
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Road Closure, Parking Changes at LVH–Cedar Crest Beginning May 1

The construction of a new emergency department and observation unit continues at LVH–Cedar Crest. Beginning May 1, the construction project will impact how some colleagues enter and exit the campus, park, and access the Center for Early Childhood Education and Hackerman-Patz House.



Here is what will happen beginning May 1. Refer to the map for details.

- The South Access Road will be closed to thru traffic.
- The Fish Hatchery Road entrance should only be used by colleagues assigned to park in Lots S, T, U and U-2. Changes to these lots are as follows.
 - Lot T (currently used by colleagues in the 1230 building) and Lot S (currently used by physicians and residents), will become gated physician lots. A temporary passage will be created between Lots T and S. All motorists will access this area through the Lot T gate. While there is sufficient parking most days in these lots, parking for physicians and residents will be on a first-come, first-serve basis, as there will not be separate parking lots for each. Any colleague with access to Lot S who is not a physician or resident will be removed from this lot.
 - Colleagues from the 1230 building who currently park in lot T will be displaced and be required to park in Lots U and U-2. Shuttle service will be offered in Lots U and U-2. Security will be on

site and monitoring parking lots to ensure colleagues are parking in their designated locations.

If any colleague parks in the front parking decks or the 1230/1240 building patient parking area, they will receive a ticket and possible disciplinary action as per the LVHN parking policy.

- Colleagues who park in all other lots, or are traveling to the Center for Early Childhood Education of the Hackerman-Patz House should enter the LVH–Cedar Crest campus via Kressler Road or the main entrance off of Cedar Crest Boulevard.
- All drivers making deliveries to LVH–Cedar Crest must enter and exit the campus via Kressler Road. Access to the loading docks from the Fish Hatchery Road entrance will not be available.

Thank you for your understanding and support as we work to expand the health care service the people of our community need.

Like many new practices, LVPG Pediatrics–Palmer Township and Children’s ExpressCARE weathered a variety of workflow and staffing challenges in their first year. Practice Manager Jaclyn Silverman and Practice Lead David Burnham, MD, encouraged colleagues to stay consistent and operate at that their highest scope. Here are photos of this amazing team.

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By collaborating with the division to ensure staffing, adopting an “air-traffic controller” model to address patient needs, concentrating on flow process, and leveraging relationships with colleagues at Children’s ExpressCARE, remarkable things began to happen.

Around December, the practice became fully staffed. Colleagues were able to breathe, sustain and

strategize – rather than just “operationally” progress. LVPG Pediatrics–Palmer Township experienced the opposite of outmigration. A surge of new patients and families – many of whom received exemplary care at Children’s ExpressCARE – wanted to establish care.

An influx of new patients brought forth new challenges, which required creative thinking, piloting and partnering. Silverman and Burnham collaborated with care teams to establish cross-training of Children’s ExpressCARE clinicians into the primary care setting.

Partnering with Children’s ExpressCARE clinicians enhanced patient throughput for well visits, acute illnesses and preparations for spring/summer volumes. In addition, two separate huddles were instituted to ensure colleagues from both practices were kept in the loop on practice volumes, appointments, coverage and more.

The concentration on flow process helped propel LVPG Pediatrics–Palmer Township to score 100 percent in three or more patient satisfaction “Top Box” areas and be at the forefront of the expansion of our services in Northampton County. Pediatric specialty rotations, such as pediatric endocrinology and neurology, laid the groundwork for Lehigh Valley Reilly Children’s Hospital specialty services to have a presence in the region.

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Epic Upgrade – Successful Go-Live to February 2019 Version

Early Sunday morning, all LVHN locations that use Epic successfully went “live” with updated applications in a system-wide Epic upgrade to implement the February 2019 version of Epic. Colleagues who work at LVPG–Hazleton locations experienced their first Epic upgrade since those practices and other locations transitioned to the electronic health record (EHR) system on Feb. 1. For all locations, this is the first of regularly scheduled quarterly Epic upgrades that LVHN will implement to keep our EHR system in sync with the latest version of Epic.



Command center support

To ensure all Epic-connected inpatient and outpatient locations are supported during this upgrade, information services (I/S) has a fully-staffed, 24/7 command center located in downtown Allentown at LVHN–Three City Center. Command center staff include:

- Analysts who support each application
- Operational leadership
- Clinical leadership
- CMIO group
- LVPG EMR Operations leadership
- I/S Support Center leadership

This team will continuously monitor the EHR system, obtain status assessments, provide systematic problem-solving, and answer provider and end user questions, as needed.

The command center is slated to be open through May 10.
