Improving Access in our Hospitals

Last fiscal year, we set a goal to reduce diversion hours in our emergency departments (EDs). We've had only five diversion hours since September 2015. That means we've welcomed nearly everyone who came to our EDs for care. We hit it out of the park. Now we're aiming to improve access and flow in our hospitals even more.

New goals

This fiscal year, we have two new goals for improving inpatient access:

1. Decrease length of stay in our EDs for patients



being hospitalized. This includes acute admissions, observations and ambulatory overnight cases.

2. Shorten transfer times between units.

Why these goals are important

“We’re striving to get the right patient to the right place at the right time,” says Chair of Emergency and Hospital Medicine Dave Burmeister, DO, a member of the steering team leading our efforts. “By doing so, we’ll improve quality by giving patients the care they need more quickly. We also will avoid unnecessary costs associated with extended hospital stays.”

“Our ultimate goal is to have the best outcomes and provide the best possible experience for our patients,” says Tim Friel, MD, Chair of the Department of Medicine. “We know prolonged stays in the ED and hospital contribute to worse patient outcomes and suboptimal experiences for patients and their families.”

Identifying the challenges

At LVH–Cedar Crest, 57 percent of admissions come from the ED. The proportion is even greater at LVH–Muhlenberg where 87 percent of admission originate in the ED. Our EDs become overcrowded because of inefficiencies in our entire system of care. These same inefficiencies often cause delays in transferring our patients from one unit to another.

Action steps

Here are some of the things we’re doing to achieve our goals.

- **Collaborative rounds** – Our multidisciplinary team comprising physicians, advanced practice clinicians (APCs), nurses and case managers round at a standing time where patients are the focus. Collaborative rounding enhances coordination of care, improves team communication and promotes

smoother transitions to home or other sites of post-acute care.

- **Standard work for transfers** – We're creating a process in which patient transporters will be closer to the next patient they have to transport when they arrive at their current patient's destination. The causes of prolonged transfers are discussed regularly during daily huddles. Our teams actively brainstorm potential solutions to these challenges.

We're also taking steps to:

- Improve patient flow in the ED
- Reduce the turnaround time for patients in the ED who need a CT scan
- Streamline the admission process in EDs
- Reduce length of stay for patients categorized as an "observation"
- Develop a "conditional discharge" order in Epic that can be initiated when a patient meets pre-established conditions

What you can do

All colleagues who work in our hospitals can help us achieve our goals and deliver an even better patient experience. Here's how:

- Talk with colleagues on your team about the barriers to patient flow and brainstorm ways to break down those barriers.
- When appropriate, prioritize patients scheduled for discharge. This will help ensure beds are available for patients who need them.
- Talk with patients that will be discharged in the near future to ensure they have arranged transportation.

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Oncology Aligns With Epic

During the ambulatory go-live in February 2015, not all LVHN oncology facilities transitioned to the new electronic medical record (EMR) system. Beginning this weekend, however, all LVPG and LVHN oncology practices and facilities in the Lehigh Valley will make the leap to Epic.

This transition to an integrated patient record will transform how we will deliver care across the continuum and facilitate achieving improved communication, patient engagement, efficiency and productivity with a single record.

Oncology scheduling and treatment plans now on

The weekend of Oct. 15 and 16 found a team of oncology providers, office nurses and quality team nurses converting (or transferring) oncology patient treatment plans from MOSAIQ® (the current oncology EMR) into Epic.

In addition, nearly 60 front desk/registrar staff members moved more than 5,500 appointments into Epic for the first two weeks of November. These appointments covered areas such as infusion, radiation oncology and hematology oncology. All appointments made for Oct. 29 and later were made in Epic.

What happens on Saturday

This weekend, the Beacon application will go live. That means beginning Saturday, Oct. 29, all oncology patients will have their record available through Epic and will receive after-visit summaries.

Other details:

- No downtime is needed.
- Command center will open to provide support throughout this go-live.
- Epic Flash will have a special daily edition.
- Patients will have their medical record available in MyLVHN and no longer need to access a separate portal.

Support for oncology go-live

In order to support colleagues, several departments will be assisting on the floor:

- **Lehigh Valley Physician Group** – A number of LVPG colleagues will assist in the front desk role during go-live. These colleagues have gone through an Epic implementation, use Epic on a daily basis and have attended training in order to support their assigned area.
- **Division of education** – Several members of the division of education team will support in the provider and clinical support role. These individuals have been teaching Beacon-specific classes to this audience.

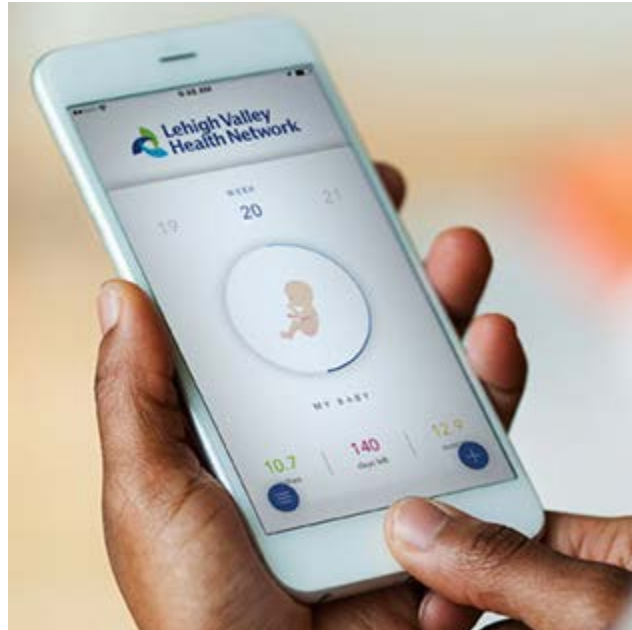
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- **Epic Wisconsin team** – Members of the Epic Wisconsin team will provide clinical support at various locations. They all have experience in Beacon and other Epic applications.
 - **Information Services** – Members of the information services team will be on site to provide application support. Each team member has at least one Epic certification and has gone through oncology training.
 - **Divurgent** – A year ago, we enlisted Divurgent, a third party vendor to support our ambulatory and inpatient go-lives. Thirty Divurgent resources will be on site to support oncology areas. All resources within this group have several oncology go-lives under their belts, and they are ready to assist.

