I am pleased to announce that effective today Coordinated Health is now part of Lehigh Valley Health Network (LVHN).

Coordinated Health (CH) is a hospital and health network with 22 locations throughout the Lehigh Valley, northeastern Pennsylvania and western New Jersey. CH employs more than 1,200 highly skilled personnel working in outpatient offices, two hospitals and two Ambulatory Surgery Centers.

Together, LVHN and CH offer the communities we serve the following:

- The highest orthopedic success rates in the region
- The most fellowship-trained orthopedic sports medicine specialists, caring for

everyone from pee-wee players to Division I and pro athletes with unmatched expertise

- CH established the first sports medicine program in the region, and CH sports medicine physicians dedicate more than 1,000 hours annually to “on-field” coverage, providing injured athletes the fastest access to the best care.
- Lehigh Valley Hospital-Cedar Crest is the community’s only nationally ranked hospital in orthopedics on U.S. News & World Report’s “Best Hospitals” list.
- LVHN has been recognized for having the lowest complication rates in the state for knee and hip replacements by the Hospital and Healthsystem Association of Pennsylvania (HAP).
- For 30 years, CH has been a regional leader in orthopedics, sports medicine and workplace injury care in the Lehigh Valley and consistently ranks in the top 5 percent nationally for joint replacements and spinal fusion by Healthgrades.

CH patients will continue to see the same Coordinated Health physicians and care teams in the same locations. Current CH offices and hospitals will continue normal operations with no immediate changes to the great service and access patients are accustomed to receiving at CH and LVHN. While it will take time to complete a comprehensive integration plan, our focus remains on providing innovative orthopedic care, superior access and great service to the community. The first visible signs of the integration will be new signage and marketing materials that communicate Coordinated Health is now part of Lehigh Valley Health Network. In the future, we will streamline care and communication with one electronic medical record through Epic.

Amy Nyberg will lead CH, serving as President. Since 2013, Amy has been leading CH’s innovation and growth strategy, first as Chief Integration Officer and most recently as President and Chief Operating Officer. Amy will initially report to Thomas Marchozzi, LVHN’s Executive Vice President

and Chief Financial Officer.

Emil Dilorio, MD, founder of Coordinated Health, is leaving CH. He thanks patients and members of the CH team for their trust and numerous contributions in making a difference in the lives of so many.

How this announcement affects the LVHN Health Plan

- With the 2019 benefit year concluding in less than two weeks, in accordance with the 2019 LVHN Health Plan benefit design, care with Coordinated Health providers will continue to be excluded from coverage through Dec. 31, 2019.
- Effective Jan. 1, 2020, Coordinated Health providers will become participating providers under the LVHN Health Plan, with services covered at the Tier 1 (highest) benefit level.
- Members are encouraged to always rely on the provider directory published on [MyPopulytics.com](https://www.mypopulytics.com) whenever they are seeking care with a physician or facility to ensure they know the provider's participation status under the Plan as it may impact the benefit payable. The active directory is affirmed daily.
- [MyPopulytics.com](https://www.mypopulytics.com) is also a convenient self-service portal when members are seeking coverage and benefit information, deductible status, claim status and history, and it allows for secure, 24/7 email communication with a Populytics member service representative. LVH–Cedar Crest Receives ‘Top Teaching Hospital’ Designation

On the heels of receiving an ‘A’ grade for quality and patient safety, LVH–Cedar Crest received a ‘Top Teaching Hospital’ Designation also from The Leapfrog Group.

[The Leapfrog Group](#) is a national watchdog organization of employers and other purchasers focused on health care safety and quality. This designation is given to the highest performing hospitals on the Leapfrog Hospital Survey.

About 2,100 hospitals were considered for the award. This year, 56 teaching hospitals received this honor, including four Pennsylvania hospitals.

“We are pleased to recognize LVH–Cedar Crest as a 2019 Leapfrog Top Hospital,” said Leah Binder, President and CEO of The Leapfrog Group. “This demonstrates extraordinary dedication to patients and to the Lehigh Valley community. We congratulate the board, staff and clinicians whose efforts made this honor possible and know they share pride in this achievement.”

Performance across many areas of hospital care is considered in establishing the qualifications for the award, including infection rates, practices for safer surgery, maternity care, and the hospital’s capacity to prevent medication errors. The rigorous standards are defined in each year’s [Top Hospital Methodology](#). Top Hospital awards are categorized into four groups: children’s hospitals, general hospitals, rural hospitals and teaching hospitals.

