The sun will shine and a refreshing breeze will float over Allentown Saturday, July 25, but it will be one of the dullest days the city has experienced for years. The factories and stores will be closed and the few inhabitants will wonder why it is so like Sunday and ask each other: Why so dull? Answer, because everybody wants to help build the hospital, and they have gone to Mountain Park to enjoy the musical treat given by the thirty-three men of Professor Klingler's famous Allentown Band. There are all kinds of amusements at the park and everyone is duplicated several times. The train service will be unsurpassed and Harry Ruhe, of the Central Railroad, assures the committee that he will have plenty of cars and every one can get a seat. There will be five sections. The first train starts from Catasauqua at 6 a. m. and stops at all stations to Walnutport. The second, third and fourth sections start from Allentown at 6, 6.05 and 6.10 respectively and the fifth train starts from Bethlehem at 6 a. m. and stops at Allentown at 6.15. The second, third, fourth and fifth are through trains from Allentown, Pa. Souvenirs giving points about the park, Wilkes-Barre and the surrounding towns for sale on the trains at 10 cents each. Buy your tickets Thursday and Friday evenings at Stillwagen's corner store and at C. A. Reger's, No. 725 Hamilton Street, and at the depot Saturday morning at 5 o'clock.
