

Care Teams Being Formed as Lehigh Valley Hospital–Carbon Approaches Completion By **Michael Peckman** 



As crews continue construction of the new Lehigh Valley Hospital (LVH)–Carbon, hospital officials are focused to hire leaders, care providers and other support colleagues who will provide health care services for generations to come in Carbon County. "We are making outstanding progress in both our facility and forming our team," says <u>Terry Purcell</u>, President of Lehigh Valley Health Network's (LVHN) Northwest Region which includes LVH–Hazleton, LVH–Schuylkill and LVH–Carbon. "We are very excited to extend our reach and scope of services in Carbon County. It is with a look to the future that we introduce experienced and skilled leaders at LVH–Carbon."



Marianne Smalley, MD, Orefield, will serve as Medical Director of the Emergency Room (ER). Smalley has worked in the LVH–Cedar Crest ER since 2015 and also serves as Assistant Professor for <u>SELECT</u>, a medical education program created by the University of South Florida College of Medicine and LVHN. Previously, Smalley worked as an ER physician at Fairview Hospital, a division of the Cleveland Clinic, and was a clinical instructor at Thomas Jefferson University Hospital, Philadelphia.

Smalley is a graduate of University of the Sciences, Philadelphia, earned her medical degree from Temple University School of Medicine and completed her emergency medicine residency at Drexel University College of Medicine, Philadelphia. She has been part of numerous research projects and presentations.



**Vickie Ripkey**, MSN, RN, Lehighton, is Patient Care Manager of Perioperative Services and will be responsible for the day-to-day operations of the perioperative department by maintaining case flow and staffing assignments. Previously, she served as the operating room internship coordinator and patient care specialist in the operating room at LVH–Cedar Crest. Before that, she served as an orthopedic surgery nurse and an operating room supervisor.

Ripkey is a graduate of Lehigh Carbon Community College, Schnecksville, Pa., with an Associate Degree in Nursing and Cedar Crest College, Allentown, with a BSN in Nursing. She earned her Master of Science in Nursing and Master of Business Administration/Health Care Management from the University of Phoenix.



**Brittany Cosgrove,** BSN, RN, Albrightsville, will serve as Patient Care Manager Emergency department/patient care units. She will lead and develop the team to make for the best possible patient experience.

Previously, Cosgrove worked in the ambulatory procedure unit and post-anesthesia care unit at St. Luke's Monroe Campus, Bartonsville. She was an ER nurse at Geisinger Wyoming Valley/South Wilkes-Barre. She also served as an ER unit secretary at Wilkes-Barre General Hospital.

Cosgrove earned her Bachelor of Science in Health Care Management from Misericordia University, Dallas, Pa., her Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Wilkes University Passan School of Nursing, Wilkes-Barre, and her Master of Health Care Administration from University of Phoenix.

When completed, the new LVH–Carbon will feature 18 all-private hospital rooms with the capability of expanding to 36 beds. Additionally, LVH–Carbon will have a 12-bed ER, two operating suites and two special procedure rooms. Under Smalley's leadership, the 24/7 ER will be staffed by the same physicians who work at LVH–Cedar Crest. LVH–Carbon will adjoin with an all-new medical office building being constructed as part of this hospital project. It will provide further convenience for residents who can visit their practitioner, have a laboratory or imaging study and have immediate access to other LVHN services, all in one visit.

The new hospital will expand upon the services LVHN already offers in the area. Some of the services at the hospital include surgical care provided by <u>Lehigh Valley Institute</u> <u>for Surgical Excellence</u> and comprehensive heart care through <u>Lehigh Valley Heart and</u> <u>Vascular Institute</u>, as well as care provided by <u>Lehigh Valley Topper Cancer Institute</u>,

orthopedic services through <u>Lehigh Valley Orthopedic Institute</u> and specialty care such as neurology, endocrinology, pulmonology and other services close to home.



# LVHN Recognized for COVID-19 Vaccine Strategy

LVHN's strategy to vaccinate our community against COVID-19 is being recognized by the Hospital and Healthsystem Association of Pennsylvania (HAP).

