The American College of Physician Executives sponsors a National Awards Program for innovations in health care which is open to physicians as well as other health care professionals. The Partnership for Community Health in the Lehigh Valley continues to meet regularly. Sponsored by the Pool Trust, this is an effort to address broad public health concerns in the Lehigh Valley, including care for the un- and under-insured. Efforts have been made to include both senior management and medical staff leadership of the various regional hospitals in a collaborative relationship to solve these problems. Initial meetings have been very encouraging.

A "winner" in the consultant evaluation process was recently selected for the Medical Staff PPO/IPA feasibility study, from an impressive group of interested organizations which had responded with proposals. A presentation was made to the Strategic Development Committee of the Medical Staff which was impressed

with the capabilities this organization, the Raleigh Group, a national health care consulting firm with regional offices (Philadelphia).

This group is going to begin work promptly here, including initial evaluation of the existing status of managed care activity in the Lehigh Valley. In addition, individual Medical Staff members may receive requests for interviews in an attempt by the consultant to obtain more information about our Medical Staff and its current practice patterns.

The Mini-Internship Program, being run in conjunction with Lehigh County Medical Society, is scheduled for October 19 and 20. Those invited as interns include various community leaders such as CEOs and health care officials from local corporations, representatives from the media, labor, health care coalitions, etc. Those of you who volunteered for service as physician "faculty members" have had their names submitted to Lehigh County Medical Society for further consideration. We are optimistic that this program will provide a "hands on" look at the typical day in the life of a practicing physician for key members of the community.



# New Test: Beta-2-Microglobulin

Health Network Laboratories now offers Beta-2-microglobulin as an inhouse test through the Immunology Department.

In normal individuals, B2-microglobulin is found in both serum and urine.

Proximal tubular disfunction results in elevated urinary concentrations (either random or 24-hour specimen is acceptable). Serum levels are a function of its rate of synthesis and are elevated in inflammatory disorders, lymphoproliferative diseases, and as a predictive test measuring the progression to AIDS in HIV infections.

# Leukemia/Lymphoma Immunophenotyping by Flow Cytometry

The Flow Cytometry Division has recently added a Leukemia-Lymphoma Phenotyping Panel to its test services. This panel assesses the presence or absence of various lineage specific cell surface antigens and is designed to be utilized in conjunction with the standard morphological and cytochemical test data to characterize and classify the disease.

In-house testing will provide improved turn-around time of results to physicians which will expedite treatment decisions.

### **Hepatitis C Testing**

Testing for Hepatitis C Virus (HCV) antibody using a second generation enzyme immunoassay (EIA) is now performed by the staff of the Immunology Division, either as an individual test order or as part of the hepatitis profile. The laboratory will automatically reference repeatably reactive EIA specimens for supplemental RIBA testing.

To date approximately 22% of specimens submitted to our laboratory for EIA testing have been positive; 98% of these specimens have also been reactive in the supplemental RIBA test.

### Heptavax Follow-up

Many physicians have ordered tests for the presence of Hepatitis B antibody on specimens collected from their office staff as a follow-up to the OSHA guidelines that state Heptavax must be offered to all health care workers. The appropriate way to order post-Heptavax testing is to request "Hepatitis B Surface Antibody" or "HBsAb."

Requests using other terminology have lead to confusion and misinterpretation of the order and should, therefore, be avoided. Your cooperation in using the recommended terminology as outlined above will ensure the correct test is performed and ultimately an efficient service is provided.

NEWS FROM THE MEDICAL RECORDS DEPARTMENT At the August Medical Record Committee meeting, the following results of concurrent monitoring of operative reports were revealed.

In June, 74% were dictated within 24 hours post-op, and 87% were dictated within 48 hours post-op. In July, 87% were dictated within 24 hours post-op, with 92% dictated within 48 hours post-op.

These percentages have improved since the inception of concurrent monitoring of operative reports by the Medical Record Department. However, the Medical Record Committee would like to remind the Medical Staff, in accordance with Medical Staff Bylaws and JCAHO regulations, operative reports are to be dictated immediately following surgery. If dictating stations are unavailable, telephones can be used.

#### Nuclear Medicine News

Effective Monday, August 24, the Medical Record Department will now type all reports from Nuclear Medicine, 17th & Chew. The reports may be reviewed by any physician by dialing the access number for 17th & Chew (Ext. 2515) and then following the instructions.

# News from Enterostomal Therapy: Perineal Care

Triple Care Perineal Wash and Unisalve Ointment have been replaced with products that will improve patient care and be cost effective.

Peri-Wash and Baza Cream (available together in a hospital pack) are indicated for prevention for any bedbound patient and any patient who is incontinent. It is effective when erythema is present with intact skin.

Peri-Wash and Critic-Aid Paste (also available together in a hospital pack) are indicated for skin that is inflamed and denuded as a result of urinary or fecal incontinence or enzymatic drainage that cannot be protected by a skin barrier or collection device. In hospital trials, Critic-Aid was found to be more effective than Lasser's Paste.

Both product packages are stocked in SPD and do not require a physician's order.

## Broselow Pediatric Emergency Tape

Effective September 14, all Pediatric Code Carts will have a Broselow Pediatric Emergency Tape in the medication drawer of the Pediatric Code Cart. This will help to determine approximate weights of children in order to assist with medication dosages, equipment sizes, and oxygen supplies.

