What LVHN Colleagues Need to Know About Monkeypox

Learn what you need to do to stay healthy.

LVHN is closely monitoring the spread of the monkeypox virus. As the region's health care leader, we are prepared to respond to this evolving outbreak and we are sharing the most updated precautions and policies that protect colleagues and keep our community healthy.

Monkeypox resources can be found under Announcements on the LVHN intranet homepage. Note: You can access the intranet only if you are on a device connected to the LVHN network. If you are working remotely, you must be connected to the LVHN network via VPN.

What is monkeypox?

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), monkeypox is a rare viral disease with symptoms similar to — yet milder than — smallpox. The first human case of monkeypox was recorded in 1970 with relatively few reported cases until the current multinational outbreak of 2022.

With cases rising in the United States and throughout the globe, the World Health Organization today declared monkeypox a public health emergency of international concern. It is necessary to be aware of how monkeypox is spread, treatment options and more for the safety and health of our colleagues, patients and community.

In the last few days, we have confirmed the diagnosis of monkeypox in local patients. We are awaiting final test results for several other patients. Therefore, our clinicians need to be on the lookout for additional cases and be prepared to perform appropriate diagnostic testing and make informed recommendations to manage infected and exposed patients and prevent further spread of the virus.

The situation with the multinational outbreak of monkeypox continues to evolve. As the region's health care leader, we are sharing the most updated information to protect colleagues and keep our community healthy. Here are the latest details:

Monkeypox specimen kits

- Monkeypox specimen kits that were distributed July 22 to emergency departments, ExpressCARE locations, infectious diseases offices and Comprehensive Health Center are being retrieved and replaced with new specimen kits. LVPG will receive new kits on the afternoon of July 26.
- <u>Monekypox specimen collection guidance</u> has been updated, reflecting a change in our process for obtaining specimens.

Department of Medicine Special Grand Rounds: Monkeypox Update

Members of the Department of Medicine's (DOM) Divisions of Infectious Diseases and Occupational Medicine provided a comprehensive overview of monkeypox during a special grand rounds presentation earlier today. The lecture reviewed the epidemiology, transmission, clinical presentation, diagnosis, treatment, prevention and monitoring of the disease which continues to spread across the globe. Check Your Home Address in Lawson by Aug. 12

Make sure your address is correct because LVHN will be mailing important colleague communications and materials to you.

Is your correct mailing address listed in Lawson? Not sure? You should always make sure your address is correct with LVHN so any important materials can be mailed to you, including benefits materials, open enrollment communication and tax related documents.

How to change or confirm your mailing address

If you moved or have not been receiving communications from LVHN in your home mail, please take these steps:

- Visit the Colleague Resource Center by clicking the "LVHN CRC Lawson" icon on your SSO toolbar.
- Click the "Employee Resources" tile on the home page.
- Under "Employee Self-Service," click "Move Change Your Address."
- Enter the effective date and new address.
 - Both the "Home" and "Supplemental" tabs must be completed when you have an address change. The "Home" tab is the only tab that can have a PO Box for the address.
 - Do not change your address if you notice abbreviations (such as if "Road" is abbreviated "RD" or if "APT" is replaced with #). These abbreviations are reviewed against the U.S. Postal Service (USPS) for accurate reporting to local tax authorities.
 - To ensure your taxes are withheld properly, your address must match the USPS address. To confirm you have the correct USPS address, visit <u>https://tools.usps.com/zip-code-lookup.htm?byaddress</u>
 - You cannot submit a future dated address change update. Please update your address once your move is final.
- Click "Update."

Update your address by Aug. 12

To ensure you get important information from LVHN, your address must be correct by Aug. 12.

Information about your benefits and Open Enrollment will be mailed to your home in a few months. The information you receive will help you choose the best benefit plan for you and your dependents.

