Howard Cook, Jr., R Ph, staff pharmacist, Pharmacy, recently received the Joe E. Smith Award, the highest recognition of excellence, from the Pennsylvania Society of Hospital Pharmacists (PSHP).

The award, established in 1988, essentially recognizes Cook as the best clinical pharmacist in the state and was given after an extensive nomination and review process involving candidates from throughout Pennsylvania.

Given annually by the society to the pharmacist who has contributed most to the practice of institutional pharmacy, the award emphasizes the increasingly important role clinical pharmacists play in patient therapy. Among his peers, Cook is recognized for particular expertise in nutritional support and pain management.

At Lehigh Valley Hospital, Cook has been instrumental in the development of various programs, including the mobile medication cart and a staff development program on parenteral nutrition. He serves as a member of the Medication Error Corrective Action Team and Pain Management Committees, and had an instrumental role in establishing the satellite pharmacy.

1/4 cup olive oil

1/4 cup cider vinegar

2 tbsp. dijon mustard

1/4 cup dry white wine

Boneless chicken breasts

1 lb mushrooms, halved

2 onions, quartered

3 tomatoes, quartered

Combine first five ingredients. Pour over chicken breasts and vegetables. I marinate all day while I'm at work. Broil in oven 8-10 minutes on each side. *OR* Grill chicken 20 minutes on each side then add vegetables and grill 10 minutes longer. Baste occasionally with sauce in which you marinated chicken and vegetables.

Hearty Mountain Man Kettle Soup with Cheese Dumplings

Soup:

3 lbs. ground beef

1 lb. onions, diced,

I lb. celery, diced

1 lb. carrots, diced

1 cup tomato puree

1/2 cup parsley, chopped

1 tbsp. garlic, minced

2 cups mixed vegetables, frozen

1/4 cup ditalini pasta

1 tsp. anise seed

2 gallons beef broth

pepper, to taste

Dumplings

2 tbsp parmesan, grated

1 cup Egg Beaters

1 lb. all purpose flour

2 cups skim milk

1 tsp. baking powder

pepper, to taste

Soup: cook ground beef with onions, carrots, celery and garlic until meat is cooked through. Drain off excess grease. Add tomato puree, parsley, mixed vegetables, anise seed and beef broth. Bring soup to a boil and add pasta. Cook 5 minutes. Reduce heat to slow simmer for 30 minutes. Add cheese dumplings and serve.

Dumplings: Beat egg beaters with milk and combine with flour and baking powder. Add cheese and pepper. Let stand 5 minutes. Mixture should be pasty, not tight. Using a 1/2 tsp., scoop mixture into boiling water (each dumpling should float to the top). Continue process and finish the mixture. Simmer for at least 10 minutes. Drain water. Rinse. Add dumplings to the soup.