“Providing safe, high-quality care is the foundation to everything we do, and it’s the level of care people expect and deserve,” says Matt McCambridge, MD, LVHN’s Chief Quality and Patient Safety Officer. “This designation is a result of the hard

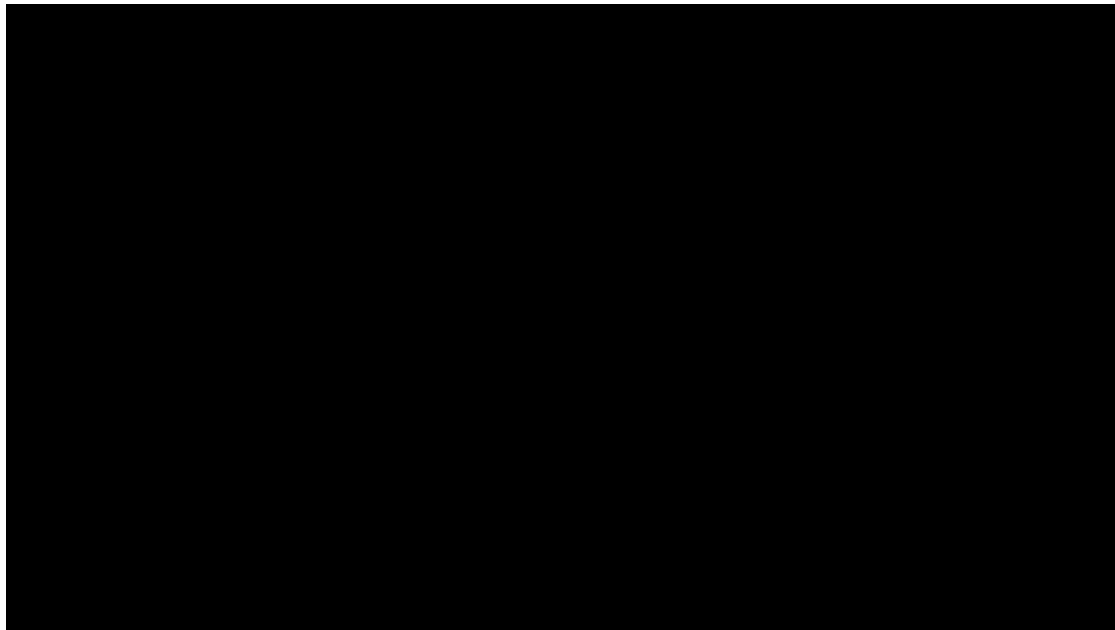
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Meet Victoria

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To ease stress, colleagues at LVPG Pediatrics–Pond Road came up with a “dynamic” plan to lift the anxiety weight off pediatric patients and their parents/guardians.

By integrating a “heroic” theme, the practice transformed their flu clinics into a headquarters for “superheroes.” Practice colleagues dressed up in costumes and

pediatric patients received flu shots that would help them get “superpowers” and champion good health.

Courageous pediatric patients got to pick from a variety of superhero Band-Aids, play with photo props, stand before colorful backdrops and celebrate with party decorations.

LVPG Pediatrics–Pond Road is one of the largest pediatric offices, caring for more than 8,000 patients. Supporting this practice are five providers, a lactation specialist, and 16 clinical/clerical members who work collaboratively every day to enhance pediatric health across the region.

Kelly Dalius, Clinical Educator, understands the exemplary effort it took to make a potential high stress situation relaxed and fun for everyone. That’s why she nominated this practice for LVPG’s December Practice of the Month.

Parents and pediatric patients really enjoyed the superhero setting and took turns getting their children pictures with the staff and props. “Children seemed mostly surprised as they stepped off the elevator and encountered decorations that awaited them,” says Melissa Martinez, RN, Clinical Coordinator. “Fear quickly turned to excitement in their faces as they almost forgot what they were at the office for. Parents seemed to very much appreciate the time and effort put forth by the staff. Staff engagement and participation were definitely key to the success of #TeamPondRoad’s flu clinics.”

Susan Gross is DAISY Nurse Leader Award Recipient

Susan Gross, MHA, BSN, was presented with the DAISY Nurse Leader Award during Nursing Research Day. Gross serves as the director of 7K at LVH–Cedar Crest.

Nurse leaders create the environment for staff to provide the compassionate, high-quality care our patients expect and deserve. Nursing communication is a key driver for patient experience performance. In March and August

2019, 7K was celebrated as the unit with “most improved” HCAHPS scores. Gross empowered staff as they committed to consistent hourly rounding and bedside shift reporting, practices that have proven to positively impact patient experience.

Gross is vigilant about quality improvement. With a focus on preventing falls and pressure ulcers, Gross works closely with unit champions to ensure staff is engaged and owns quality improvement initiatives. In 2018, 7K won the Outstanding Quality Outcome Award for decreasing urinary tract infections (UTIs) on the unit. Led by Gross, staff used critical thinking and assessment skills to achieve this outcome.

Gross is dedicated to interdisciplinary collaboration. She encourages her staff to actively partner with physical therapy and case management to decrease length of stay for patients who have had total hip or total knee replacements. The team collected data on the relationship between interprofessional collaboration and patient engagement and their findings were published in the December 2018 issue of *Pennsylvania Nurse*.

The DAISY Nurse Leader Award is presented in deep appreciation of compassionate leadership and for creating an environment of care that truly makes



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a difference in the lives of staff, patients and families. The award is given twice a year at LVHN, once in the spring at our annual Medallion Lecture and again in the fall at our annual Nursing Research Day reception.
