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MADE MANY BEQUESTS

The late Tilghman K. Kline, the well known retired farmer of South Allentown, who died 10 days ago, left an estate which is variously estimated in value at from \$75,000 to \$100,000, and which he disposed of by his will which was probated by Register Weaver on Monday. The estate consists of four farms in Salisbury, aggregating in area nearly 500 acres and the assessed value of which is over \$50,000; two farms in the oil regions from which he derived large revenue; \$13,000 at interest, 60 shares of Second National Bank stock valued at \$140 a share; 300 shares of Allentown and Coopersburg Turnpike stock at \$15 a share, beside other securities. His Salisbury property is assessed as follows; Gross farm, 71 acres, at \$200 an acre, \$14,200; Little Lehigh farm, 139 acres at \$85, \$11,815; Schreiber farm, 134 acres at \$100, \$13,400; Keck farm, 93 acres at \$100, \$9,300 and 24 acres at \$130, \$3,120; three other tracts, \$2,700.

Mr. Kline's will was drawn by E. F. Schock, Esq., and is a carefully worded document. It is dated August 13, 1898 and the witnesses were Mr. Schock and William R. Klein, cashier of the Second National Bank.

Mr. Kline directs the sale of all his property, whether real, personal and mixed, except his household furniture, which is bequeathed to his nephews and nieces; his gold watch and chain which he gives to his grand-nephew, Edwin Kline, son of M. C. L. Kline, Esq.; piano, which he gives to his grand-nieces, Misses Sallie and Jennie Trumbauer, daughters of Jacob Trumbauer, who conducts the Gross farm, and his wearing apparel, which the executors are to distribute among the heirs and friends. If there should be a disagreement as to the distribution of these articles they are to be sold and the proceeds divided.

The following cash bequests are made:

Benjamin F. Kline, of this city, a brother, and Mrs. Heuley, of Emaus, a sister, \$1500 each.

Marcus C. L. Kline, a nephew, \$2000.

Edwin and Althea Kline, grand-nephew and grand-niece, children of M. C. L. Kline, \$1500 each.

Henry C. Herman, for many years hired man and tenant on Mr. Kline's Little Lehigh Farm, \$5000.

Misses Jennie and Sallie Trumbauer, grand-nieces, and daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Trumbauer, \$500 each.

Wm. David and George Desch, hired men on the South Allentown farm, \$500 and \$100 respectively.

David Krause, hired man on the Schreiber farm, \$500.

Mrs. Ellen Koehler, wife of Ludwig Koehler, \$100.

Mrs. Harry Quier, of this city, \$200.

Mrs. Samuel Hartzell, \$100.

Daniel F. Fink, the well known Salisbury farmer and for many years a close friend of Mr. Kline, \$1500.

Mrs. Barbara Zimmerman, of this city, \$50.

Salisbury Church, \$1500, and Salisbury Church Cemetery, \$100.

Muhlenberg College, Lutheran Theological Seminary, Mount Airy; Germantown Lutheran Orphans' Home and Allentown Hospital Association, \$500 each.

After the payment of the above bequests the estate is to be divided in equal shares among the thirteen nephews and nieces as follows: Marcus C. L. Kline, of this city; Mrs. Jacob Trumbauer, of South Allentown; Mrs. Mamie Walbert, of Philadelphia; Mrs. John Bogert, of Salisbury; Mrs. Jacob Reinhard, of Lower Macungie; Victor Hottenstein, of Australia; children of the late Mrs. Wm. Wenner, of Lower Macungie; Mrs. Jonas L. Rabenold, of Salisbury; Mrs. Benneville Eisenhard, of Upper Macungie; Mrs. Ellen Frantz, of Salisbury; Mrs. Tilghman Yeager, of Dorneyville, and Charles W. and Milton H. Laros, of this city.

Benjamin F. Kline, a brother, and M. C. L. Kline, both of this city, are the executors of the will.