LVHN's approach to vaccinating our community ranks among HAP's top 10 initiatives in the 2022 COVID Response Innovation Awards. To be recognized, LVHN needed to demonstrate a commitment to keeping our patients safe, while taking meaningful steps to improve existing care or create new ways of solving problems posed by the COVID-19 pandemic.

"In addition to our tireless efforts to provide exceptional care for patients suffering from COVID infections, LVHN was passionate about furthering our mission to heal, comfort and care by informing and protecting the community we serve," says Timothy Friel, MD, Chair, Department of Medicine, LVHN. "Our expansive vaccination initiative and multifaceted educational campaigns were hallmarks of our efforts. I am proud that our efforts actively engaged and inspired our colleagues, saved lives and reduced fear and misinformation throughout the region and beyond."

Whether you worked or volunteered at our drive-through clinics, shared our social media dispelling vaccine myths or were vaccinated against COVID-19, you played a role in keeping our community safe and continue to do so with your hard work and dedication.

Our plan was complex and involved a number of tactics, including:

**Drive-through COVID-19 vaccination sites** – LVHN hosted 19 drive-through clinics at four different locations. By doing this, we were able to administer 57,000 doses of vaccine to our community.

**Big-box vaccine clinics** – We opened two clinics in large spaces that were once home to big-box retail stores. This allowed us to provide our community with 36,000 vaccine doses a week at our peak.

**Mobile vaccine units –** Our mobile vaccine units helped us reach large concentrations of people who were unable to get to hospitals or vaccine clinics.

**Technology –** LVHN used leading-edge technology to help measure vaccine inventory, track how many vaccines we administered and schedule vaccine appointments through the MyLVHN app.

**Communications –** We stayed in constant contact with our community and colleagues about the COVID-19 vaccine by regularly posting on LVHN Insider and across our social media accounts and maintaining a strong web presence. We did this to offer insights about the vaccines' efficacy and safety while debunking misinformation. LVHN's leaders were front and center in the media, making appearances on TV, radio and contributing op-eds to newspapers. They encouraged our community to get vaccinated and helped dispel vaccine misinformation.

HAP received nearly 80 entries for the award. The blinded applications were evaluated by a group of independent judges from Pennsylvania and across the nation.

Hospitals and health systems whose COVID-19 projects were recognized by HAP will be honored during HAP's <u>Leadership Summit</u> in May.

# **Coordinated Health Integration Takes Another Step Forward April 1**

More facilities make the formal transition to Lehigh Valley Health Network.

The integration of Coordinated Health with Lehigh Valley Health Network (LVHN) and Lehigh Valley Physician Group (LVPG) takes another big step April 1 when more Coordinated Health practices formally join LVPG.

The moves are part of phase two of a four-phase integration schedule due to wrap up in mid-June.

Phase one was completed in January when Coordinated Health orthopedic practices and Lehigh Valley Physician Group (LVPG) Orthopedics and Sports Medicine formally joined forces to form Lehigh Valley Orthopedic Institute to further improve access and provide an unparalleled level of orthopedic expertise in the region.

Also included is the planned opening of Lehigh Valley Hospital (LVH)–Dickson City, the integration of Coordinated Health Allentown Hospital, the planned opening of Lehigh Valley Hospital (LVH)–Carbon, and the transition of outpatient rehabilitation, imaging services and ambulatory surgery center locations in New Jersey and East Stroudsburg.

What Should I Know About Scheduling My Mammogram After a COVID-19 Vaccination?

You don't need to wait for a mammogram after getting the initial COVID-19 vaccine series, a third shot or boosters

The <u>COVID-19 vaccine</u> has made its way onto many of our preventive health care checklists. For some, the shots fall around the same time as screening mammograms are due, creating many questions about when both should be scheduled.

To answer your questions, the team at <u>Lehigh Valley Topper Cancer Institute</u> and Lehigh Valley Health Network Breast Health Services has advice:

#### Current recommendations

While earlier guidance recommended scheduling your mammogram before or four to six weeks after any COVID-19 vaccine dose or booster, this is no longer the case.

