Directions to the new office from in-town Allentown: take North 17th Street and follow it until you can go no further. Take the left-hand turn (Jonathan Street) and the office building is on the left-hand side of the street.

The phone number remains 433-8550.

Employees and their dependents may contact the Employee Assistance Program when they are in need of help dealing with such situations as drug and alcohol dependencies, family problems, stress, and depression. The service is confidential and includes up to five free sessions per year. Should additional services be needed, employees will be referred to the appropriate private practitioner, community agency or other community resource.



LVHC New Cafeteria Plans Explained

The new employee dining room in the Anderson Wing of the LVHC site is one step closer to completion. The conceptual planning for the "scatter" area is finished.

The new cafeteria will no longer employ a straight-line food pick-up system. Rather, it will have a series of stations with various food groups, such as entrees, cold sandwiches, desserts, beverages, etc. The employees can go and pick up the items they want without waiting in one long line.

The Food Service management staff and Vice Presidents Lionel Kier and Phil DiChiara have visited a number of facilities to ensure that this approach will eliminate the long lines that presently must be endured. A new deli bar-type service will allow the food service staff to provide a wider choice of items. The dining area will be substantially larger, and will comfortably seat upward of 500 people.

It is hoped that actual construction will begin in July with completion on or about Jan. 31, 1989. Good things are worth waiting for, and the Food Service Department believes the LVHC staff will really enjoy the new dining room.



Q. Can something be done about the congestion in the exit portion of the cafeteria at TAH?

A. It is a difficult situation which we hope will soon be rectified with planned changes in that area. We are sorry for this inconvenience.

Q. There were some of us wondering about someone who eats every meal in the cafeteria at TAH. Would it be possible for him to have a discount for his meal?

A. We have a policy for an employee discount with proper identification. Unfortunately, we cannot make an exception to this policy as it would be difficult to "draw the line" as to who would or would not be eligible for the discount. Thank you for your concern.

Q. The parking conditions at TAH, particularly for the 3 to 11 p.m. shift employees and elderly patients, have become more than difficult. What can be done about it?

A. Many things have occurred during the last year, and will be occurring this year, prompting a new parking study to be made. We are working on this problem and hope to have a satisfactory resolution in the not-too-distant future.

Q. Must physicians maintain their CPR certification as do the nursing staff?

A. The joint Commission does not require all medical staff to maintain their CPR certification. However, there are specific areas in the medical field where physicians must keep up their CPR certification.

Q. When is HealthEast going to consider providing a more up-to-date computer system? Ours seems to be rather antiquated.

A. HealthEast and TAH—LVHC are undergoing a major planning effort to determine the system-wide strategic directions for information systems. The system response time problem at The Allentown Hospital site and its associated impact on hospital operations is fully recognized. Interim measures to upgrade our current computer systems have been taken with equipment installation anticipated by June 1. With this upgrade, system

functions, such as patient care and patient billing, will operate on separate computers to provide for improved performance and to support merger activities. Analysis of applications will also be completed in an effort to determine how well our

current systems satisfy operational requirements. All actions, whether interim or long-term, will be accomplished as part of a total HealthEast information systems plan to improve our automated capabilities and technology investment.

The Allentown Hospital—Lehigh Valley Hospital Center recently participated in WalkAmerica, a national March of Dimes walkathon. Forty-one walkers from TAH—LVHC raised \$3,276.25 in pledges to help fight birth defects.

Dorney Park Discount Tickets Available



Pool Trust Update Begins

What do you know about the Dorothy Rider Pool Health Care Trust?

Over the past several months, Sherry A. Faux, grant accountant, TAH—LVHC, and Barbara A. Salvadore, assistant to the president, TAH—LVHC, have been asking the same question.

Leonard Parker Pool established the Dorothy Rider Pool Health Care Trust through provisions of his will to assure continued provision of health care to the citizens of the Lehigh Valley and others served by the hospital. Mr. Pool wanted the available funds to be used primarily to help the hospital become a superior regional hospital.

There are three types of Trust Grants that can be awarded: Innovation and Development, Pool Fellowship, and General Trust Grant. There are currently 45 active grants, some of which may be familiar to you: Clinical Ladder Advancement System, Trauma Research Fellowship, Pre-Hospital Emergency Medical System, Comprehensive Community Cancer Center, Colorectal Screening, Lehigh Valley Stroke Program, and Institutional Research. Pool Trust contributions total over \$5,000,000.

Since Sherry and Barbara have been in their positions, they have been working to streamline the process to apply for grant monies to fund innovative ideas and projects at TAH—LVHC.

In future issues of *CheckUp*, Sherry and Barb intend to report on existing, ongoing projects and programs funded through Pool Trust support.

'Friends' Honor TAH—LVHC Nurses

Thirty-three nurses were recognized for their dedication to patient care and nursing professionalism by HealthEast through its second annual Friends of Nursing Awards presented during National Nurses Week.

Friends of Nursing was developed for the recognition, promotion and educational advancement of nursing professionals and support personnel. It also promotes nursing as a positive career choice.
