The bill must now pas the senate and receive the approval of the governor before it becomes a law Senator Stiles will take care of the measure in the upper branch and it is believed that Governor Hastings can be made to see the necessity of signing the bill.

Mr. Lennon deserves the thanks of the people of Allentown for the hard and unselfish work which he has done in behalf of the hospital project. It is not an easy matter to secure an appropriation for a charitable institution which has not yet been erected. The state is willing to extend aid to such institutions when they are in working order, but, to use a homely ex pression, it is "like pulling teeth" to induce the legislature to give money to assist in the erection of a hospital. In view of this fact, Mr. Lennon deserves a great measure of praise, and the "Morning Cail" lopes that the reop'e of Allentown and Lehigh cou ty will give him every bit of credit due him.

The hospital is now in right, b tagre tdeal of work remains to be done at home. There are hundreds of people in Allentownperhaps thousands-who are abundantly able to give handsome amounts to the fund, but who have not, as yet, done so.
