

POOL TRUST

At the last two Board meetings, the following programs were approved for funding by the Dorothy Rider Pool Health Care Trust:

1) Emergency Medical Technician-Paramedic Training Program—prepares local ambulance EMT's for certification by training in Advanced Life Support techniques (I.V. therapy, drug administration, endotracheal intubation, defibrillation, EKG interpretation). Program sponsored by the Lehigh Emergency Services Training Institute at Sacred Heart Hospital under the direction of George Moerkirk, M.D.

2) Lehigh Valley Poison Center—programs to inform the public and medical profession of the dangers of poisons and the nature of poison prevention and treatment services to members of hospital poison treatment centers (Allentown Hospital Association, Sacred Heart Hospital, Allentown and Sacred Heart Hospital Center, Allentown Osteopathic Hospital, Pocono Hospital, Grand View Hospital) will be expanded.

3) Elderly Housing and Health Needs Study—Jointly sponsored by the Allentown and Sacred Heart Hospital Center and Lehigh County, the 8-month study will identify program options which the County, A&SHHC, or other public and private organizations could implement.

4) Full Time Psychosocial Worker—under the supervision of David Prager, M.D., to be employed by the Allentown Hemophilia Treatment Center. The psychosocial worker will coordinate counseling, education and therapy services for 95 hemophiliacs and their families registered with the Center located at Allentown Hospital.

WHY RISK MANAGEMENT?

Ask any hospital administrator or physician about their biggest headache, and most of them will comment "malpractice."

In 1976 alone, malpractice claims totaled more than \$1 billion; 80% of that amount was against hospitals.

New technology, more high risk procedures, a more concerned, educated public and pressures from legislators have made the art of anticipating and reducing potential "people failures"—risk management—a tough job. But, with the advent of the risk manager, prevention of incidents, improved quality of patient care, hospital liability and insurance premiums stability and reduction is possible.

Specifically, the risk manager plans, organizes, directs and controls the resources necessary to achieve the objectives of the hospital's risk management program.

Here at the Hospital Center, some of the new risk manager's duties include: monitoring activities pertinent to patient care which tend to increase or decrease institutional liability; reveiwing hospital indicents for professional and public liability and claim potential; investigating any incidents that could result in a claim, obtaining and coordinating all information regarding judical matters; reviewing data and reports of inspections of the physical plant; keeping departments and committees informed of changes in legislation, regulations and insurance; and importantly, assisting in the developing of a risk management education program as part of employee, resident and physician orientation and continuing education.

Optimally, risk management becomes the management tool which ensures sensitivity to the health care systems potential for improving quality care, and for opening lines of communication between management and medical staff members to achieve that goal.
