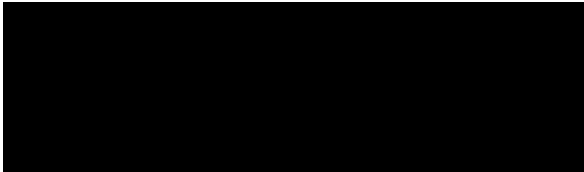


## LVHN to Join Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Alliance

LVHN and Memorial Sloan Kettering (MSK) Cancer Center — the world's oldest and largest private cancer center — announced today the beginning of a unique collaboration aimed at improving LVHN patients' access to the latest and most effective cancer



treatments and highest caliber cancer care. MSK president and chief executive officer (CEO) Craig Thompson, MD, announced that an agreement has been signed for LVHN to join the Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Alliance. The announcement was made in the Cancer Center atrium at LVH–Cedar Crest with numerous physicians and leaders from both organizations in attendance. ***View highlights from Tuesday’s event in the video on the right.***

Established in 2013, the MSK Cancer Alliance is a partnership between Memorial Sloan Kettering and community oncology providers. Its goal is to bring the most current knowledge and advanced cancer care into the community setting. In September 2014, Hartford HealthCare, a multihospital health care system in Connecticut, became MSK’s first alliance member. LVHN will be its second member.

“For more than a century, Memorial Sloan Kettering has been delivering exceptional, patient-focused cancer care and has generated the scientific discoveries necessary to further develop effective new treatments,” Thompson says. “Today, we recognize the need to do more. Central to our mission is eradicating cancer, and through the MSK Cancer Alliance—and in collaboration with Lehigh Valley Health Network—we have a unique opportunity to share our knowledge and best practices with a wider patient population.”

“Memorial Sloan Kettering chose Lehigh Valley Health Network because of our dedication to delivering high-quality, consistent cancer care across the region, and because of the proven expertise of our physicians and medical teams,” says LVHN president and CEO Brian Nester, DO, MBA, FACOEP. “Our collaboration with MSK will save lives by bringing evidence-based, world-class standards to our entire health network.”

### **Fulfilling a vital need in cancer care delivery**

***MSK’s desire to create and grow this alliance is featured in this video.*** It was fueled in part by a 2013 Institute of Medicine report that described the challenges of delivering high-quality cancer care as a “national crisis.” As advances in cancer science are happening at an ever-increasing rate, there is a realization that the adoption of lifesaving breakthroughs in clinical practice takes enormous resources and often too much time. Unfortunately, this is particularly the case in the community setting, where more than 80 percent of cancer care is delivered.

“MSK’s strong desire to rapidly integrate these advances into the community setting will demonstrate real value to MSK and LVHN,” says José Baselga, MD, PhD, physician-in-chief of Memorial Sloan Kettering.

“As knowledge is shared between MSK and LVHN, we will quickly make the latest, most effective cancer treatments available to the people of our community,” says Suresh Nair, MD, director of LVHN’s cancer program. “That’s the bottom line: Providing more hope and better outcomes for our patients.”

## Looking ahead

In the coming months, MSK and LVHN will participate in a mutual process of collaboration and evaluation to determine how the organizations can best work together to improve care for patients and enhance cancer research at both organizations. Once that process is complete and LVHN becomes a member of the MSK Cancer Alliance, here is what will happen:

- Patients will benefit from expanded access to MSK clinical trials, as well as the latest discoveries in cancer research. Almost every important advance in cancer treatment has come as a result of clinical trials. Although LVHN currently offers the most clinical trials in the region, becoming a member of the Alliance will take local cancer research to the next level and give patient even more treatment options.
- LVHN physicians will meet with and discuss their more complex cancer cases with MSK physicians, who have experience in treating different and rare forms of cancers, as well as related blood disorders.
- LVHN physicians will have the opportunity to visit MSK to observe new techniques.
- Both institutions will share educational resources and begin the process of collecting and tracking data on quality of care, outcomes and patient satisfaction.

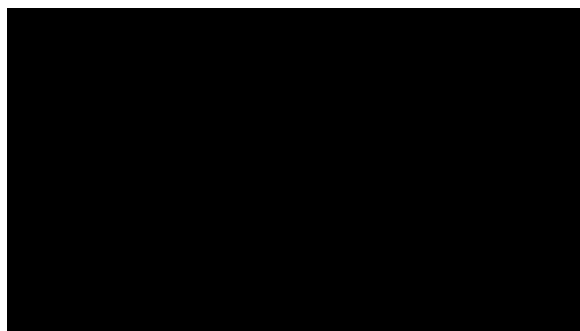
Such unprecedented levels of knowledge sharing – multiplied each time a member joins the MSK Cancer Alliance – will foster the rapid adoption and application of the latest and most effective cancer treatments in our community.

