East Stroudsburg, PA (May 28, 2015) – Pocono Health System (PHS) and Lehigh Valley Health Network (LVHN) announced today they have signed a letter of intent to merge, subject to due diligence, the negotiation of definitive transaction documents, and appropriate regulatory approvals. The Boards of Directors of both organizations, in separate meetings, authorized the letter of intent.

“We believe that the residents of the Poconos region will greatly benefit from the merger of these two longstanding, high-quality healthcare systems,” said Jeff Snyder, President and CEO of PHS. The combination of our two organizations will mean that Poconos residents will have greater access to the highest-quality clinical care in the region, the most qualified and capable physician network supported by the most sophisticated technology and advanced health records systems, all delivered locally through PMC, while being supported by the resources and scale of Lehigh Valley Health Network.”

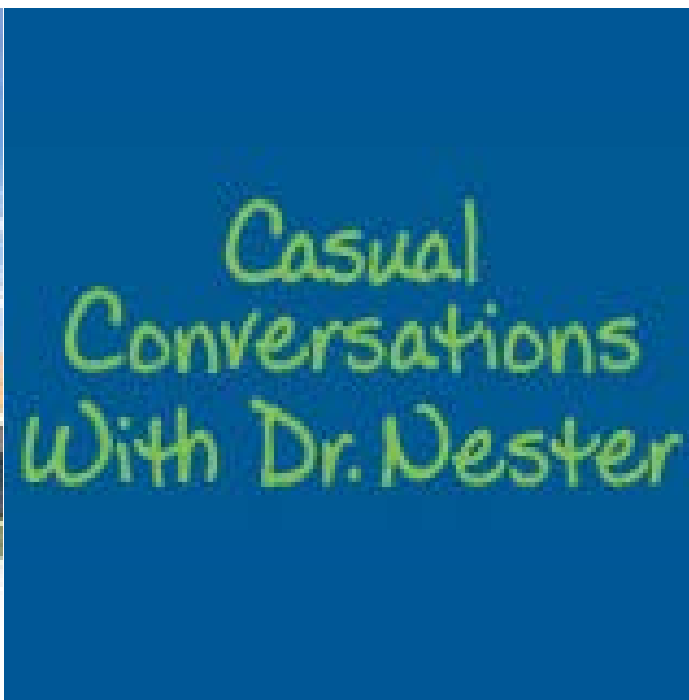
Brian Nester, DO, MBA, FACOEP, LVHN’s President and CEO, said the two organizations have a long history of productive partnerships in certain clinical areas, such as the affiliation to provide trauma and radiation oncology services to the region. He said together as a single, integrated system, they will accelerate steps to develop and grow additional, affordable healthcare services to best serve the community.

“We look forward to developing with PMC a hospital of the future that incorporates the highest level of clinical competence to provide the highest quality care close to home.” Nester said in addition, LVHN looks forward to the opportunity to provide more integrated care to the Pocono region through population health management, which includes sharing a common electronic medical records system.

Pending completion of due diligence and regulatory approvals, the parties expect the proposed merger to take effect in the first half of 2016.

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New Pavilion Will Bring Births, Rehab to LVH–Muhlenberg

It gives me great pride to inform you about a new project that will bring obstetrics, newborn and inpatient rehabilitation services to Lehigh Valley Hospital–Muhlenberg. Later this month we will begin construction on a new four-story, 161,000-square-foot pavilion on the south side of the campus that will house these important services. Births Coming to New Four-Story Pavilion at Lehigh Valley Hospital–Muhlenberg

*\$93.6 million project would accommodate 2,000 births
and include an inpatient rehabilitation center*

Lehigh Valley, Pa. (May 27, 2015) – In response to high demand for health care throughout the region and requests from community members to provide obstetrics and newborn services in the Bethlehem area, Lehigh Valley Health Network (LVHN) is planning construction of a new four-story pavilion on the Lehigh Valley Hospital (LVH)–Muhlenberg campus in Hanover Township.

The new pavilion will include obstetrics and newborn services that will accommodate about 2,000 deliveries annually. These services will be the first in LVH–Muhlenberg’s 54-year history. The new pavilion also will include a Center for Inpatient Rehabilitation and shell space to accommodate future growth.

The cost of the project is \$93.6 million. Groundbreaking is tentatively planned for September 2015, with the building expected to be open by July 1, 2017. The construction costs will be paid through a combination of capital funding from LVHN and philanthropic gifts from community members. The project is expected to create about 225 new construction jobs and about 185 new patient care jobs at LVH–Muhlenberg.