It's the 32nd Anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act

This year marks the 32nd anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). LVHN reflects on this significant milestone by acknowledging the experience and contributions of our patients and colleagues who are living with a disability and those whose lives have been impacted by someone living with a disability.

The Americans with Disabilities Act

On July 26, 1990, President George H.W. Bush signed into law the Americans with Disabilities Act. This legislation ensures the civil rights of people with disabilities by prohibiting discrimination in employment, transportation, public accommodations, commercial facilities, telecommunications and state and local government services.

Project Search

LVHN has been a sponsor of Project Search since 2019 and has hosted 34 students to date at two hospital campuses. Project Search is a one-year school-to-work transition program designed for young adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities who are in their last year of school.

These students are on our campuses each school day. They are immersed in the workplace with on-the-job coaching and classroom instruction.

This program helps the young adults develop the necessary tools for employment, skills needed for self-determination, management and self-advocacy. Individual development and placement are based on the participant's experiences, strengths and skills. As a result, LVHN has placed many of these students into rewarding jobs within the health network after graduation.

The strategic sourcing team will introduce industry standard methods of spend management into the process of sourcing and purchasing for LVHN. One such practice is leveraging organizational spend for products and services that are used network-wide.



During the two-hour event, Clifford, along with several of his Penn State teammates, including, Nick Dawkins, Curtis Jacobs and Parker Washington and the Orthopedic Institute team, led a variety of skills and drills designed to help athletes take their game to the next level. They also took part in some spirited competition with the young athletes.

Clifford is one of five Lehigh Valley Health Network (LVHN) Impact Athletes. All-Star Sisters Rely on Each Other and Lehigh Valley Orthopedic Institute to Excel

Julia and Sammy Roth bounce back from ACL injuries

Sports are an important part of life for the Roth family. All four of the Roth siblings play multiple sports. Fifteen-year-old Allentown Central Catholic High School (ACCHS) sophomore Sammy and her 18-year-old sister, Julia, a recent graduate of ACCHS, both participate in basketball, soccer and cross-country. In fact, Julia earned 16 varsity letters during her time at ACCHS, more than anyone else in the school's history.

"Sports was always something we could do together," says their mother, JoAnn Roth. "For us, family vacations were tournaments and eating WaWa in the back of the car, but it was great because we were all together."

Because Sammy and Julia both had a passion for sports, they looked forward to playing on the same team in high school for the year that they would share the school. However, Sammy suffered an injury during basketball that left them wondering if they would be able to play together after all.

"I was at a basketball tournament in Tennessee, and I turned the wrong way and heard my knee pop. I knew right away that it wasn't good. We came home and I went to see Dr. Luchetti, and he told me that I tore my ACL," Sammy says.

Although upset with the diagnosis, Sammy says that her team at Lehigh Valley Orthopedic Institute and orthopedic surgeon <u>Wayne Luchetti, MD</u>, with LVPG Orthopedics and Sports Medicine, kept her spirits up. "I could feel that Dr. Luchetti was really confident, and that helped to make me feel like I could get through this," she says.

Comeback athlete

Sammy had her surgery two weeks after her injury, to allow the swelling to subside. She was surprised how quickly she began physical therapy. "At first I was really nervous because I thought I would hurt myself again, but after I got started and it went well, I was able to relax," Sammy says.

Sammy spent the next several months in physical therapy, building up her strength so she could play at the end of her soccer season and be ready for a full basketball season. She says <u>physical therapist</u> Katie Drayton was largely responsible for her success.

"Katie really helped me to be more confident and pushed me to be better," she says.

All her hard work paid off when Sammy took to the field along with her sister Julia in Hershey and scored the winning goal in the 2A State Championships in November, less than a year after her injury.

"It was something I'll never forget. It was an amazing experience," Sammy says.

While Sammy was almost fully recovered, Julia experienced the same injury during a basketball game. Fortunately, JoAnn knew exactly what to do.

