Harry Lukens, Senior Vice

President and Chief Information Officer, addressed Medical Executive Committee this month to review the security of our computer system. The clinical departments receive reports regarding patient access and potential breaches of confidentiality. It is imperative that we log out of the computer at each work station we use to access information. I would also add that we should not access clinical information using another individual's access.

JCAHO has requested a change in the Q.A. Committee process. The Hospital-Wide Q.A. Committee has now been revamped and renamed the Performance Improvement Committee. Quality will be assessed as a process to include review of feedback and performance improvement. The Performance Improvement Committee will include the chairs of all clinical departments, TROIKA, Senior Vice President for Clinical Services, and the Chief Operating Officer.

Many members of our Medical Staff will receive (or have received) information about academic appointments at Penn State/Hershey.

Jack Fitzgibbons, M.D., chairs the committee for internal review of the recommendations to Penn State, and I would encourage all to return these forms.

Although not at target, the efforts of Operations Improvement was substantial. At Medical Executive Committee, Elliot Sussman, M.D., reviewed these outcomes and thanked the Medical Staff and our PHO in ongoing contributions to the Operations Improvement efforts. Also, Dr. Sussman reported a favorable site visit by members of Ingersoll Rand who reviewed our cardiac surgery program. Ingersoll Rand is in the process of selecting three to six hospitals nationwide to perform cardiac surgery for their employees. We were fortunate to be one of the site visits. Geary Yeisley, M.D., and D. Lynn Morris, M.D., participating with members of the hospital administration, did an impressive job during this daylong review. We should know some results in about a month.

Site and Facilities Update

Cedar Crest & I-78

Lithotripsy Area Expanding

Construction is proceeding on an extension of the lithotripsy area adjacent to the shock/trauma unit. A dock will also be added to facilitate transport of the portable lithotripter. During this project, traffic at the rear of the hospital has been reduced to a single lane.

Radiology Adding Angiography Room

A second angiography room is being added to the Radiology Department in space previously occupied by a special procedures room. The project will be completed in early September.

17th & Chew

Projects Proceeding on 1st to 4th Floors

On 1North, work has resumed on the Dental Service's new dental clinic, laboratories and administrative functions which are scheduled for completion in early September.

Also on the first floor, renovations are underway for a unit that will consolidate outpatient diagnostic services including EEG, EKG, respiratory therapy, pulmonary function and heart station.

Meanwhile on 1Tower, the former Transitional Care Unit is being

converted into administrative offices for the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology.

On the second floor Tower, renovations are underway for a new ambulatory surgery (short procedure) unit that will adjoin the Operating Room suites. Renovations to the OR suites also began last month.

On 3T, the former Mother-Baby Unit is now being renovated for 10 new labor/delivery/recovery (LDR) rooms. The project will continue through early September. Later this year, the existing Labor and Delivery Unit will be converted into a high-risk antepartum unit for women who require hospitalization during pregnancy.

Pediatric Groups to Join Lehigh Valley Physician Group

ABC Pediatrics and Family
Pediatricians, two pediatric practices
based in Allentown, plan to merge and
join Lehigh Valley Physician Group
(LVPG), Pediatrics, the hospital-based
pediatricians of Lehigh Valley
Hospital. The consolidated group will
pool the expertise of 15 general
pediatricians, four neonatologists and a
pediatric pulmonologist. The merger
will be completed by October 1.

"Through the coordinated efforts of these two community practices with the hospital-based group, we can enhance pediatric services both in and outside the hospital," says John D. VanBrakle, M.D., chairperson, Department of Pediatrics. "The new group will provide the manpower needed to address a number of long-standing goals of the Department of Pediatrics at Lehigh Valley Hospital."

ABC Pediatrics and Family
Pediatricians will keep their separate
identities and functions during day and
evening hours. Both groups will
continue with the same doctors and
office staff at all current office
locations. The groups will work
together to provide night-call coverage.