At this time, individuals are encouraged to promptly schedule any recommended mammograms (screening or diagnostic), regardless of their vaccination history and timeline. While false positives are possible, they can be ruled out quickly. Also, mammograms are one of the most important tools for identifying cancer and should not be delayed.

#### General mammography guidelines

Individuals born biologically female who are 40 and older should get a <u>mammogram</u> once a year.

However, if you are at high risk for developing breast cancer, you may be advised to start getting screened sooner. Depending on your family history, your physician may recommend genetic testing to evaluate your risk further.

Be sure to discuss your screening eligibility with your physician at your next appointment, especially if you are 40 or older.

#### Cancer screenings during the pandemic

Screening for cancer is an important way to help prevent development of certain types of cancer and identify cancer at an earlier and more treatable stage. During the pandemic, many individuals delayed their cancer screenings due to concerns for safety and exposure to COVID-19.

While these feelings are understandable, it's important to know that hospitals and cancer institutes (especially <u>Lehigh Valley Topper Cancer Institute</u>) are taking extra precautions to keep you safe when you come in for your mammograms and other screening tests.

In addition, delaying regular screening can cause a delay in detecting cancer in its earlier stages, which can make a difference in treatment options and possible outcomes.

If you are due for a mammogram or other screening test, don't delay. If you have additional concerns, be sure to reach out to your doctor's office for additional support.

# Keep Your Child Safe with These Window Safety Tips

Falls from windows can be deadly, but there are many ways to prevent them

Windows are a feature found in every home, and while they are incredibly common, windows can also be very dangerous for children.

<u>Opens in new tabAccording to the Consumer Product Safety Commission</u>, each year, approximately eight children under age 5 die and more than 3,300 are seriously injured from falling out of windows. Research has shown that many of these falls take place in spring and summer when the weather is nicer and more people are looking to let fresh air into their homes.

"Kids are naturally curious, and that curiosity can become dangerous when it is paired with windows," says <u>Pediatric Chief Resident Julia Vandenheuvel, MD</u>, with <u>Lehigh</u> <u>Valley Reilly Children's Hospital</u>. "The most common injuries associated with window-related accidents include abrasions, cuts and bruises. However, more serious injuries like fractures, concussions and internal head injuries are frequently seen as well. We find that falls from higher up are associated with more serious injuries, and unfortunately, some cause death."

For National Window Safety Week, Vandenheuvel is sharing some window safety tips for parents and other adults:

### • Overall window safety

- If there are young children in a house, it is best to keep all windows locked and closed.
- When opening a window can't be avoided (especially during hotter weather), only open ones that are completely out of a child's reach.

# • Furniture

 Children love climbing things, so try not to position furniture under windows.

#### • Window screens

- While screens can help keep bugs out of your home, they don't offer protection against falls and related injuries.
- Instead of taking the chance, it's best to follow the first tip above only open windows that are out-of-reach for small children.

#### • Safety devices

- Window stops keep windows from being opened past a certain point.
- Window guards cover a window completely to provide an extra layer of protection (while letting fresh air in). If you decide to install window guards, it is best to choose a style that has a quick-release mechanism in case of a fire or other emergency.
- Supervised play
  - Talk to your children about being safe around windows and also make sure they don't play on balconies, fire escapes or roofs.

• It's also a good idea to educate older children on the dangers that come with climbing out or jumping from windows.

The clinicians at Lehigh Valley Reilly Children's Hospital are no strangers to injuries caused by falls from windows, and they have vast experience quickly evaluating and treating these cases.

"Over the past five years, we've cared for 44 children who have fallen from windows," Vandenheuvel says. "The injuries sustained from the falls ranged from minor to severe."

If a child comes to the Children's Hospital's <u>Breidegam Family Children's ER</u> and has fallen 10 feet or more, they are seen quickly by a multidisciplinary team who provides comprehensive evaluation and care.

"At Lehigh Valley Reilly Children's Hospital, providing care to an injured child with the goal of reducing injury-related disability or death is our top priority," Vandenheuvel says. "However, it's important to know that while we are here to provide care if the unthinkable happens, there are small steps that can be taken at home to prevent these accidents from happening in the first place."