"As soon as it happened, I took her right to Lehigh Valley Orthopedic Institute. We saw how well Sammy's recovery went, so we knew that Julia would do well too," she says.

Athlete of the Year

As a senior, Julia was understandably upset to miss out on the rest of her senior basketball season but tried to remain optimistic. "I was glad I got to play a few games with my sister, and I had already decided on a college," Julia says.

Julia also had the benefit of going through her sister's recovery and relied on her for advice and support. "It was nice because if I had questions, I could just ask Sammy and I knew what to expect," she says.

Despite her ACL injury, Julia had a great senior year, which was topped off when she won Lehigh Valley Orthopedic Institute's Athlete of the Year, an honor she wasn't expecting.

"I was shocked. I still can't believe it," Julia says.

Although she is still recovering, Julia plans to attend Susquehanna University in the fall and play basketball. She credits Lehigh Valley Orthopedic Institute with helping her achieve her goals.

"Even though this experience has been tough, I'm grateful that I had my sister, Dr. Luchetti and Katie to help me through it. I know that I'll be ready in the fall," Julia says.

Implanted Defibrillator Saves Nikki Dadarria's Life

When ventricular fibrillation struck at work, an implanted defibrillator helped restore her heart's rhythm

Nikki Dadarria, 57, of Lopatcong Township, New Jersey, always thought it was odd that blood pressure cuff machines were never able to read her measurements.

"Doctors and nurses always blamed the machine, and I assumed they were right," she says.

Since she has fibromyalgia, she thought fatigue and shortness of breath also were related to that. She had no prior indication that anything serious was wrong with her heart until an appointment with her doctor in early 2014. When nurses tried to take her blood pressure, they struggled to get a reading. When her physician came in, Dadarria advocated for herself and asked for a manual reading. And immediately, her doctor thought something was off.

"He listened and thought he heard something odd and sent me for an EKG (electrocardiogram). I had no chest pain, and at 50, I thought I was too young to have heart problems," she says.

However, more tests showed that something was very wrong: She was diagnosed with left bundle branch block, an electrical conduction problem in the left ventricle. Her cardiologist, Ronak Patel, MD, with LVPG Cardiology, told her that her heart pumping function was at 16%, but it should be in the 50-70% range. This low function showed she was in heart failure.

"It was so scary," she says.

Plan to help Nikki's heart

Patel created a personalized plan to help Dadarria, starting with medication. "When Nikki first came to me, we started her on goal-directed medical therapy. This is a thoroughly studied combination of medicines that have shown to improve heart failure and potentially prolong life,"

Patel says. "We started her on a beta-blocker, ACE inhibitor and diuretics to help her feel better and allow her heart function to get stronger with time.

"We followed guidelines, put her on appropriate medical therapy and put in a defibrillator, all of which have led to her treatment success. We have a close doctor-patient relationship, and I believe this is part of the reason why she has done so well." - Ronak Patel, MD.

However, after a few months on the medications, her heart function did not improve significantly. Patel recommended that she have a defibrillator implanted.

"Studies have shown when a patient's heart function is below a certain level, they are at higher risk for lethal heart arrhythmias," Patel says. "Because of this, we put in a defibrillator to reduce her chances of sudden cardiac death from one of these lethal arrhythmias."

On May 12, 2016, Dadarria received an implanted defibrillator.

Defibrillator does its job

Dadarria continued to take medication after receiving the defibrillator and was feeling better. However, in 2018, she suddenly fainted at work.

"I went into VFib (ventricular fibrillation) when I was at work," she says. "I got super dizzy and passed out, out of sight of my co-workers. When I woke up, I went to find them. I told my colleagues, who were nurses, that my shoulder was killing me, and they suspected my defibrillator had gone off."

She checked in with Patel, who confirmed her defibrillator had gone off.

"She had an episode of ventricular fibrillation detected by her defibrillator, which quickly shocked her out of the lethal rhythm and saved her life," Patel says.

