Major Changes to Parking and Traffic at LVH-Cedar Crest

As construction of a new emergency department (ED) and observation unit continues at LVH–Cedar Crest, significant changes to parking and traffic patterns will take place on the campus over the next few weeks. Refer to this map as you review the details.



Sept. 18: Hackerman-Patz House Re-opens

After undergoing renovations, the Hackerman-Patz House will re-open on Wednesday, Sept. 18. There are two ways for visitors to get to the house:

- Enter the hospital campus through the main entrance off Cedar Crest Boulevard, travel along the front of the hospital and turn left onto the South Access Road (look for signage).
- Enter the campus via East Texas Road (Dulles Road) and turn right onto the South Access Road (look for signage).

Sept. 20-22: Intersection of Fish Hatchery and South Access Road Closes

This intersection will close on Friday, Sept. 20 and remain closed throughout the weekend for paving. During this weekend, colleagues who park in lots R, S, T, U and U-2 have two ways to get to these lots:

- Enter the hospital campus through the main entrance off Cedar Crest Boulevard, travel along the front of the hospital and turn left onto the South Access Road (look for signage).
- Enter the campus via East Texas Road (Dulles Road) and turn right onto the South Access Road (look for signage).

On Monday, Sept. 23, the intersection will re-open. At that time, colleagues can use the Fish Hatchery Road entrance to access lots R, S, T, U and U-2.

Oct. 1: New South Access Road Opens

The new South Access Road opens on Oct. 1. The new road will allow you to travel from one end of the campus to the other (Fish Hatchery Road to East Texas Road) and give you access to all colleague parking lots, the Hackerman-Patz House and the Children's Early Care and Education Center.

Oct. 1: Changes to Physician Parking Occur

On Oct. 1, a new physician parking lot (new lot S) will open and the old lot S and lot R will close. To get

to new lot S, follow signs from the Fish Hatchery Road or East Texas Road entrances. After parking, you will be able to reach the hospital two ways:

- Follow the walkway. It will lead you to the 1230 medical office building or ED.
- Take a shuttle. A new bus shelter will be placed between new lot S and U. The shuttle runs continuously and will arrive at the shelter every 15 minutes.

Physicians also can park in lots T, U and U-2. Colleagues should not park in patient and visitor parking areas. A colleague who parks in patient and visitor parking areas is subject to ticketing, towing and disciplinary action.

Oct. 1: Ambulances Enter via Fish Hatchery Road

On Oct. 1, ambulances will begin entering the campus via Fish Hatchery Road and drive down the new South Access Road to the ED. Signage will direct ambulance crews to the ED. As you drive in this area, please be aware of ambulances on the road and allow them to pass so they can get patients to the ED as quickly as possible.

ED patients and visitors should continue to enter the campus via the main entrance on Cedar Crest Boulevard and follow the existing "Emergency Children and Adult" signage to reach ED patient and visitor parking.

Thank you for your patience during this construction project as we continue to build a state-of-the-art ED to provide patients and families greater access to the emergency care they expect and deserve.

Lynn's Turn: Where Are YOU on Your Priority List?

Sixty-six percent of full-time employees in the United States say they don't strongly believe they have work-life balance. The result? In the workplace, 60 percent of employees experience poor morale; 36 percent report poor productivity, and 41 percent say there is high turnover and burnout/fatigue.

How do we address these concerning statistics? How do we make more time for ourselves for the sake of our health? Recently, Kristin Behler, Director of Health and Wellness at LVHN, shared her story with me. Her story will help you learn how to prioritize "you" amid life's many challenges.



Kristin's story

When Kristin returned to work following her second maternity leave, she worried whether she could handle everything on her plate. With two young boys, a husband who works into the night, a career that deserves her full attention, an ill father, and a home that needs maintaining, she often felt depleted, as many of us frequently do. Kristin was losing herself. Every day, she was so focused on doing things for others that she didn't have time to take care of herself.

Kristin's life-altering decision

Kristin called a health coach, a confidential service that is free to all LVHN colleagues. They worked

together to set goals that include "me

time" for her. Now, Kristin schedules at least 150 minutes each week for herself, time she regularly uses to walk, run or exercise at the gym. At the advice of her health coach, Kristin also made a priority list to circle items on the list that bring her joy and to continuously add items she finds joyful over time.

One year later, Kristin continues to talk with her health coach every month. She still makes "me time" goals, and is focusing on other areas of wellness such as healthy eating and creating family-fun experiences that bring her loved ones together.

You often hear about "balancing your life" and "putting yourself first." Actually doing it, however, can be very difficult. Life is a balancing act. Sometimes you have less time for yourself, and sometimes you have a little more. Remember, "You" always has to be in the picture.

ExpressCARE Lehighton opened its doors today, allowing the people of Carbon County to receive walk-in care for minor illnesses and injuries at a moment's notice.

"ExpressCARE is a great service that allows for immediate access in a convenient location right in the community for everyday injuries and occurrences that do not require an emergency room," says Grant Greenberg, MD, LVPG Family Medicine. "ExpressCARE, partnered with a primary care practice, can serve as a home for your acute, chronic and preventive medical care with a family physician."

LVHN cut the ribbon to this facility last week, marking LVHN's 20th ExpressCARE in the health network. A community open house followed, which included tours of the facility and information about the care offered at this location.



ExpressCARE-Lehighton is located at 363 North First Street. It will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. 365 days a year. LVHN plans to open an ExpressCARE in Palmerton later this year. The service will be available at the Pencor Services, Inc. building at 528 Delaware Ave.

In addition to ExpressCARE, LVHN announced in August it will build a new hospital along Blakeslee Blvd. (Route 443) in Mahoning Township, LVH-Carbon County. Initial plans call for a hospital that includes all private rooms for inpatient care, and a medical office building which combined will occupy 89,000 square feet of space. The health network expects to break ground on the project next spring and anticipates opening in fall of 2021.




Just Keep Spinning: LVHN Partners with Community Bike Works to Benefit Young People

If you frequent LVHN Fitness at One City Center, you may have seen a peculiar trophy on display. At first glance, the trophy could seem out of place given that it's made of disassembled bike parts.
