HOSPITAL ADDITION

A Wing Costing Thirty-five Thousand Dollars to be Erected—It Will be Used Exclusively for Surgical Cases and the Occupants Will Have Every Protection in Case of Fire.

The wing to the Allentown Hospital is to cost \$35,000 and as the plans by Jacoby & Welshample show will be a fine piece of work. The exterior will be in keeping with the main building and will have Siesholtzville granite facing to the sill of the windows of the first floor. The copings will be of blue marble, as will be the trimmings, the water table and sill course. Buff pressed brick will be used. The building will be 37 by 170 feet in size. One part, measuring 37 by 67, will be two stories high, of fire proof construction and will be midway between the ends. The ends will be of one-story with basement. It will require a great deal of filling before the basement walls can be erected. The basement will contain a laundry, dry-