“The number of births rises each year at LVH–Cedar Crest, and we now accommodate more than 4,000 births annually at that location,” said LVHN president and chief executive officer Brian Nester, DO, MBA, FACOEP. In the last five years, the number of deliveries involving Northampton County mothers has increased by almost 25 percent. Currently, 16 percent of all births at LVH–Cedar Crest involve Northampton County mothers.

“By expanding high-quality obstetrics care to LVH–Muhlenberg, we are filling a need and giving people from Northampton County and the surrounding area an option to have their babies closer to home. We also are expanding our rehabilitation services in response to a need for inpatient-specific rehabilitation on that campus.”

The new pavilion will offer 161,000 square feet of space. Floors two and three will be reserved for obstetrics and newborn services, which will include:

- *A mother-baby unit with 20 private rooms*
- *A nursery with 16 bassinets*
- *A Level II NICU with 10 private rooms*
- *Eight state-of-the-art labor, delivery and recovery rooms*
- *Two operating rooms*
- *Five obstetrics triage beds*
- *A three-bay post-anesthesia care unit area*
- *A four-bed antepartum unit*

Floor one will be home to the Center for Inpatient Rehabilitation–Muhlenberg. It will include 28 rehabilitation beds and is similar to the Center for Inpatient Rehabilitation–Cedar Crest currently under construction inside the Kasych Family Pavilion at LVH–Cedar Crest in Salisbury Township.

The fourth floor of the new pavilion will be shelled and reserved for potential future growth. The project also will include increased parking and improvements on Schoenersville Road between Macada Road and the Route 22 east on ramp.

“This new pavilion will allow LVHN to create an ideal patient- and family-centered experience for moms-to-be and their families,” said Mary Bianchi, vice president of LVHN’s women’s and children’s service line. “This will add to the women’s health care services in maternal fetal medicine, cardiology, gynecologic oncology, urogynecology and Breast Health Services already available at LVH–Muhlenberg.”

The new pavilion will be built on the south side of the campus, and will be connected to the main hospital through the existing South Tower lobby and the former hospital cafeteria. The project calls for the removal of the current Banko Community Center, which is currently used for conference space, community events and for behavioral health programs. The conference space for community events will be incorporated into renovations to the LVH–Muhlenberg south lobby that are a part of this project. The behavioral health program will relocate to 2710 Schoenersville Road.

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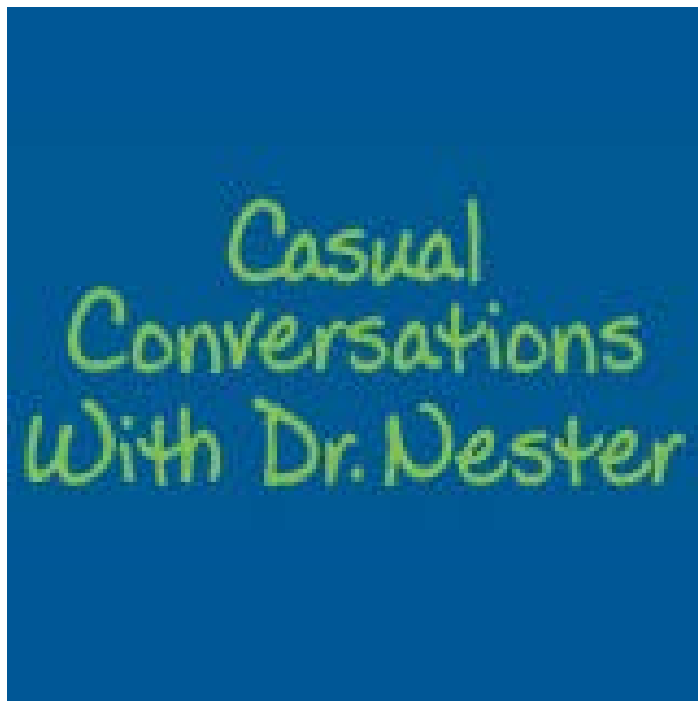

Epic Wave 2 Training Starts Next Week

It's on your calendar...the first day of Epic training. Are you feeling excited? Scared? Calm? For thousands of Wave 2 end users and super users, it's the first day they will set foot inside LVHN—One City Center. It's also the first time they will begin learning about the tabs, dropdowns and other functions of the Epic electronic medical record system. In fact, this auspicious day is the first of many training days our inpatient colleagues will log as they prepare for Wave 2 Go-Live on August 1.

If you are among the first-timers heading to Epic training, bravo! We're excited for you to begin learning Epic, a system that is all about our patients. To help you prepare, we've got helpful info and insights to help make your training experience a positive one.

About Epic Parking

It is important to park in one of the designated parking decks (listed below) so your parking fee is covered.



