HOSPITAL INSPECTED

Cadwalader Biddle and Dr. McCloud, of Philadelphia, members of the state board of charities, on Saturday visited and made a thorough inspection of the Allentown Hospital. The gentlemen expressed themselves as highly pleased with the entire institution, particularly so with its interior arrangement. The furniture is expected to-day and by this evening all will be in readiness for the reception of emergency cases requiring surgical treatment. The building will not be open to the public until the day of the formal opening, which will be about June 1. Many liberal donations were made by the business men of the city. The names of the donors will be withheld for the present. The linens and muslins prepared by the Ladies' Auxiliary filled two large freight wagons and there is still a great deal of material left to make up into articles needed.

The races under the under the auspices of the Turf Club, of Allentown, for the benefit of the hospital to be held on the fair grounds to-day should be well patronized. An admission of twenty-cents will be charged and it is promised that a big quarter's worth of sport will be furnished. Music will be furnished by the Allentown Band. The races will start promptly at 1 o'clock. Some of the best horses in the city have been entered. President Roth, of the Agricultural Society, has appointed these officers for the races: Dr. V. H. Wisand, starter; W. A. Berger, of Catasauqua, and Dr. A. H. Pallet and Dr. G. G. Blank judges; Edgar F. Kunkle, clerk. The races will be under the rules of the National Association.

On Thursday evening there will be a lawn festival at the home of the Misses Kieppinger on North Sixth street, for the hospital fund. Strawberries and ice cream will be offered for sale.