## Access to clinical trials

Central to the MSK Cancer Alliance is the expansion and integration of MSK’s clinical trials program into the Lehigh Valley community and surrounding region. A clinical trial is a type of research study that tests a new medical approach – such as a drug or a combination of drugs – in people to make sure it is safe and effective. With more than 800 clinical trials currently available at its facilities, MSK is leading the nation’s effort in seeking new and better ways to treat the disease. Providing LVHN patients the opportunity to participate in these clinical trials – in addition to the approximately 100 trials already underway at LVHN – will further that mission. Patients will have access to new experimental treatments that may not be available at other community hospitals for up to five years.

## LVHN’s story comes full circle

***In August 1966, Dorothy Rider Pool of Allentown was diagnosed with lung cancer. Her local doctor referred her to Memorial Sloan Kettering. Watch this video to see how Dorothy and her husband, Leonard Pool, met first-year resident Dr. Larry Levitt.*** A lasting bond was created that years later led Levitt to Allentown, where he became Lehigh Valley Hospital’s first full-time neurologist. While Dorothy sadly lost her battle with cancer, the experience of having to travel to New York City for the best possible care inspired and motivated Mr. Pool to envision a “superior regional hospital” in the Lehigh Valley. Nearly 50 years later, his vision has become a reality through what today is known as Lehigh Valley



Hospital—Cedar Crest, a hospital on [U.S. News & World Report's Best Hospitals list](#) for 20 consecutive years. Today's announcement brings this special story full circle.

Mr. Pool's vision is supported today by the [Dorothy Rider Pool Health Care Trust](#). Established by Mr. Pool, the trust serves as a resource that enables LVHN to improve the health of the citizens of the region it serves.

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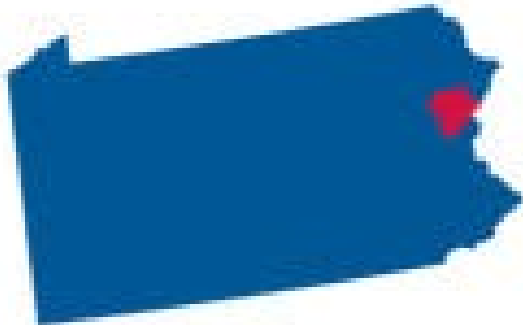

Early this morning, LVHN successfully implemented Wave 2 Go-Live of the Epic electronic medical record system at four of our hospital locations: LVH–Cedar Crest, LVH–17th Street, LVH–Muhlenberg and LVHN–Tilghman. Additionally, several hospital-based ancillary services such as the emergency department, pharmacy, radiology and clinical nutrition also went-live today with Epic. We thank and congratulate everyone involved with bringing Epic to LVHN. After more than five years of preparation, this network has successfully implemented two Epic Go-Lives in the space of five-and-half months. We thank you for helping us achieve such successful milestones in 2015.

Beginning today, not only do our ambulatory practices and sites utilize **one chart for one patient**, so do our hospitals. As you speak with patients and their family members about Epic, you can let them know that this secure system not only helps their health care providers communicate and better coordinate patient care, it also provides patients with a straight-forward way to view their own personal health information through **MyLVHN** (<https://www.mylvhn.org/>), the patient portal.

Again, thank you for your commitment as we launch a new era in electronic medical records at LVHN. The Epic transformation will help us do more for our patients by improving continuity of care across the LVHN and LVPG.

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**Cutover**

July 31, 2015; 6:12 a.m.

Happy Cutover Day! An important phase of Go-Live is cutover, a process that ensures current in-patient information from July 31 into August 1 is replicated in Epic. This process began at 6 a.m. this morning. As patients are admitted, transferred and discharges their information will be entered in both Centricity Enterprise (CE) and in Epic. That step kicks off a whole day's worth of cutover activities:

**Beginning at 8 a.m. -**

- Pharmacy will enter all of the medications, verify allergies and enter the patient's height and weight into Epic. They will work sequentially through the units.
- Nursing will enter all non-medication orders, the treatment team (provider and non-provider consults) and code orders into Epic. Upon completion of the initial set of orders, hourly reports of changes to these orders will also be entered throughout the day. It is anticipated that by 9:00 p.m., we will enter all orders into Epic within an hour of being written.

**Beginning at 6 p.m. -**

- The Epic team will begin swapping out equipment in several areas including NICU and the ORs. This equipment will allow the Epic interfaces to work.

**Approximately 11 p.m. -**

- A message will be sent to all colleagues (via email, call em all, Epic intranet) that current (soon to be legacy) electronic medical record systems will be going on downtime at 11:30 p.m. Be sure you and your colleagues know your downtime procedures and have the forms you need.

