



We Can Always Do Better

Our System for Partners in Performance Improvement will add new tools to help us embrace continuous improvement

Colleagues in our ambulatory surgery unit (ASU) and outpatient areas faced a dilemma. They worked hard to create ideal experiences for patients, but measuring their patients' satisfaction wasn't easy. The outpatient survey they had used had a low rate of return, and sometimes the wrong site received the wrong survey.

What to do? The Patient Satisfaction Improvement Council's measurement team partnered with ASU and outpatient colleagues to find an answer. Looking at it from a systems perspective, they stopped the survey, identified its problems and found solutions (such as using preprinted headings with site names instead of depending on patients' recollection). The anticipated result: an improved survey, an increased rate of return and unit-specific results that allow a better understanding of what creates ideal patient experiences.

> This is just one example of how we can improve the work we do every day. To help all of us continuously improve, we are embracing a new model—the System for Partners in Performance Improvement (SPPI). It's a network-wide project that will help us continue to embrace improvement and excellence now and well into the future.

hospitals in Seattle, Wisconsin and Pittsburgh-organizations that have been using systems like this for several years. We learned that we're already ahead of the curve in many ways, but there still is room for improvement.

The system we're implementing will add new quality and process improvement tools that build on our already strong system of performance improvement. This will help us eliminate waste and repetition in our work and enhance our financial strength, all while assuring the highest-quality care. There are many areas where we can improve, such as reducing patient wait times or using more standardized treatment protocols for patient care. SPPI will provide the tools to get us there.

The system will be led by six dedicated team facilitators from the quality and management engineering departments who will work alongside a consulting firm expert to create efficiencies and increase staff productivity. Together, they will comb through performance improvement ideas, select the best ones and develop plans to make those improvements happen. Some projects will be immediate; others will be long-term. The earlier we begin to start thinking about things that can be improved, the more efficient we'll be in the long run.

Your support of SPPI is vital. You can help by participating in performance improvements within your department or on your unit. You also can help by thinking about the frustrations you may experience every day. Then think about the behaviors that cause those frustrations—defects that cause rework or overly complicated processes. Talk with your manager or department head about how those things can be done better.

We are on the first step of an exciting journey. We're already one of the 100 Best Companies to Work For in the United States. SPPI will allow us to become even better, allowing us to stay financially strong while we continue to provide the type of care people in our community deserve and expect.

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

"John's intelligence and compassion exemplifies to me that he will make a great husband—even if I occasionally need to pull out the dictionary to figure out what he said."





our Regional Heart Center and the holder of our cardiology chair.


> Rossi's leadership will help determine how the chair's funds are invested. "Now we can take education and research to an even higher level," he says. Here's what the chair will provide:

- Research day—Cardiologists will be invited here







Richard and Janet Silverman (above) are glad we're investing in new and better ways to provide heart care. Why? The education involved in the creation of our fast heart attack care program (MI Alert for Heart Attacks) saved Richard's life.

When Richard experienced chest pain, Janet called 9-1-1. Paramedics arrived at their South Whitehall Township home quickly. Having received education from our MI Alert team, paramedics used a 12-lead EKG to determine that Richard was having a heart attack. They started treatment and called ahead to LVH–Cedar Crest.

After hearing the results of Richard's EKG, an emergency department (ED) physician initiated the alert. It triggered emergency and heart care colleagues to prepare for his arrival, saving precious time. Only 24 minutes after arriving in the ED, Richard's blocked artery was opened in the cardiac catheterization lab.

"I'm grateful to my wife for calling 9-1-1, and the paramedics and hospital staff for their quick and competent work," Richard says. "It saved my life."

Now our new endowed chair will provide the support to save more lives in our community.

When she passed away, Stivala rearranged work schedules so hospice colleagues could attend the services.

Fillebrown admired Stivala's actions. "Colleagues work so hard every day, and we may take what they do for granted," Fillebrown says. "I took a step back and realized Kelly did

something special. She deserved to be recognized."

Stivala, now the patient care coordinator at our short-stay hospital, says receiving the award was humbling. "I became a nurse because I want to help people," she says. "Receiving the award reaffirmed that I am doing what I set out to do."

Quick Test Results

That's what we now offer patients as part of the Patient-Centered Experience 2016

Your patient has cancer and needs a complete blood count to help determine her treatment. In the past, that meant she needed to go to a lab, get the test and wait for the result. But now, your patients can receive this test-and many others-in their doctor's offices and get immediate results.

It's one of several improvements from Lehigh Valley Physician Group (LVPG) and Health Network Labs (HNL), who strive to create ideal lab test experiences. The project is part of the Patient-Centered Experience (PCE) 2016-a 10-year project to enhance all patients' experiences in the network.


"We want to make it as convenient as possible for patients to get their lab tests," says Geoffrey Correll,

the performance improvement director with HNL, who led the project along with LVPG clinical services director Barbara Salvadore, R.N.

Here are other steps the team is implementing:

- Providing consistent education to patients about tests (in conjunction with our Division of Education)
- · Using labtestsonline.org, a reputable, bilingual Web site, that provides patients additional details on types of tests
- · Ensuring doctors' offices have maps and directions to all 27 HNL locations and encouraging colleagues to help patients find the most convenient one.

The next step: including lab tests as part of electronic medical records that can be accessed by all