One unique aspect of the plan is that one or two doctors from each practice will work with the four hospital-based pediatricians who now focus their practice on the inpatient pediatric unit at Lehigh Valley Hospital. "By increasing the number of doctors who cover the inpatient unit, we can provide seamless coverage of the

pediatric floor at the hospital, a critical component of caring for sicker children from Allentown," said Dr. VanBrakle. "Children who must be transferred to referral centers will also benefit from the expertise of our pediatricians who specialize in acute care," he adds, pointing out that several hours of critical care are often required while transport is being arranged.

The doctors in ABC Pediatrics and Family Pediatricians will also help provide night time coverage to children in Outpatient Pediatrics, the pediatric clinic at Lehigh Valley Hospital, 17th & Chew. A patient advice/triage telephone system staffed by registered nurses will field calls after office hours and, when necessary, refer patients to the on-call physician for the group. If the patient needs immediate evaluation or treatment, the on-call physician will see the patient in the Emergency Department, hospital clinic or one of the community-based practice sites. "This service is unique in the Lehigh Valley and it will enhance access and help ensure continuity of care, better patient management and fewer inappropriate visits to the ER" says Dr. VanBrakle. "Our experience is that patients will use alternatives to the ER when available." Outpatient Pediatrics currently does not have night coverage from pediatricians.

Neonatologists, pediatricians who specialize in the care of sick newborn infants, now attend high-risk deliveries at Lehigh Valley Hospital and staff its Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU).

The neonatologists will be included in the merged group. They will begin providing 24-hour in-hospital coverage-versus on-call coverage--and facilitate the care of healthy newborns in both the community practice and on the hospital's obstetric clinic service. Like the pediatricians covering the inpatient unit, neonatologists based in the hospital will be immediately available when needed.

According to Dr. VanBrakle, "All of the pediatricians in ABC Pediatrics and Family Pediatricians believe very strongly in maintaining contact with their patients in the hospital. They will work together to assure continuity of care in both in-hospital and outpatient settings.

A long-range goal of the hospital's Pediatrics Department is to increase locally available specialty medical services for children and to strengthen medical education programs. Improved in-hospital coverage is a key factor in attracting and maintaining specialty physicians. A pediatric pulmonologist and a pediatric surgeon joined LVPG and the Medical Staff last year. "Our group will continue working closely with the area's many excellent pediatricians and family practitioners," says Dr. VanBrakle. "Many are on staff at Lehigh Valley Hospital. The number of children in our community is large enough to justify developing better local resources to care for children with severe and complex medical problems. At the same time, we do not plan to duplicate all subspecialty services at tertiary pediatric referral centers in Philadelphia or Hershey. A great deal

can be accomplished for our children if local practitioners work closely with each other and with our regional referral centers."



Faculty Appointments - PSU/Hershey

Medical Staff members who are involved in teaching students and residents are eligible for faculty appointments at Pennsylvania State University College of Medicine/Hershey. All who are eligible are encouraged to apply.

In order to expedite the process, maintain internal consistency, and keep track of all applications, we are requiring that all applications flow from the Office of Education at Lehigh Valley Hospital to the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs at PSU/Hershey. While informal discussions are encouraged between chairpersons at Lehigh Valley Hospital and PSU/Hershey concerning questions of appropriate rank, no recommendations or approvals will be forwarded directly interdepartmentally between Lehigh Valley Hospital and PSU/Hershey.

Many members of the Medical Staff have been contacted by Drs. Fitzgibbons and Little asking if they wish to be considered for a PSU faculty appointment. These individuals were chosen based on prior Hahnemann University faculty appointments or department recommendations. For those who have responded affirmatively, the application process has already begun. If you have not yet been contacted, and wish to be considered, the first step is to discuss the possible appointment with your Department Chairperson. Details of the application process are provided at the end of this article.

Following are brief explanations of prefixed, suffixed and unmodified

ranks and titles which may assist applicants to understand the recommendations.

- Prefix Clinical title (e.g., Clinical Assistant Professor) indicates primary involvement in patient care and teaching. The majority of our appointments will be prefixed titles.
- Suffix Clinical title (e.g., Assistant Professor of Clinical Department) indicates evidence of scholarly productivity, in addition to patient care and teaching. Some of our appointments will be in this category.
- Unmodified, non-tenure title (e.g., Professor of Department) indicates involvement in scholarly patient care related activities, including clinical research, teaching and appropriate publications. Only a few appointments will be in this category.

