STROKE TAPE, "ON CALL" SPECIAL HONORED NATIONALLY

Two special programs, produced by the Hospital Center's Television Department, have received nationwide attention recently.

"It Happened to Me" won an "Award of Merit" for Producer Paul Dowling of the Television Department, Writer James E. Higgins, Jr., Public Relations, and Director Lou Carramella, of Air Products and Chemicals, Inc.

The stroke prevention and education videotape won the award in the Medical/Health Category at the International Television Association Awards Banquet in Dallas, Texas, on March 30, 1979. According to Producer Paul Dowling, it was the first time an organization won a major award with its first entry during its first year of membership in the ITVA.

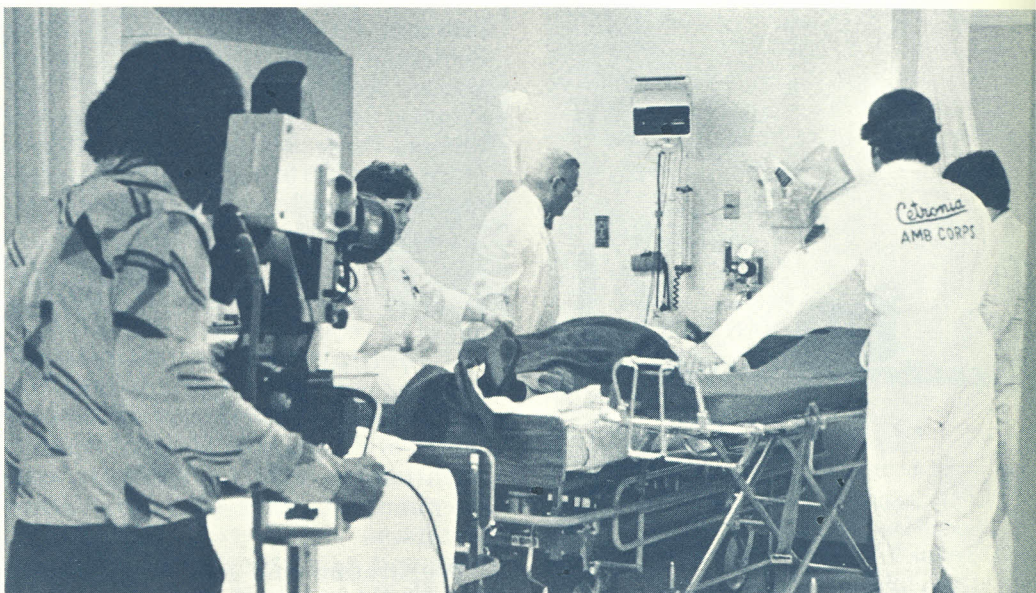

The scholastic competition between 21 Pennsylvania and Delaware schools of Medical Technology was held at Seven Springs Resort, Champion, Pennsylvania.

Workshops, seminars and manufacturer exhibits were also featured at the 4-day event.

The students, disqualified on a technical error, may be able to advance to Regional Competition in Philadelphia. National competition is in Las Vegas, Nevada, and is sponsored by the American Society of Medical Technologists.

NURSING I.V. STUDY PRESENTED

"A Clinical Overview Study of Infusion Phlebitis," by Mary Ellen Beideman, R.N., Infection Control Nurse, Ann Herman, R.N., 5B, Sue Peeples, R.N., Head Nurse, 4A, and Thelma Terry, R.N., has been featured in the March, 1979 issue of the American Journal of Intravenous Therapy.

The article is the result of investigation which suggested that occurrences of infusion phlebitis might be reduced by shorter periods of IV therapy, daily changes of dressings, avoidance of the hand for venipuncture, selection of alternative routes of drug administration, special attention to IV's in patients with infections at other sites, and other factors.

Preparation and method of study, conclusions, recommendations and follow-up action are all detailed in the article.

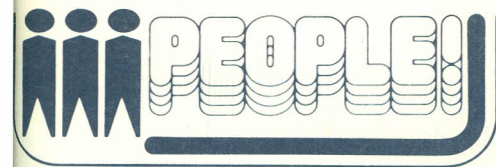