Important: The garage at the corner of 7th and Linden (attached to the PPL Center) is **not** to be used by Epic learners.

Here are your Epic parking garages:

1. Allentown Transportation Center (ATC) Deck

Corner of Linden and N. 6th Streets – only use entrance on 6th Street, across from the Morning Call office building.

GPS: 110 N. 6th St., Allentown, 18101

2. Spiral Deck (limited spots available here)

Corner of Linden and N. 8th Streets – only use entrance and exit on Linden Street.

GPS: 820 Linden St., Allentown, 18101

Handicap-accessible parking

▪ 8th Street Garage

Must have a state-issued placard for accessible parking (either temporary or permanent.)

Only entrance is on right side of N. 8th St. between Hamilton and Linden Streets; look for second driveway after the building ends.

GPS: 21 N. 8th St., Allentown, 18101

You can enter One City Center from interior of the garage and take elevator to the 5th floor for LVHN Epic training.

Tips: Epic Parking

1. **Read the Biweekly Parking Flyer.** It has all of the above info and more. [Click here](#) or find it with tomorrow's Epic Flash.
2. **Review the list of Downtown Events.** This list is on the flipside of the Parking Flyer. Your training may take place when another downtown Allentown event is also happening. Build in extra time to reach a parking spot when an event is on the calendar.
3. **Have your LVHN identification badge handy.** Especially during downtown events, showing your badge to the attendant will help you gain access to the deck.

About Epic Security

Security will be very visible in the vicinity of the parking garages, the PPL Center and LVHN–One City Center.

- Allentown police cruisers will be stationed around each parking deck.
- Contracted security and LVHN security officers will be stationed at strategic locations.
- Officers will be on bike patrol.

At some points, up to 18 security officers and police officers will be in and around the parking garages and path of travel to the PPL Center/LVHN–One City Center complex. These officers will be in radio contact at all times and can be dispatched to a location, if needed.

You may also request an escort to your car from LVHN security. Remember, however, that you may need to wait for an escort if the guard is busy with another escort. Try to walk in groups after class to the garages.

There are two phone numbers to contact LVHN security. Save these numbers in your cell phone or write them down and place them in your wallet:

- Non-emergency: 610-402-8220. Use this number to request an escort.
- Emergency: 610-402-5555. This number will go directly to dispatch and is for emergency use only.

Tips: Epic Security

1. Add LVHN security numbers to your cell phone.
 - LVHN nonemergency/escort request: 610-402-8220
 - LVHN emergency: 610-402-5555
2. Walk with others and carpool, if possible.
3. Pay attention to your surroundings. Do not text or talk on the phone.
4. Avoid taking shortcuts.
5. Have your keys ready before you get to the car.
6. Avoid bringing valuables to class. Leave them in the trunk of your car.
7. Don't leave loose change or your GPS in sight.
8. Park in lit areas. Alert security if lights are out.
9. Remember where you park. Don't wander looking for your car.
10. Trust your instincts. If it doesn't feel right, turn around and get back to a safe place.

Epic Training Must-haves

Here are 7 must-haves for training:

1. **LVHN identification badge.** You'll need it for class sign in, Tap and Go enrollment, API clocking and sometimes for parking.
2. **Notebook(s).** You can take notes during training and refer to them during final tests.
3. **Pens or pencils.**
4. **Folder.** Use it to hold training exercises you will receive.
5. **Class schedule.** Find yours on TLC and print a copy to have with you.
6. **Parking flyer.** It lists all designated parking garages and their GPS addresses.
7. **Eyeglasses or reading glasses,** if needed.

Once you and your colleagues experience the logistics-side of training and get that routine down pat, then you can focus on the training itself, and begin to see how Epic will enhance the great work you already do for our patients.

HIPAA Tip #5: Lock or Log Off Your Computer

HIPAA, or the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act, is a federal law that protects the confidentiality and security of health care information. As health care professionals, it's our responsibility to follow HIPAA guidelines to ensure our patients' medical information is protected. To help you, a new HIPAA Tip is posted on LVHN Daily each month.

Lock or log off the computer you're working on every time you leave the immediate vicinity. If you don't, someone else could use the computer to do things that violate HIPAA regulations (laws) or LVHN policies. Remember, when your password is used to log on, you are responsible for what happens on that computer whether you are present or not. That's why it's important to [protect your password](#). Read the [HIPAA – Confidentiality policy](#).

In addition, never allow a colleague to use your computer while you are logged on. "If someone pressures you to



do so, tell your supervisor,” says LVHN privacy officer Melissa Blihar. “If you give a colleague permission to utilize the computer you are currently working on, make sure you log off before allowing the colleague to use it.”