Introducing Baby Bundle: A New Pregnancy Resource for Moms-to-Be

A new mobile app for iPhone and Android is changing the way expectant moms and families are learning about pregnancy and baby care. Baby Bundle, available as a download from Lehigh Valley Health Network, is a book, e-book and mobile app that gives moms-to-be all the evidence-based information they need to be successful during pregnancy and throughout baby's first year.

Families can follow the development of their growing baby by exploring topics that include: your healthy pregnancy, labor and birth, breast-feeding, postpartum and newborn care. Special features



include animations and videos, an appointment tracker, contraction timer and a journal to record the special moments on your journey to parenthood.

Use Baby Bundle before delivery to:

- **Follow** baby's growth week by week or by trimester through helpful articles, animations and video
- **Learn** about nutrition during pregnancy and how good choices support healthy development
- **Track** prenatal office appointments, baby's measurements, kick counts and contractions
- **Prepare** for your hospital stay with a comprehensive packing list to help you get ready for the big day
- **Record** pregnancy memories and milestones in your own personal journal

Use Baby Bundle after baby arrives to:

- **Track** immunization records in one convenient location
- **Record** baby's feeding schedule to track how much nourishment baby is getting at each feeding

Uniform Donations Help Health Care Workers in Honduras

When LVHN nursing colleagues adopted new standardized uniforms at the end of May, colleagues were left scratching their heads wondering what to do with their old work duds. A request for scrubs from the nonprofit organization [Through These Hands](#), solved the dilemma. It also gave nurses a chance to help other health care workers in developing nations and in devastated areas throughout the U.S.

In August, bins were placed on the campuses of LVH–Cedar Crest, LVH–17th Street and LVH–Muhlenberg, where nurses could drop off used, clean uniforms.



“On the first week of the collection drive, the bins were already overflowing,” says Pattie Hoak, Nursing Excellence Specialist. “Volunteers from Through These Hands picked them up in a big utility truck, and returned every third day for more. The generosity was overwhelming.”

By the end of the drive, more than 800 pieces had been collected. On Aug. 30, three boxes were shipped to a health care clinic in Honduras.

Through These Hands was founded by former nursing colleague Dorene Shannon, who started her nursing career in the 1980s in medical-surgical and eventually found her way to the intensive care unit. Her time in health care gave her insight into medical waste and inspired her to collect supplies that would otherwise be thrown away.

“This organization was founded on slipper socks,” says Shannon. “My colleagues and I saw the waste and thought we could help others through a donation.”

That first donation included the collection of 500 used slipper socks, which were distributed in Kosovo by a friend on a mission trip. Collection of other items like old wheelchairs, walkers and sutures followed.

“We accept all kinds of donations from gauze to hospital beds,” Shannon says. “The items come from 13 hospitals, clinics, nursing homes and other businesses, and are distributed in 49 countries.”

Some donations are shipped directly to nonprofits operating in Argentina, Guatemala, the Philippines and other countries, or are carried overseas by individuals on church and medical missions.

Whether you believe in serendipity or divine inspiration, there are definitely forces at work that help Shannon accomplish her mission.

“I was going to meet a senator from Liberia who was in the area and needed hospital beds,” says Shannon. “At the time, I had a couple dozen in our warehouse. The day before we were scheduled to meet, my phone rang from someone whose organization had 700 beds to donate.”

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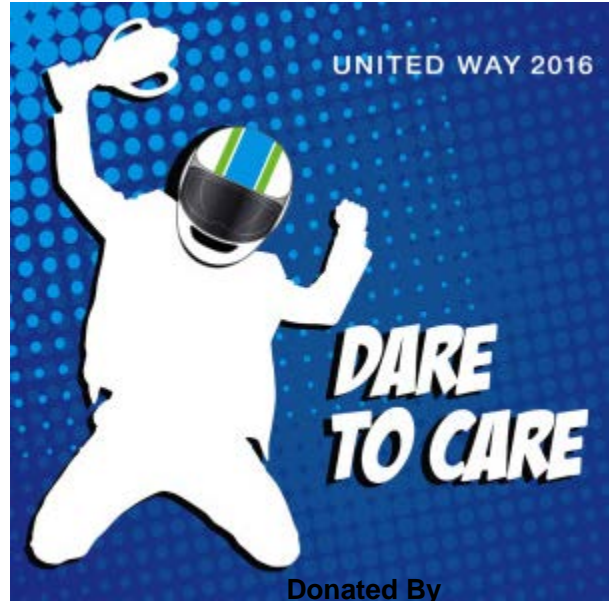
