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BRITISH PHYSICIAN TO VISIT

JOHN C. GOLIGHER, M.D., C.H.B., Ch.M., Professor and Chairman of the Department of Surgery, University of Leeds, England, will be visiting and lecturing as a guest of the Department of Surgery.

Dr. Goligher, whose area of interest is Colo-Rectal Surgery, will speak on "Selective Vagotomy of Peptic Ulcer Disease" on Friday, December 9, at 12:00 Noon, and on "Inflammatory Disease of the Bowel" on Saturday, December 10, at 8:00 A.M., in the Hospital Center auditorium.

Dr. Goligher has contributed to books and medical journals, primarily on the subject of gastric, colonic and rectal surgery. Also, his publication, "Surgery of the Anus, Rectum and Colon," is in its 3rd edition.

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A BURN SEMINAR for Emergency Medical Personnel will be held on Saturday, December 10, 1977, in the Hospital Center auditorium, starting at 10:00 A.M.

Aimed at pre-hospital Basic Life Support treatment and care of various types of burn patients, the seminar is being organized by the Eastern Pennsylvania Emergency Medical Services Council, Allentown, Pennsylvania.

Hospital Center personnel lecturing at the seminar are Walter J. Okunski, M.D., Director of the Burn Unit; and Eric Bakow, R.R.T., Assistant Technical Director of Respiratory Therapy. Dr. Okunski will be speaking on Emergency Care of the Burn Patient, and Mr. Bakow's topic will be "Smoke Inhalation, Respiratory Burns, and Carbon Monoxide Poisoning."

Also included on the agenda will be discussions by Ms. Julia Witmer, Pennsylvania Départment of Emergency Health Services, and Corporal Morris Demsko, Pennsylvania State Police, on availability, access and use of Pennsylvania State Police helicopters for emergency transport or transfer of critically ill or injured patients to Burn Units or Burn Center facilities.


HOUSE STAFF "PLASTERS" ASHMEN


