HOW A NOT-FOR-PROFIT ORGANIZATION DETERMINES COMMUNITY BENEFIT

The not-for-profit entities of Lehigh Valley Health Network qualify as charitable organizations under Pennsylvania Act 55.

The Act sets specific criteria for what constitutes a charitable organization, defines the uncompensated goods and services that qualify as community benefit, and prescribes how these goods and services are measured.

Includes research in areas such as neurology, oncology and family medicine that are not grant funded.	
HEALTH PROFESSIONAL AND STUDENT EDUCATION	548,590
Includes education provided at Lehigh Valley Hospital–Hazleton, Lehigh Valley Hospital–Schuylkill and Lehigh Valley Hospital–Pocono.
