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## BIG CROWDS AT BAZAAR

**An Encouraging Attendance at the Fair Under the Auspices of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Allentown Hospital Association Last Evening.—A Genuine Colored Cake Walk.**

The fair and bazaar in Lehigh Valley Hall given under the auspices of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Allentown Hospital was well attended last evening by big crowds that to some extent compensated for the lack of patronage on the previous nights caused by the rainy weather. From the opening of the doors in the early evening until the closing time a steady stream of visitors poured in and out of doors. The crowds were liberal too and more than one booth was depleted of a big lot of its wares.

The cake walk given by the colored folks in fancy attire was the star attraction of the evening. The regulation "walk" given to the music of Klingler's Orchestra caused much amusement. The cake, donated by C. E. Bach, the baker, was a massive creation of icing and fancy decorations.

To-night an exhibition drill will be given by Lehigh Consultory, Knights of Friendship, under the captaincy of H. Frank Christman. After the drill a cake walk by white folks will be held. Admission will be five cents per couple. A handsome cake will be put up as the prize.

The ladies yesterday received donations of 150 carnations from Albert Yeager, 50 carnations from Horn, the florist, and two dozen roses from George Fetzer.

Miss Mella Jones drew the moquette robe, donated by Shimer, Laub & Weaver. Owen Laub drew a large chocolate cake, which he returned to the booth. The cake later brought a good price. The candy booth is in need of home-made candies and the ladies at the lemonade booth would be thankful for donations of oranges.