The process for application to which PSU/Hershey and Lehigh Valley Hospital have agreed is as follows:

- 1. Physician candidate indicates interest in faculty appointment to department chairperson.
- If qualified, department chairperson recommends prefixed/suffixed rank, or non prefixed/non suffixed rank. (Majority of appointments will be clinical assistant professor.)
- 3. Recommendation is forwarded to Office of Education.
- 4. Office of Education coordinates review by Lehigh Valley Hospital Faculty Appointment Review Committee for purpose of internal consistency and compliance with PSU/Hershey faculty appointment criteria. (Committee members include John P. Fitzgibbons, M.D., Chair; William L. Miller, M.D.; Gary G. Nicholas, M.D.; and Brian W. Little, M.D., Ph.D.)
- 5. Committee chair forwards finalized recommendations to Office of Education.

- 6. Office of Education forwards recommendations to PSU/Hershey (Associate Dean for Academic Affairs).
- PSU/Hershey forwards recommendations to appropriate PSU/Hershey chairmen for review and recommendations.
- 8. PSU/Hershey chairmen approve Clinical Assistant Professor ranks and submit recommendations for Associate or Full Professor ranks for review and approval to the College of Medicine Appointments and Promotion and Tenure Committee.
- Approved appointments are transmitted from the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs at PSU/Hershey to Director of Education at Lehigh Valley Hospital.
- 10. Director of Education transmits approved appointments to appropriate department chairpersons.
- 11. Department chairpersons notify appointees.

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TSH Testing

Before presenting a discussion on thyroid function tests, we felt an update on TSH technology to be appropriate and timely.

Over the past 20 years, the classic TSH assay has dramatically improved from a sensitivity level of 1-2 mU/L (first generation) to a level of 0.1 mU/L (second generation) to the current (third generation) level of 0.01 mU/L. As is apparent, with each generation the sensitivity of the assay improved 10 fold. The terms sensitive, super sensitive or ultrasensitive should not be applied to TSH. This dramatic improvement in TSH assay sensitivity has made the serum TSH the most sensitive and readily accessible marker of thyroid hormone biological activity.

The improvement of the TSH assay to the third generation sensitivity of 0.01 is promoting a trend towards replacing the classic panel approach to thyroid testing. (The topic of the next newsletter). This trend not only reflects the increased focus on cost containment but reflects current research showing that TSH is the most sensitive diagnostic test for detecting both clinical and subclinical hypo and

hyperthyroidism. It is now established that the third generation TSH measurement in clinical practice has evolved from being merely a confirmatory test for primary hypothyroidism to a dominant role as the best indicator of all degrees of primary thyroid dysfunction.

Historically, the quality of the TSH assay has been judged by its ability to distinguish euthyroid from thyrotoxic values. For this purpose, we have defined the concept of functional sensitivity as the lowest TSH level reliably detected on a day-to-day and month-to-month basis. This is defined as the 20% CV (coefficient of variation) point of the inter-assay precision profile. The third generation TSH has a functional sensitivity between 0.01 and 0.02. The knowledge that TSH values less than 0.02 mU/L are expected in a thyrotoxic patient provides a reference point for the separation of patients with mild degrees of TSH suppression due to euthyroid sick syndrome and hyperthyroidism. A suppressed (<0.02 mU/L) TSH does not however distinguish between "clinical" or "subclinical" hyperthyroidism, that requires a serum T4 and T3 RIA as well.

The third generation TSH is the only one being offered by our laboratory. It is not more expensive for the patient and can be run more efficiently because of automated technology briefly described below.

The newest technology utilizes an Immunometric Assay which is inherently more sensitive and differs fundamentally in concept from traditional RIA methods. Chemiluminescent IMA's are noncompetitive assays which use an excess of a monoclonal TSH antibody bound to a solid support to capture TSH out of a serum sample. After incubation, a second signal-TSH

antibody labeled with the enzyme alkaline phosphatase is added and a sandwich produced. After washing, a chemiluminescent substrate is added which is hydrolyzed by the immobilized enzyme to produce an unstable intermediate resulting in a sustained emission of light directly proportional to the serum TSH concentration.
