The Bazaar Which Opened in Lehigh Valley Hall Saturday

FOR HOSPITAL'S BENEFIT

Reporter Made the Rounds of the Various Booths and Noted Articles Which are Needed—Fair to be Open This Afternoon.

The hospital bazaar opened in the Lehigh Valley Hall on Saturday evening with a good attendance. The booths present a very attractive appearance in their varied colors.

At the entrance is the cake both, decorated in white and lemon. Then are the ice cream tables and the coffee and tea department.

In the main room the lemonade and leed tea booth is decorated in pink and blue and the "Big Heart" is brought out.

The candy booth is decorated in red and white, the apron booth in pink and green; the flower booth in purpe and festooned with wisteria. The children's booth is in purple and white; the peanut and popcorn booth in green and white with popcorn and peanut stringers; the fancy work booth in red and yellow and the fishing pond in green.

The articles which would be very much appreciated and needed in the different booths are as follows:

In the fishing pond booth all kinds of things are needed, and, judging from the crowds which encircled it, the articles will not last any length of time.

In the lemonade and iced tea booth granulated sugar is a much-needed article. They serve iced tea and plain and fruit lemonade of the very finest quality.

In the candy booth, which is tastily decorated and arranged, all inds of candies are needed and will be gratefully received.

In the apron booth, the ladies in charge will be very thankful for any donations in their line. The people are requested, while passing through the hall, to stop and take a chance at the handsome chattelaine bag which was donated by Mrs. R. F. Stine, who is a patient in the Allentown Hospital at the present time.

In the flower booth, the ladies in charge, respectfully request donations of potted plants and cut flowers, which

are a very needed article.

The children's and novelty booth; will, very thankfully, receive donations, as they are doing an immense business. People attending are requested not to miss taking a chance on the dolls donated by the Pottsville, Reading and Allentown Hospitals, the one donated by Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt and the very handsome doll donated by Mrs. Stone, wife of Governor Stone. They have a very choice line of perfumes and other novelties.

The ladies in the peanut and popcorn booth are well supplied with twenty-five bushels of peanuts and two barrels of popcorn, which they request the peanut and popcorn eaters of Allentown to do full justice to and uphold the name of their city.

The sofa and pin-cushion booth respectfully solicits donations in all kinds of needle-work, sofas and pincushions and judging from the crowds constantly around the booth the articles will soon be all sold.

The cake booth is well stocked with the finest in the city, consisting of fancy cakes and raised cakes, etc. A special feature which the ladies would like to call attention to is the excellent home-made bread, "the kind mother bakes," which they have for sale. They will gladly receive dorations in their line.

The ice cream booth is a flourishing addition to this successful affair, and is very busy serving the delicious creams to their patrons. The cream is dished by Messrs. Harold Hersh, Claude King, Robert Newhard, Charles Mertz and Harry Hoxworth. They serve all flavors.

The check-room did a very flourishing business and checks all articles at five cents. Klingler's Orchestra of five pieces discoursed fine music, which was enjoyed by all present, and to those who danced it proved a pleasing pastime.

The bazaar will be open this aftersoon, which is a toliday, and the public in general is cortially requested to be present and a special invitation in extended to the children to attend.

There was a fair-sized crowd present cotwithstanting the inclement was ther which perhaps, kept many people away. It will continue all week and the people of Allentown should well patronized this very popular and well-deserving organization.
