New Chairman of Medicine Arrives

On July 1, John P. Fitzgibbons, M.D., joined us as chairman of the department of Medicine at TAH—LVHC. He follows Dean F. Dimick, M.D., who was chairman of the department for 21 years. Fitzgibbons has also been appointed vice chairman of the department of Medicine at Hahnemann University Medical School, Philadelphia. TAH—LVHC is a clinical campus affiliate that provides patient care experience to third- and fourthyear medical students from Hahnemann.

At TAH-LVHC, Fitzgibbons is responsible for the administration of the department of Medicine, including its six divisions: dermatology, familypractice, internal medicine, neurolpsychiatry physical ogy, and medicine. The internal medicine division includes the sections of allergy, cardiology, endocrinology, gastroenterology, general internal medicine, hematology and medical oncology, infectious diseases, pulmonary, renal and rheumatology.

Fitzgibbons is board-certified in internal medicine and in the subspecialty of nephrology (the study of kidneys). Prior to his new appointment at TAH—LVHC, he was chief of renal services at Baystate Medical Center, Springfield, Mass. and director of the hemodialysis unit, Franklin Medical Center, Greenfield, Mass.

Fitzgibbons completed clinical and research fellowships in nephrology at

Dimick has been named vice president of academic affairs, TAH—LVHC, and project director for development of the Metabolic/Renal Regional Resource Center. During his tenure as chairman, Dimick was responsible for developing and managing the medical residency program at both hospital sites. He also served as chair of the combined education committee and developed and implemented continuing medical education programs.

Fitzgibbons will reside in Allentown with his wife, Beverly, and their four children.

You can have a sneak preview of the vans on Friday, July 15, from noon to 1 p.m., when they will be parked outside the main lobby at each site.


The shuttle service has been named "The Tunnel" after the system of underground passages frequently used to interconnect the various buildings on the campus of large hospitals, making movement easier throughout the institution. "The Tunnel" is the first visible link between the merged hospital sites. I encourage all employees who must travel between TAH and LVHC to ride in comfort in the vans.




Please Accept My Thanks....

All In A Day's Work

Traditionally, Father's Day imparts near celebrity status to dads throughout the nation. Since this was only my second Father's Day since the birth of our son, Daniel, I looked forward to basking in the glow of the holiday, and quite frankly, letting my wife and son spoil me to their hearts' content.

That was before a celebrity of another sort entered the picture. At 1 p.m. on the afternoon of Sunday, June 19, I received a call from the emergency room at LVHC.

"Do you know who Bobby Allison is?" the voice on the line asked.

"He's a race car driver, isn't he?" I responded.

Ŷes, I was told, and he was being transported by MedEvac to the Hospital Center following a serious racing accident at Pocono International Speedway. Bobby was in bad shape.

What followed was a frantic paced series of meetings with Allison's publicity man and his physician to learn details of his condition and injuries, and the necessity of dealing with an endless stream of phone calls from fans, friends, family and the media.

Not surprisingly, most of the callers were from places like Memphis, Tenn., Birmingham, Ala. and Miami. Allison makes Hueytown, Ala. his home and one caller said he is a near legend down South.



Some Cans Not Recyclable

Some of the fans were crying, some sounded like they were in shock. The overall tone was of great concern for a man many people considered a hero and friend.

At 7:30 p.m., it became clear to me that I could do more for the situation by being at the hospital to answer the calls coming in. So, for 2 1/2 hours I staffed a phone in the Admitting office telling long-distance voices that Bobby was in critical condition, along with, "I'm sorry, that is all the information I'm permitted to release at this time," when they pressed for details.

Thankfully, by 10 p.m., the calls had decreased noticeably. The media had spread the story far and wide, and racing fans across the United States knew of the accident.

Walking to my car, I felt the stillness of the night air. However quiet outside, I knew that inside the hospital, skilled doctors and nurses were busy keeping this racing hero alive.

When I returned home, my wife was awake, waiting.

"How's he doing?" she asked.

"Critical, but stable," I responded, almost automatically, adding "I think this is going to be a long week."

I was right. By week's end rumors of calls and visits from celebrities like Linda Evans of "Dynasty" and actor Paul Newman were heard in nearly every barbershop and beauty salon in the area. CBS, NBC and ABC big-name correspondents all called. This was clearly a "big news story." But then, it is all in a day's work.

EDITOR'S NOTE: At press time, Allison's condition was guarded, he was responding consistently and his vital signs were stable.

'13' Lucky Number For These Students

Recently, 50 college undergraduate, graduate and medical students began a 12-week practical learning experience through the Work Study Program, partially funded by the Dorothy Rider Pool Health Care Trust. Participants in the program experience the organization and operation of a health care institution, as well as test and evaluate their own educational and career goals.

This year marks the 13th anniversary of the Work Study Program. Health-related positions have been filled at HealthEast, Good Shepherd Rehabilitation Hospital, Gnaden Huetten Memorial Hospital and TAH— LVHC. According to Susan Knapp, director of Educational Development and coordinator of the Work Study Program, "The program has grown each year beginning with 10 positions in 1976 to the 50 positions this year."

She explained the program is mutually beneficial to the HealthEast system and the students. The program serves as a means of recruitment of employees and potential medical residents. "A survey taken two years ago indicated 22 percent of past Work Study students were working within the HealthEast system and an additional 60 percent planned to return to the Lehigh Valley following completion of their education," she added.

In addition to hands-on experience in various hospital projects, the program also provides students with experience in health care careers related to their fields of study.

Applications for the 1988 Work Study program were received from over 500 students attending 130 colleges and universities.

The following are mini-profiles of three typical Work Study participants:

Michelle Griffin, a Broadcast/ Journalism major at Syracuse University, is doing an internship in the Communications Department at the Hospital Center site.

She feels her experience at the LVHC site will be a boost to her career plans. "In the Communications Department, I am writing, interviewing, copyediting and dealing with people. Whether I choose jour-

future," she observed. **Terry Messer**, a third-year student at Franklin and Marshall College, is assigned to Human Resources at HealthEast. He hopes to earn his bachelor of science degree in Psychology with a career in medicine as his long-range goal.



After The Merger...

Employee Health departments at TAH and LVHC sites are in the process of consolidating, which will result in uniform monitoring of hospital employees' health, according to John Salventi, Ph.D., of the Office of Integration. Current projects of Employee Health include finalizing plans for providing physicals and health risk assessments to the management of TAH site, which will begin this fall. Also, plans are being developed to provide medical assessments for TAH staff on a three-year rotational system. The starting date for this program has not been established.

The consolidated department will also assist Legal Services in the man-

agement of Workman's Compensation claims for TAH—LVHC employees.

Heading up Employee Health will be Rose Haas, R.N., whose office will be located at the LVHC site. Janice Kiefer, R.N., assumes the role of manager at TAH site.

Employee Health physicians treating TAH—LVHC employees are Jeff Burtaine, M.D., and Judith McDonald, M.D. Cheryl Hartman, R.N., assists part time at the LVHC site.
