### Spectrum Answers Employees' Questions

Since Spectrum Administrators began processing employees' health claims in January, two questions have been repeatedly asked. They are: "Did you receive my claim from Prudential?" and "What is the birthday rule and does our plan follow it?"

The first question is sometimes difficult to answer. Prudential has sent Spectrum over 1,000 claims. These are claims received by Prudential after Dec. 31, the date their agreement with HealthEast was terminated. Spectrum staff members are logging these claims into computers and processing them as quickly as possible. However, since Spectrum is also receiving over 200 new claims a day, they still haven't been able to enter all the Prudential claims. Your patience and understanding are appreciated. Spectrum Administrators has bired additional staff to help process the claims more quickly to overcome any delays. If you have any questions about a particular claim, please call ext. 9810 for a status report.

Answers to the second question regarding the birthday rule are easier to supply. This rules states that the plan of the parent whose birthday falls earlier in the year is the primary plan for the children. That means if your birthday falls in January, and your spouse's falls in March, your plan is primary.

There is another, older rule, however, that handles coordination of benefits differently. This rule states the father's plan is always primary provided the parents are still married. This is the rule the HealthEast plan follows. Confusion arises when each parent's plan follows a different rule. If this is your situation, the plan that follows the gender rule, or our plan, is the one that determines which parent is primary.

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# New Parking Plan At TAH

Effective midnight, Sunday evening, April 4, The Allentown Hospital campus will implement a new parking plan.

There will be an increased shortage of spaces as a result of the Community Ambulatory Care Center construction and increased outpatient activity, as well as a growing population of employees.

In order to accommodate all groups to the greatest extent possible, the following plan will be implemented.

- All day shift employees will be randomly assigned a lot and provided with an access card to that lot.
   Cards were distributed with paychecks March 31.
- Evening shift employees and physi-

- cians and residents will be assigned to Lot #1 (the so-called 3-11 lot next to the bank).
- Night shift will be assigned to the Allentown Medical Office Building lot. Access is strictly limited and enforced for 10:30 p.m. to 7:30 a.m. use only.
- Lot #2 will not be gated; it will be used for (a) volunteers; (b) patient and visitor overflow; (c) high occupancy vehicles (car pools consisting of two or more employees); (d) overflow, when spaces are not available for employees.

Therefore, beginning April 4, you will need, depending upon the shift you work:

 An access card, unless you work night shift

- A map of parking lots
- To have filled in a form with a description of your vehicle. (The above items will be distributed with paychecks.)

If you have not received a card and require one, or you are having a parking problem, please call the Parking Hotline at 778-2985.

Employees, physicians and volunteers must be aware that problems are anticipated. Efforts are under way to create other parking lots. As soon as these developments materialize, a further update will be issued. The Parking Hotline is there to respond to questions and concerns and to handle any problems that might arise. Your continued cooperation is greatly appreciated.

#### LVHC Updates Information System

This information is available to all ancillary departments, nursing units, and physicians' offices that have approved access. Viewing of these reports can be obtained on the H.I.S. prior to the placement of the paper chart copy, thus eliminating information delays. The reports remain on the H.I.S. for 48 hours.

# After The Merger...

From the beginning...Two department heads at TAH—LVHC who can offer some valuable pointers about the benefits of merging are Callie McClatchy, M.S., CCC/SPL, and Bill Tunke, OTR/L. The directors of Speech Therapy and Occupational Therapy respectively, their departments were established from inception to serve both facilities.

The advantages of consolidation far outweigh the inconveniences, says McClatchy.

"Serving two sites, you have more resources and experiences of which to take advantage. The variety in caseloads adds to the scope of the job," she continues.

"Being a small department, we can take advantage of what each facility has to offer. It is different at each place - different people, different contacts; but under it all, there is a sense of cohesiveness, not an 'us-and-them' attitude."

"It is only four miles" is the motto that Tunke has lived by since December 1985 when he started the Occupational Therapy department at The Allentown Hospital and Lehigh Valley Hospital Center. As OT's director, Tunke has spent many hours commuting between sites and has found value in this time on the road.

"Traveling between LVHC and TAH gives you 15-20 minutes of 'think time' to prepare yourself for your next appointment. Being somewhere between the two hospitals enhances your objectivity, too," says Tunke, "You develop a global perspective."

Physical separation of the two OT locations has spawned a number of site-specific specialties, he adds.

"At LVHC we've developed acute head trauma and burn-related programs. Recently at TAH, carpal tunnel therapy - which we began two years ago - has become more formalized and now includes self-help and prevention aspects."

For both the manager and hospital operations, consolidation means potential benefits. What then is the payoff to staff employees?

Tunke predicts his therapists will one day be able to alternate between hospital sites more easily, taking advantage of the differences in both environment and experience.

This spring the Community Health Division of The Allentown Hospital—Lehigh Valley Hospital Center will launch "Healthier U.," a community-based health promotion program directed by Karen Clemence, community wellness coordinator.