**At 11:30 p.m. -**

- No further CE logins permitted.

**At 11:45 p.m. -**

- All CE users outside of those on the cutover team will be forced out of the system.

**August 1 - Wave 2 Go-Live!**

12:01 a.m. -

- Systems (CE and other legacy medical record systems) and current interfaces are shutdown. Downtime procedures are in place and must be followed for continuity of care.

**From 12:01 a.m. to approximately 4 a.m. -**

- LVHN Epic project team and LVHN operations will turn on and test interfaces. They will also test Epic to make sure that patient information is correct and that the system is functional. This process will take a few hours. Last step: final verification of census will be done and then Epic will be 'live.'

1:30 a.m. -

- CE will come up in read-only mode

**Approximately 4 a.m. -**

- LVHN Epic team will send a message to all colleagues that Epic is 'live.' Communication will go out via email, call em all and the Epic intranet. Please remember that this is dependent on many factors. If the Go-Live time changes, you will receive a communication from the LVHN Epic team.

The Epic team would like to thank all of those who are involved in cutover. This requires a very precise coordinated team effort. Your engagement and participation is greatly appreciated.

**August 8, 2015 12:00 am**

Updates to the Epic System – **Saturday August 8, 10 p.m.**, the Epic project team will implement a fix package into Epic production. This fix will use the pause method. **This specific pause will last approximately 1 minute.** As soon as the update is complete, you can resume work as normal. Thank you for your patience as we improve our system.

One of the features of the Epic system is the ability to implement certain updates and fixes using a “pause” method. This function allows us to update the system without taking a traditional downtime. During the pause, Hyperspace will turn gray and a message will present on the screen advising that the system is being updated.

These updates generally take only a few minutes to complete, at which time the message will disappear and work can resume as normal. Users do not need to exit Hyperspace during the Pause and any work in flight will be saved and held during the process.

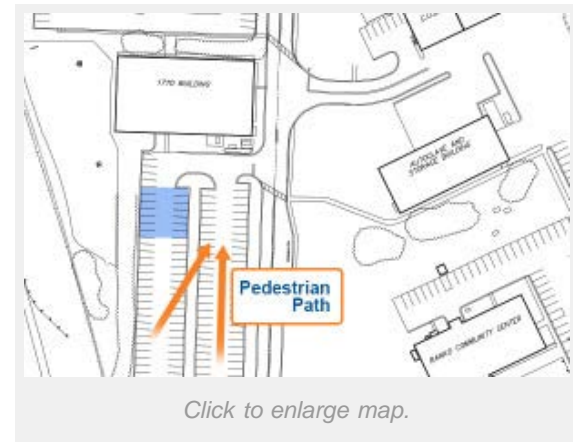
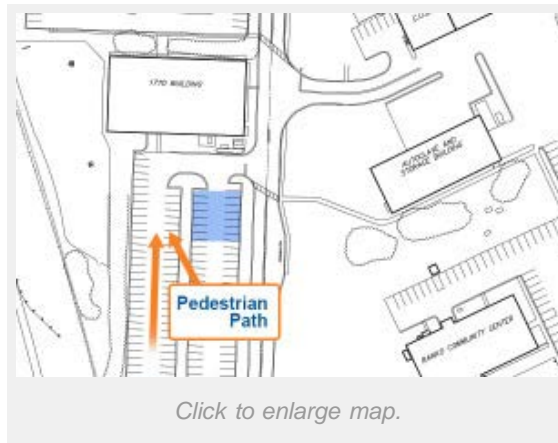
## Construction Project Will Affect LVH–Muhlenberg’s 1770 Building Parking Lot Area Aug. 10-31

Parking and access around the 1770 building on the LVH–Muhlenberg campus will be affected throughout most of August while a 24-inch storm pipe from the retention basin along Route 378 is being installed across the parking lot south of the building.

The project will begin Aug. 10 and is expected to be across Bathgate Road Aug. 31. The following restrictions will take place over that period:

- The 14



parking spots on the north side of the parking lot closest to the 1770 building entrance will be unavailable Aug. 10 through Aug. 14 while the pipe is installed across the first section of the lot.

