Class History

During the anniversary celebrations two years ago, we were reminded of the courage, vision, and generosity of those whose dreams and sacrifices through fifty years have been translated into this great hospital and school of nursing we hold so dear today. Now we, members of the fiftieth graduating class, step forth to contribute our share to the advancement of the community. Through the influence of our hospital and school, we take our place among our predecessors, to pave a smoother path for those behind.

We think back on our training days with pleasure; and awe at the vast reservoirs of patience exhibited by our instructors. How hopeless they must have felt at our occasional unethical actions and careless mistakes; yet, how tireless were their efforts to help us, make us feel at ease and develop our hidden talents; how profound their willingness to make our life a happy one. Memories are sweet, as we think back to . . .

The entrance of the Spring group, trail-blazers of the Class of '51. Probie days, more difficult because of being alone; pride in becoming the first class capped by the new Director of Nursing; eagerness to exhibit the newly gained garb as Junior students to the

Welcome picnics at the Rose Garden, pride in being the first to display the new probie uniforms—pride surpassed only by love of stripes; calloused memories of the beginning of eight hour duty, Hallowe'en initiation, Christmas festivity, those Student-Faculty Association By-Laws; all these things, together with an eternity of examinations, classes, headaches and heartaches represent our probie days, that period before being recognized as the

For all our teachers and supervisors, all former graduates, and our dear class adviser, we feel grati-


tude beyond expression.


