## HOSPITAL FAIR TERMINATED

The Bazaar in Lehigh Valley Hall Under the Auspices of the Ladies' Auxiliary Came to a Close on Saturday Evening When There Was Another Big Attendance—Handsome Prizes Awarded.

The hospital bazaar closed a most successful week on Saturday night with an attendance, which fully equalled the phenomenal attendance of Thursday evening. The booths were entirely sold out at an early hour, a few articles in the King's Daughters' booth alone remaining. The afternoon was Children's Day, and large crowds of youngsters enjoyed themselves in the hall.

The ladies of the Auxiliary were highly pleased with the success of the bazaar, but, tired in body and spirit, were really rejoiced when the win-lup came.

Various donations were made to the booths for Saturday such as 500 carnations to the flower booth from E. N. Kroninger; a large white and gold vase, a bust and a lot of miscellaneous articles for the fish pond, Mrs. Robert Iredell; three large stone water jugs from Mr. Silberstein; 100 boxes of biscuits from the National Biscuit Company. The 150 carnations which were announced on Saturday to have been received from Albert Yeager, were donated by Andrew Yeager.

These prizes were drawn in the fish pond during the afternoon: Moquette rug, from Shimer, Laub & Weaver, by Helen Ochs; tobacco jar, from E. H. Wetherhold, by Henry Yingling; reed tabourette, from C.
