'Interne Shift' at Local Hospitals Today; 15 Will Take State Board Exams

A group of 15 young men have completed their internships at the Allentown and Sacred Heart hospital, Allentown, and will take state board examinations next week. If successful in their examinations, results of which will be announced within a few months, these young men will be granted licenses to practice medicine in the State of Pennsylvania. Meanwhile, they will be replaced at the local institutions by a new crop of embryo medicos.

Representing four different medical schools, nine of the physicians expect to go into private practice, four have accepted residences at various hospitals and one will return to school for advanced study. Dr. J. Kenneth Miller, dental interne at Allentown hospital, has already passed the state dental exam and has opened an office at 1550 Chew St.

Allentown hospital internes planning to enter general practice are William F. Weisel Jr. of Quakertown, graduate of Temple University Medical school; Edgar E. Cleaver, Palm, University of Pennsylvania Medical college; Ethan L. Trexler, Kempton, Hahnemann Medical school; Otis M. Eves, Millville, Temple University Medical school; Morton Silverman, Allentown, University of Pennsylvania Medical college, and Charles F. Johnson, Quakertown, University of Pennsylvania Medical college.

Dr. Johnson will be associated with Dr. Kerwin Marcks of Emmaus. Robert H. Dilcher of Allentown, will remain as the medical resident at the hospital, and Lewis F. Sprague, also of this city, will return to his alma mater, University of Virginia Medical school, for the study of internal medicine.

Those who will enter general practice from the Sacred Heart hospital are Raymond Kabakjian, Lansdowne, graduate of University of Pennsylvania Medical college; John J. Schneller, Catasauqua, University of Pennsylvania; Philip J. Ferry, Kingston, Hahnemann Medical college.

Warren Dietrich, of Bethlehem, graduate of Temple University Medical school, will hold a residency for the next year at the hospital while Edward V. Ocelus, of Port Carbon, Temple university, will be the resident physician at the Sacred Heart hospital, Norristown and Samuel Schlessinger, Hazleton, Jefferson Medical college, the resident at the Good Samaritan hospital, Pottsville.
