond excited to get the news,” says Tiffany Epting MSN, LVHN’s Director of Professional Development. “This Accreditation with Distinction elevates us among the many nurse residency programs in Pennsylvania. ANCC accreditation means our program uses evidence-based criteria and adheres to global standards, thereby serving as a model for other nurse residency programs to emulate.”

Abundant support for new nurses

The Accreditation with Distinction recognition is the culmination of a six-year effort that began in April 2013. As of November 2018, a total of 1,377 nurses have been

enrolled in the program, which now includes seven LVHN hospital campuses. The program's curriculum is designed to instill confidence and understanding in new nurses as they work through the challenges of becoming nurse leaders, clinical decision makers and competent researchers. "We give them a toolkit to help them transition through the first year of nursing practice," Epting says. "They participate in small-group discussions, learn how to effectively engage with other members of the health care team and effectively produce evidence-based practice projects, several of which have changed practice at LVHN." The end result is a highly competent nursing workforce that provides high-quality, safe care for the patients at LVHN that new nurses care for.

A culture of innovation

Another significant program impact is 12-month retention rate. The first year of nursing is when many nurses leave the profession or transfer places of employment. One of the greatest benefits of this program is related to our retention rate. The national retention benchmark is 92.7 percent with the baseline retention rate at LVHN 85 percent. "In fiscal year 2018, we exceeded both benchmarks with a retention rate of 94.9 percent for our nurse residents," Epting says. "Nurses who complete our Nurse Residency Program remain as strong members of our LVHN team."

The Nurse Residency Program at LVHN was made possible with the awarding of a \$1.6 million grant from the Dorothy Rider Pool Health Care Trust in June 2012. To learn more about enrolling in the program, visit the [Nurse Residency Program page](#) on LVHN.org.

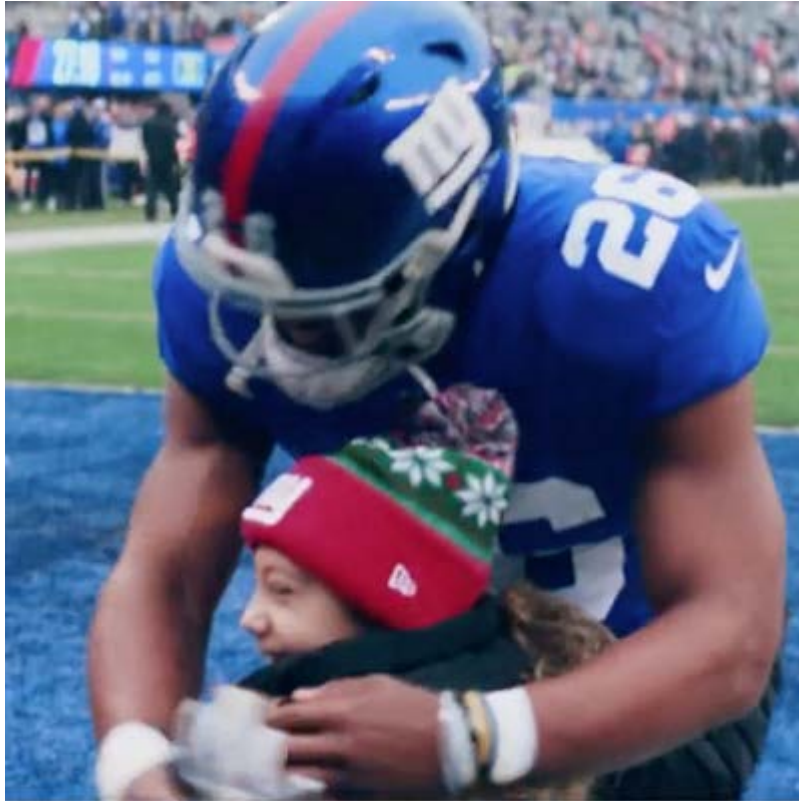
NFL Network Video With Saquon Barkley Includes LVHN – VIDEO

Reuniting to Celebrate a Life Saved

“Sometimes things happen for a reason,” says Lehigh Valley Heart Institute Program Coordinator Bryan Nelson. “In this case, the result was a person’s life was saved.”

Nelson joined members of Schuylkill EMS and officials of Hexcel Corporation, St. Clair, to pay tribute to the quick action of Hexcel employees, EMS providers, and colleagues from LVHN–MedEvac and Lehigh Valley Heart Institute. These teams came together to save the life of 52-year-old Craig Heffner. Schuylkill EMS organized an event to reunite everyone involved.

On Oct. 14, Heffner collapsed during his shift in the St. Clair Industrial Park. Proper training, quick thinking and immediate intervention is credited with saving his life.

Coworker Carol Herb found Heffner down on the production floor. She enlisted the help of colleagues Cara Turner and Bob Steiff, who called 911 and, after finding no pulse or breathing, initiated CPR. Colleague T.J. Boyer then used an automated external defibrillator (AED), a device that delivers an electrical shock to help the heart re-establish an effective rhythm, to revive Heffner.

“It is something we train for,” says Hexcel Corporation Plant Manager Stan Bolinsky. About 60 of Hexcel’s 300 employees volunteered to become CPR-certified and learn to use an AED.

Heffner’s attack came near the end of his shift. “Fifteen minutes later, he might have been all alone and had a different outcome,” Bolinsky says. “This could have been a catastrophe, but instead we are celebrating a life.”

Heffner thanked everyone for quickly coming to his aid. “Thank you all for what you did,” he said during the reunion. “I will never forget it.”

“Employees’ quick action was key in the chain of survival,” says Paramedic Pat Moran, Education and Community Outreach Coordinator for Schuylkill EMS.

“Employees did everything needed so our crew could continue Craig’s care when they arrived on scene.” EMS continued to resuscitate Heffner and prepare him for transport via MedEvac to LVH–Cedar Crest. Moran thanked the Hexcel team for their role in saving Heffner and presented them with special pins that read, “I made CPR count.”