- An additional four parking spots on the south side of the parking lot next to the grass island, again close to the entrance, will be unavailable
- Aug. 14 to allow for an excavator to dig across the island.
- Pedestrians should use the south side of the parking lot during this initial stage of the project. Security staff will be stationed in the area.
- Pipe installation will take place on the south side of the parking lot from Aug. 17 through 21. During this period, the 10 spaces on the south side of the lot closest to the building entrance will be unavailable as the pipe installation continues.
- Pedestrians should use the north side of the parking lot during this second stage of the project. Security staff will be stationed in the area.
- The project continues across Bathgate Road in the vicinity of the 1770 building Aug. 28-31. On Aug. 28, the north lane of Bathgate Road will be closed. Signs and flagmen will be in place for traffic control. Please slow down when traveling in this area for safety of all.
- Bathgate Road in the vicinity of the 1770 building will be closed entirely Aug. 29. Car traffic will be routed through the 1770 parking lot. Truck traffic (primarily tractor trailers and other larger trucks) must utilize the north entrance from Schoenersville Road.
- On Aug. 31, the south lane of Bathgate Road in the vicinity of the 1770 building will be closed as the pipe installation project is completed. Traffic control will be in place, but please slow down when traveling in this area.

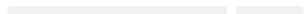

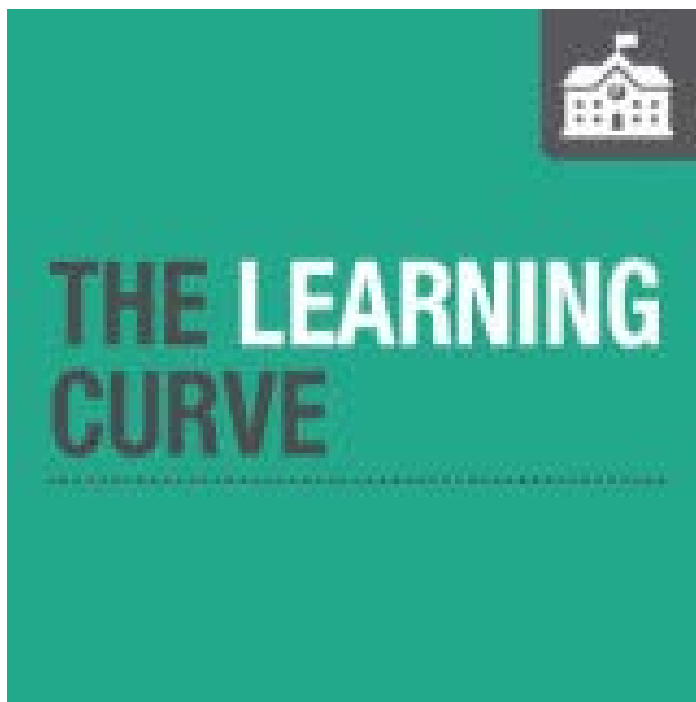

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## New Letters Brighten Entranceway at LVH–17th Street; Coming Soon to LVH–Cedar Crest

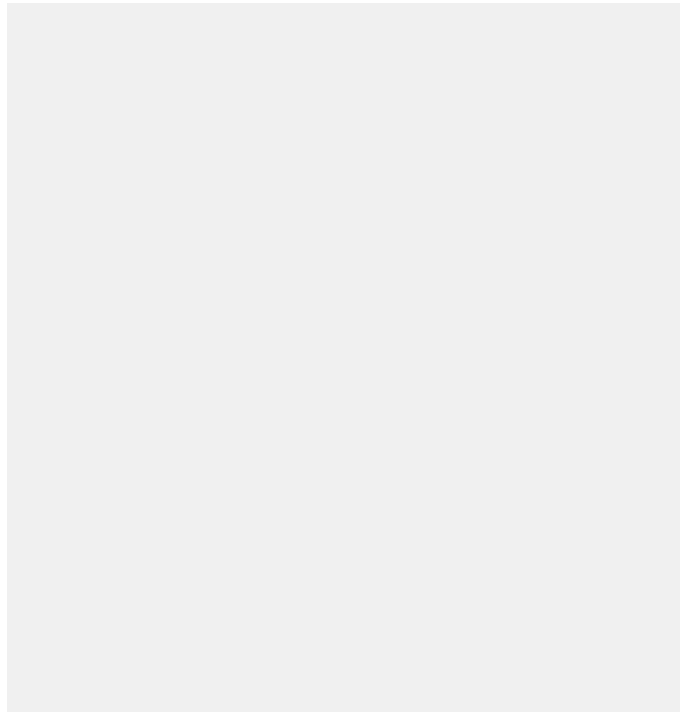

If you walk into (or drive by) LVH–17<sup>th</sup> Street on Friday, you'll notice a different look to the front entrance.

That's because later tonight (Thursday, August 6), crews will be removing the existing letters that spell "Lehigh Valley Hospital" from atop the canopy at the front entrance. In their place will be new, taller letters that will be brighter, more visible, more energy efficient and will better reflect our health network's brand.

In about two weeks, a similar project will take place at the main entrance of LVH–Cedar Crest.

The new Lehigh Valley Hospital letters, designed and installed by Reed Sign Company of Pennsburg, will make the signage at those two hospital entranceways consistent with other signage on both campuses. That