A normal life with defibrillator

Since then, her heart function has been back to normal. Dadarria explains that her defibrillator receives remote check-ins at night, while she sleeps. She also has an appointment every six months with Patel to make any adjustments and check in.

"My heart function is now up to 60%, higher than it ever was my whole life," Dadarria says. "With my defibrillator I get to take care of my grandkids and travel. I can do anything I want to do."

She credits Patel for saving her life, and they have formed a close bond.

"Nikki is one of our special patients. It has been very satisfying to treat her heart failure and see her get better and live a normal life," says Patel. "We followed guidelines, put her on appropriate medical therapy and put in a defibrillator, all of which have led to her treatment success. We have a close doctor-patient relationship, and I believe this is part of the reason why she has done so well."


And his care has meant the world to Dadarria.

"I trust Dr. Patel so much. He is the sweetest man, and he will see me for any reason. He will coach me, console me, and is always very honest and forthright with what's going on. He's been fabulous this entire time," she says.

After Two Knee Replacements, Easton Woman Feels as Good as New

Denise "Dede" Orey turned to Lehigh Valley Orthopedic Institute for both knee surgeries





When it came to knee problems, this wasn't Dede Orey's first rodeo. After she got the right knee replaced in 2019, she knew a similar procedure for the left one was inevitable.

"I have osteoarthritis," says the 65-year-old Easton resident. Osteoarthritis is a degenerative bone disease where the cartilage tissue at the end of bones wears away. By the time she had her right knee replaced, she was in great pain.

"At that point, it was virtually bone on bone in my knee," Orey says. "The bones were splintering. I had put it off for so long and I couldn't take it anymore."

Ready for replacement

After more than a year of seeing a rheumatologist and getting cortisone shots to cope with the pain, Orey finally sought out Lehigh Valley Orthopedic Institute orthopedic surgeon Jonathon Brown, DO, with LVPG Orthopedics and Sports Medicine–Hecktown Oaks, in 2019. He quickly recommended joint replacement.

"It was a classic case, nothing unusual at all," Brown says. "The replacement for her right knee was done manually. Dede did a fantastic job. Her recovery went very well."

Brown told Orey she would likely be seeing him again at some point about the other knee. His premonition came to pass in February 2022.

"I knew what to expect this time," Orey says. "When the pain came in my left knee, I knew nothing I could do would keep me from getting it replaced. Everything went so well with the first one, I didn't hesitate to contact Dr. Brown."

Second knee, new technique

Brown says that once again, there was nothing unusual in Orey's case. The only difference was his surgical technique.

"We did the second one robotically," Brown says. "The initial manual procedure went very well, and Dede recovered nicely. But robotic-assisted surgery allows us to be very precise. We were able to recreate what we did in the first procedure with almost no variation."

Orey's surgery was one of the first robotic knee cases performed in the state-of-the-art surgical suite at Lehigh Valley Hospital–Hecktown Oaks. Brown used Mako SmartRoboticsTM System, a robotic-arm assisted technology, which permits the orthopedic surgeon to use a three-dimensional model of the knee joint to observe bone structure and disease severity before placing the implant. In Orey's case, Brown was able to precisely mirror the left-knee implant. Lehigh Valley Orthopedic Institute utilizes six robotic knee systems across Lehigh Valley Health Network.

"By being more precise, we can tailor the operation more closely to the needs of the patient and theoretically can improve outcomes and satisfaction," Brown says.

Overall, robotic knee replacements benefit patients by resulting in less pain, less need for inpatient physical therapy, reduction in length of hospital stay and improved knee flexion and tissue protection, resulting in better outcomes and faster return to normal activity.

Orey's advice: Don't wait

Today, Orey is back at work as an assessment department clerk at Northampton County Courthouse, knowing her difficulty in getting around is now behind her.

"I would tell everybody dealing with the pain I was going through, don't wait like I did," Orey says. "I feel great now, thanks to Dr. Brown."
