## DOCTOR A CANDIDATE FOR OFFICE OF CORONER

### Dr. Warren D. Kleppinger Seeks Democratic Nomination

Acting on the suggestion of a number of his friends, Dr. Warren D. Kleppinger, pathologist and bacteriologist at the Allentown Hospital, has announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for coroner of Lehigh county. During his two years

stay in this city, as one of the physicians at the Allentown Hospital, Dr. Kleppinger has become widely and very favorably known, and has made a host of friends.

Dr. Kleppinger is a native of this county, having been born and raised at Germansville, where he received a common school education in the schools of Heidelberg township. He is a member of one of the oldest families in the county and his father, T. M. Kleppinger, has been the efficient station agent at Germansville, on the Slatington and Reading branch of the Philadelphia & Reading Railroad for the past twenty-seven years.

Dr. Kleppinger entered the Kutztown State Normal School in the fall of 1905 and was graduated from that institution in the spring of 1908. The ensuing year he taught school at Pleasant Corner and in the fall of 1909 he entered Medico-Chi at Philadelphia and was graduated there four years later, after having attained a splendid record in medicine and surgery. The following year he entered the Allentown Hospital as an interne and after serving a year in that capacity he became the pathologist and bacteriologist.

During the time that he has spent in the Allentown Hospital, Dr. Kleppinger has attained a wide reputation for faithful and conscientious work and all those who came in contact with him have the highest regard for his ability and the conscientious efforts he puts into his work. His hospital experience peculiarly fits him for the office which he seeks.