The tape is simple to use. Simply lay the child on the tape (head should be on the top red arrow) and measure to the heal of the child. The tape is designed to include children from 3KG to 34KG. Each block on the tape is for a separate KG weight and includes dosages and equipment for that weight. Wherever the heel of the child's foot ends is the location where medication

dosages should be calculated. In addition, the colored portion of the tape includes equipment sizes. The bottom portion of the tape includes information on the compression rate and depth.

The Code Blue Committee feels this tape will be instrumental in assisting all staff with pediatric dosages, equipment sizes, as well as vital signs and CPR instructions. After the code is completed, please clean the tape and return it to the Code Cart to be used for subsequent pediatric codes.


# Parenteral Antibiotic Order Program Update

The committee was informed that compliance has been 76%. Complaints of missed orders were studied by a prospective review of 443 charts - no missed orders were found. The Committee also reviewed antibiotic expense since the program was implemented in March, 1992. (See Table 1 - Antibiotic Cost Report). June showed a significant drop due primarily to the implementation of a syringe based IV Admixture Program at Cedar Crest & I-78

(This lowered the cost per dose for the majority of intermittently infused IV products). The Committee also approved the Clinical Pharmacy/Infectious Disease Service proposal to closely monitor usage of Aztreonam, Ampicillin/Sulbactam (Unasyn), Ceftazidime, Ciprofloxacin and Ceftriaxone. Usage guidelines on the back of the order sheet will be used for comparison. Ceftriaxone will be reviewed against dosing criteria.

# Formulary Addition Requests

The following drugs were added to the formulary.

Fludarabine (Fludara, Berlex) - an antimetabolite, similar to Cytarabine, is currently indicated for the treatment of chronic Lymphocytic Leukemia (CLL) in patients who have not responded to or have progressed during treatment with at least one standard alkylating agent containing regimen. Fludarabine may also be useful in non-Hodgkin's lymphoma and is being studied in other leukemias. Fludarabine acts primarily by inhibiting DNA synthesis in the S-Phase. The recommended adult dosing schedule in CLL is 25mg/m<sup>2</sup> over 30 minutes for 5 days - repeated every 28 days. The major adverse reactions include myelosuppression, primarily leukopenia. Nausea and vomiting occur only rarely. Dose related neurotoxicity has been seen in high dose studies.

Serum Albumin level monitoring may be warranted as it appears to be strongly predictive of outcome. Patients should also be monitored for signs and symptoms of infection and neurotoxicity. Fludarabine is supplied in 50mg/2ml vials at a cost of \$138.00 each.

Fosinopril (Monopril, Squibb) - is an angiotensin converting enzyme (ACE) inhibitor indi-

cated for the treatment of mild to moderate hypertension. It is the pro-drug which is hydrolyzed to the active agent, fosinoprilat, during or following absorption. Fosinopril's clinical effects do not differ significantly from the other available ACE inhibitors and offers no clear advantages in patients with normal renal function. However, fosinopril may be of some advantage in patients with impaired renal function. In the presence of renal insufficiency, fosinopril undergoes a compensatory shift to non-renal (ie. hepato-biliary) clearance, obviating the need for dosage adjustment in these patients. The usual maintenance dose of fosinopril is 10-40mg once daily with some

patients requiring up to 80mg per day.

Zalcitadine (HIVID, Roche) - an anti-retroviral agent used in combination with Zidovudine (AZT) in advanced HIV infection (CD<sub>4</sub> cell count ≤ 300 cells/mm³) who have demonstrated significant clinical or immunologic deterioration. Zalcitadine received FDA approval based on two ongoing clinical trials which showed an improved CD<sub>4</sub> count response over monotherapy. Peripheral neuropathy is the major adverse effect with a 17% to 31% incidence. Other adverse effects include a 1% incidence of pancreatitis. The usual adult dose is 0.750mg Zalcitadine and 200mg Zidovudine (AZT) Q8H.

# How Much Fluid for Dopamine???

The Committee reviewed information provided by the **Nursing Peer Review Process which** showed that Dopamine orders for renal perfusion patients being transferred to Med/ Jurg units are not always being changed to the 200mq/250ml concentration specified by the current policy. The Committee asked Pharmacy, Nursing and Nephrology to review the concentration and recommend action to

the committee.

# One Alone for the Quinolones - Quinolone Study

The Infectious Disease Service together with the Pharmacy and Clinical Laboratory (Microbiology) Departments recommended a three month susceptibility study of Pseudomonas aerogniosa isolates against both Ciprofloxacin (Cipro, Miles) and Ofloxacin (Floxin, Ortho). Ofloxacin was recently marketed in both oral/ intravenous formulations with a similar pharmacokinetic and microbiologic profile at a lower cost/day of therapy to Ciprofloxacin.
Ofloxacin's in vitro MIC 90 data is not as impressive as Ciprofloxacin's; the clinical relevance of which requires further investigation - hence the study. Study results will be presented to the P & T Committee and one of these two agents will be recommended for inclusion in the formulary.

# Drug Use Evaluation (DUE) Corner

A two month review of Flumazenil (Mazicon, Roche) usage was conducted and presented to the committee. Eleven patient courses were reviewed. Two patients received benzodiazepine sedation alone, while 9 received a benzodiazepine together with a narcotic analgesic. Five

patients were treated with Flumazenil alone and 6 were treated with Flumazenil and Naloxone concomitantly. The Committee recommended forwarding the results to the Chief of Gastroenterology and Chairman of Medicine for review, and follow-up as necessary.

This sheet, which is not intended to be a permanent chart form, should be placed on top of the chronological sheet so all Physicians can review it prior to prescribing additional medications.
